2 Bangladeshi farmers shot by BSF

Indian Border Security Force (BSF) shot and injured two Bangladeshi farmers near Ratnai border in Baliadangi of Thakurgaon early yester-

The injured, 28-yearold Toriqul Islam and 25year-old Firoz Mahmud are undergoing treatment at Rangpur Medical College Hospital.

Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB) and local sources said the BSF members of Sonamoti Camp under 14 BSF Battalion opened fire on the duo around 2:00am, while they were guarding a ripe aman field along the border, leaving them injured.

Lt Col Touhidul Islam, commanding officer of BGB 30 Battalion, confirmed the incident and said BGB sent a protest letter to its Indian counterpart for holding a flag meeting immediately.

WB wants to start work without delay

A senior official of the World Bank (WB) yesterday said the bank wants to start the construction of the Padma bridge without further delay resolving the present stalemate considering its importance on Bangladesh's econ-

World Bank Vice President and Head of Network for Sustainable Development Rachel Kyte said this in a meeting with Minister for Environment and Forests Dr Hasan Mahmud at Qatar National Convention Centre.

Mahmud and Rachel are now in Doha to attend the 18th Conference of the Parties of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change.

"Ms Rachel told me that they are looking into the matter of Padma bridge with high importance and want to start construction of the bridge without any delay," Mahmud told reporters after the meeting.

In the meeting, the minister underlined the importance of construction of the bridge saying it will not only be a great boost for economic development of Bangladesh but also a leap for the most climate vulnerable people of the southern parts of the country linking the area with other parts including the capital Dhaka.

Mahmud said they have discussed many issues particularly on strengthening cooperation for environmental protection and tiger conservation, and ways for working together globally for combating climate change.

Bangladesh Bank Governor Dr Atiur Rahman and Secretary of the Ministry of Environment and Forests Shafiqur Rahman Patwari were also present during the meeting.


Maksud, also an executive member of Bapa, said the commission would be formed with eight to ten members representing the government, indigenous community and civil society. It will inform, negotiate and liaison with the government to solve the problems of indigenous communities and protect their rights.

Noted theatre personality Mamunur Rashid said the Khasia community in Moulvibazar and in greater Sylhet division was facing the threat of extinction while the government remained silent.

APRA Coordinator Sharif Jamil and Bangladesh Adivasi Forum General Secretary Sanjib Drong also addressed the discussion.
