HSBC -Star CLIMATE AWARDEE 2011

Green Radio committed to green earth

Since 2010, HSBC-The Daily Star Climate Awards have been recognising individuals and organisations actively working towards preserving the environment.

This year's awards will be given on December 14 at Ruposhi Bangla Hotel in the capital.

Last year the organisers awarded one government and four private organisations for their pioneering role in addressing climate change and environmental degradation. Of the four, Green Radio, a programme of Radio Today, a popular FM radio channel, won the Climate Champion in Knowledge Management award for its contribution to research, exploration and raising awareness.

Green Radio began its journey in 2009 with a "commitment to green earth". Rafiqul Haque, managing director of Radio Today, first envisaged the project in order to generate awareness among its audience on various environment-related issues.

The show has been on air every day from 7:15am to 8:00am since

April 2009. "We highlight all national and international environmental concerns, including global warming, climate change, natural disasters, depletion of natural resources and urbanisation," says Nusrat Islam Khan, project officer and chief researcher of the programme.

"In addition to discussions on these topics, we also incorporate success stories, interviews and research findings on the environment in our programme as well as highlighting different events, initiatives and campaigns undertaken by individuals or organisations," she adds.

Green Radio also has a segment called Green Hour, which gives listeners daily national and international news updates on the environment.

The team maintains contacts with a wide range of stakeholders, from affected people at the grassroots level to policymakers at the national level, from researchers and academics to local administration, for assistance in producing the show.

It addresses each issue in a holistic manner through exploring its different facets by using case studies, research and interviews.

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130 turtles seized, 2 arrested



Police yesterday seized 130 turtles and arrested two persons from Chittagong Railway Station.

The arrestees are Zakir Hossain, 25, and Hiran Mia, 20.

Acting on a tip off, a team of Government Railway Police conducted a drive at platform 5 of the railway station and detained the two who were about to board the Chattala Express, an intercity train bound for Dhaka, said Ahsan Habib, officer-incharge of the railway police.

Law enforcers found 130 turtles after searching four plastic bags belonging to Zakir and Hiran, added

detainees admitted that they got the turtles from Chittagong Fishery Ghat and were taking them to Akhora and had law enforcers not apprehended them, the turtles might have been smuggled, the OC said.

A case was filed under the Wild Animals Preservation Act and the turtles would be handed over to forest department, he said.

The OC further added that police later on produced the three before a Chittagong court and prayed for a three-day remand for further interrogation.

"As turtles are not sold on the open market, we suspect that they would have been smuggled, and so, we can get more information after further interrogation," he told the court.
