Main financier WB issues statement; Muhith terms it totally unjust

The World Bank has once again given the government a clear message that the global lender will not finance the Padma bridge project unless a full and fair investigation is carried out into the corruption allegations in the project.

"The World Bank will proceed with support for the Padma Bridge only if the Anti-corruption Commission launches a full and fair investigation based on evidence of corruption under the project," Ellen Goldstein, WB country director for Bangladesh, said in a statement yesterday, two days after the WB external panel left Dhaka.

Finance Minister AMA Muhith and Anti-Corruption Commission Chairman Ghulam Rahman expressed surprise at the WB statement.

The WB external panel left the capital on December 5 following a stalemate in talks with the ACC over the inclusion of ex-communications minister Syed Abul Hossain

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Tail-up Jamaat bids to steer BNP

The Jamaat-e-Islami, encouraged by the December 4 hartal, spurs the whole opposition to launch a tougher anti-government movement.

The party made the hartal a "success" with the BNP and other small partners of the 18-party alliance supporting it, Jamaat leaders said. It has now been convincing those parties to pressure the main opposition BNP to prepare for street agitations demanding release of Jamaat's top leaders facing war crimes trial.

This strategy of Jamaat worked ahead of the

hartal, sources in the parties, including Islamic Party, National Peoples Party, Khelafat Majlish and Bangladesh Labour Party, said. Their spontaneous support to the hartal had compelled the BNP to extend its moral backing.

BNP's "go slow" policy had annoyed the alliance's other partners who wanted immediate action to force the government to fulfil their demands, including the restoration of the caretaker government system, some members of the alliance told The Daily Star.

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6AM-2PM ROAD BLOCKADE TODAY Security on alert

Aiming at detaching the capital from the rest of the country, the BNP-led opposition alliance is observing eight-hour countrywide road blockade today from 6:00am to 2:00pm to press home their demands, especially restoration of the caretaker government.

Opposition leaders yesterday once again urged people not to bring their vehicles on roads during the blockade. They also threatened the government of tougher steps if it created any obstacle.

Leaders of ruling Awami League on the other hand vowed to resist the opposition's programme. This has brewed up fears of chaos and confrontation in the capital and elsewhere.

The ruling party leaders suspect Jamaat-e-Islami, the party whose top leaders are facing trial on charges of crimes against humanity during the Liberation War in 1971, may take the blockade as an opportunity to create anarchy.

Confusion over Tazreen toll

Labour rights activists yesterday claimed the number of casualties in the Tazreen fire is much higher than the official count.

The government put the number of dead at 111 and that of missing at 53.

But Moshrefa Mishu, president of Garments Sramik Oikya Forum (GSOF), a labour rights organisation, insisted that over 200 workers died in the blaze.

Dozens have remained missing since the incident two weeks ago, Mishu said at a press conference.

At a separate press meet, three researchers and rights activists put the number of missing workers at 59.

Saydia Gulrukh, a researcher from the University of North Carolina, said the journalists and fire-fighters who rushed to the fire site on the night of November 24 think the authorities were evasive about the total number of casualties.

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Net gets submarine backup

Internet cost to go competitive; outsourcing business to rise

The cost of Internet service in the country is set to become competitive as NovoCom commercially launched data and voice connectivity with International Terrestrial Cable (ITC), which will serve as a backup to the submarine cable.

NovoCom, a private company, launched its operations taking a connection from an Indian terrestrial cable.

NovoCom officials, at a press briefing yesterday, said it has established a 10 Gigabits per second (Gbps or STM 64) connection with India and it would increase the capacity by eight folds before

June, 2013.

NovoCom is the third company to obtain physical connection with Indian communication companies. Fibre@Home and 1 Asia Alliance Communication Ltd obtained their connections last month.

Investments worth millions of dollars, for business outsourcing, call centres and various IT services, were stuck due to absence of the second international connectivity, sources said.

"A backup of the lone submarine cable is very urgent for the country's call centres," said Syed Moinul Haq, managing director of NovoCom.

The MD said the ITC companies would also create bandwidth price competition in Bangladesh.

Chief technical officer of the company Tanveer Ehsanur Rahman said they got reasonable results while testing the connection and they were comparable to the submarine cable.

NovoCom officials said their facilities were able to provide voice, data and video services simultaneously.

The government in February issued six ITC licences.
