It seems that this winter has not been too cold on the Bangladeshi newcomers as

the addition of Shohag Gazi, Mominul Haque and Anamul Haque has provided a boost to the national side. The trio already made their arrival felt but they have also seen both sides of the coin following Bangladesh's defeat in the third match after two convincing wins in Khulna. After the four-wicket loss in the third game at Mirpur, the million dollar question is: will Bangladesh be able to win the series against the formidableWestIndies?

Without doubt the winter would be more remarkable for the three newcomers if they can be part of a series-winning team and contribute something to the success. It however will not be an easy task even though the home side is leading the series 2-1 and showed some character even in defeat as West Indies' top performers like Marlon Samuels and Sunil Narine showed their class in the third ODI. A carefree Gazi, a smart Anamul and a shy Mominul were however confident enough about winning the series and they were hopeful that the dream can come

true today when the fourth match will take place at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur, starting at 2.30pm.

While Bangladesh captain Mushfiqur Rahim was reluctant to speak to the media on the eve of the fourth game yesterday, a rest day for the Tigers, his young brigade were however eager to express their determination and all three were praying that their skipper calls rightly at the toss for the first time in the series. Unlike the third game the pitch for the fourth game could be a batting paradise, in which case batting second will be much easier under lights, so luck at the toss is important for both teams in the daynight affair.

The young players were however very much aware of the fact that the toss factor is not in their hands. But what is in their hands is an attempt to improve their batting because the common feeling in the team was that they were a few runs short in the third game.

"We are still in a good position to win the series, so the mood in the teams is very good. Our plan is simple which is to play good cricket in tomorrow's (Friday) match. The main target is we must win the series. The third match was

ODI in Mirpur on Wednesday to keep the series alive, there are a number of areas that the visiting team management will be worried about. The batting, for starters, is yet to click for the team.

Scores of 199 and 132 in the first two ODIs point to the need for a major overhaul in the visitors' batting order. Their pursuit of 228 in the last game also witnessed a collapse. Apart from Kieron Powell and Marlon Samuels, the rest of the batting order failed to negotiate the Bangladeshi spinners effectively.

It's been the constant failure of opener Chris Gayle that's been a major worry for the West Indians. Apart from a solitary wicket with the ball on Wednesday, Gayle's performance has been below-par. Scores of 35, 15 and 4 in the first three ODIs show that the aggressive opener hasn't quite enjoyed his stay.

The team management though believes that it's only a matter of time before the big man hits form. "Chris Gayle has played all round the world.

He is a fantastic player and knows his own strengths and weaknesses. I think at some point in the next few days Gayle will get a big score, I am sure he will," said Toby Radford, assistant coach of the West Indies at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium yesterday.

"The players are gradually per-

forming. Sunil Narine bowled exceptionally well. [Verasammy] Permaul came into the side as well and bowled very well. Marlon Samuels's innings was outstanding really. He pretty much batted right till the end and allowed the other guys to bat within [themselves]," he added. Kieron

A real belief in the team: Jurgensen

that gave them the two crucial wins over the West Indies in the beginning of the series. However, with the visitors having pulled one back on Wednesday, courtesy of a brilliant century by Marlon Samuels, the question that lingers in the minds of the thousands of Bangladeshi supporters is whether the hosts can keep their calm and pull off at least one win in the coming days.

Interim head coach Shane Jurgensen, who has been with the team for close to two years now, certainly thinks so and claimed to have noticed a positive change in the attitude of the players in the last couple of series.

"I think there's a real belief there. The boys know that we missed out on a little opportunity on Wednesday. What's changed in this team I think is their belief. We stumbled upon the Asia Cup and did well, we won against Ireland in the T20s and winning creates a good habit," said Jurgensen in an interview with The Daily Star yesterday. "The team now understands what we do well when we win and what we didn't quite get right when we lose. That's a good sign," he added.

Victory for the West Indies on Wednesday means that the series now stands at a tricky crossroads and makes the fourth game very important. A win for the West Indies can shift the momentum towards the visitors and might eventually lead to a series win. The importance of the game was best reflected by Jurgensen who claimed that the third ODI was theirs for the taking.

"We weren't far from winning that game last night. We were bowling when there was dew on the ground. If a couple of catches might have been taken that were sort of half chances, it would have been a really close game. Had we got 20 more runs on the board, the story could have been different," he said.

The coach, however, was happy with the way the hosts came back after a weak start in the third ODI. "I really admired our fighting spirit yesterday. It could have been a lot worse.
