Make every effort to prevent fire accidents

In the December 1, 2012 issue of The Daily Star, quite a number of such news were published: Elderly woman killed in capital, road crashes kill 4, female doctor found killed at clinic in capital, two district Awami League leaders killed. People are still in a shock due to the incident of Tazreen Fashions. The cause behind this heavy death toll is so bizarre that it is just unbelievable. According to a survivor, the assistant production manager ordered the guards to lock the collapsible gate and a top official played music on a loudspeaker in high volume to deceive the workers about the fire!

Garment factory may have many defects but in spite of that lives could have been saved if the gate was kept open and the workers were not given the wrong message. Those who were responsible for the deaths of so many people must be brought to justice.

All the factory owners must make sure their factories are built consisting of all security measures. They must take all the precautionary steps to avoid accidents. A team must always remain vigilant to prevent any mishap.

Above all, it is the government's duty to ensure people's safety everywhere, and inspect the factories regularly.

Managing Director unaware of safety!

I would like to propose the following suggestions to BGMEA for implementing in garment factories. All top officials, including the board members of garment industries, and all top managing and supervising officials of garment factories, must read and understand the Factories Act, as well as Shops and Establishment Act. Further, they should be aware of basic factory accident prevention and safety rules and regulations. It may be useful to have simple booklets in Bangla, where the important sections of these laws and rules can be incorporated. Additionally, simple fire protection and safety do's and don'ts can also be incorporated in this booklet!

Additionally, BGMEA should have a "safety cell" at its Head Office; and they should at regular intervals, inspect all the factories and advise the factory management and the BGMEA about all deficiencies and shortfalls in this important area. This must also include technical personnel, who will inspect and report on all earthing, wiring, contacts, switchgear and related electrical equipment. Additionally, fire drills must be held in every factory; once in a quarsurprise, to see how effective the safety provisions and procedures are working. Importantly, all workers should be paid for such drills and surprise checks as a part of their regular working hour.

Hopefully, if these measures are included, enforced and observed, it will reduce the frequency of fire hazard, and create much needed safety awareness, which is absent in our garment industry. Engr. S.A. Mansoor

We can learn from PRI

A recent report published in The Daily Star (25.11.2012) titled "Bangladesh drops in remittance ranking" mentioned that although Bangladesh continues to be the top 10 remittance receiving countries, it has slid one notch down compared to last year. On the other hand, countries like Pakistan and Nigeria have improved in remittance earnings from the previous years. The reason behind the success of Pakistan in remittance ranking position in recent years was the state-driven joint initiative called "Pakistan Remittance Initiative" (PRI). Under this framework, the government encouraged the state bank to open dedicated Home Remittance Centres and enhance their activities overseas for collecting remittances.

Further, to provide a reliable and immediate contact, a call centre has been established which is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Through the call centre the overseas Pakistanis and their families back home can inquire about the remittance services of the bank and lodge complaints if they have any. The call centre has provided a toll-free number for the overseas Pakistanis residing in 12 countries of the world. That has increased Pakistan's remittance earning from US\$ 6.4 billion in FY 2007-08 to US\$ 13.2 billion in FY 2011-2012.

The main motto of PRI programme is 'nearer to remitter and nearer to beneficiary,' which resulted in reduction of remittance delivery time and increased the overall standard of the service. PRI can be a lesson for Bangladesh that will not only reduce the suffering of the remitters and remittance receivers but also increase the total amount of remittance. It can also be helpful to improve the remittance ranking position of Bangladesh in the near future. Liton Roy, Lund, Sweden
