Cloud over Del Piero's future

Italian superstar Alessandro Del Piero wants to play another season in Australia but says his discussions with Sydney FC have stalled. The former Juventus great joined the

club in September, making the 2006 World Cup winner the biggest signing in the domestic A-League history. The lucrative deal, reportedly worth 1.6 million euros (US\$2 million) a season, was for one-year with another one-year option.

He told journalists talks had taken place between his management and the club about staying on but the situation had

2nd 4-day meet on the cards

Following the end of the National Cricket League (NCL) this week, members of the Bangladesh Cricket Board's (BCB) ad-hoc committee are working on a second fourday tournament which will be contested between four franchises. The tournament is expected to fill the free time in Bangladesh's domestic calendar that is available till the second week of January, after which the players will be busy with the second edition of the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) T20.

"The tournament is going to take place for sure, however we have to work around a bit with its timing. We have to ensure that it doesn't run over to the BPL," said Mahbub Anam, member of the ad-hoc committee.

In a press conference in October this year, board members decided that the national selectors would provide a pool of 80 players who will be selected for the four-franchise first-class tournament based on their performances in the NCL. "We still have to decide on a date regarding

the auctioning of these players," said Anam.

He further stated that the tournament would have a final match between the top two teams. "If we can't fit the final match before the BPL, we'll have it after the T20 league ends," added Anam. The dates of the new-look tournament will be confirmed following a meeting at the BCB headquarters today.

The BCB in October tried to move away from tradition and organise the 14th National Cricket League along a franchisee-based format. Various internal complications however compelled the board to scrap its plans. It was then that the board had announced its intentions of organising a four-day franchisee-based tournament later in the year.

The four-day tournament, if it goes ahead as planned, will see the national players back in action following their impressive performance against the West Indies. The tournament will lead the players into the second edition of the BPL, which is scheduled to begin on January 17.

The BPL will be followed by an away tour to Sri Lanka in March, where the Tigers will play two Test matches and **SEE PAGE 17 COL 8**

Broad out of Nagpur Test

Stuart Broad has been ruled out of England's final Test in India while fellow pace bowler Steven Finn will have a late fitness test.

Finn has suffered a strain to a disc in his lowe back and will be analysed before the start of Thursday's Test in Nagpur.

Twenty20 captain Broad may yet play in the T20 internationals in Pune and Mumbai next Thursday and Saturday as he remains in India to undergo treatment.

He was highly unlikely in any case to be selected to play India in Nagpur, when the tourists will be bidding for a historic 3-1 series win.

Down in the dumps after back-toback defeats, India's under-fire cricketers will have to pull themselves up by the bootstraps and compete on equal footing against a confident England in the perform-orperish fourth and final Test commencing on Thursday.

Trailing the buoyant visitors 1-2 in the rubber after being outplayed in the second and third encounters at Mumbai and Kolkata, the home players need to sort themselves out on several fronts to level the series at the VCA Stadium in Jamtha.

Under-performing senior players in the Indian line-up, including skipper # Mahendra Singh Dhoni and veteran batsman Sachin Tendulkar, are under ¿ severe pressure not only to lift the side with supreme personal efforts but also to save their careers after India's spineless displays at the Wankhede Stadium

and the Eden Gardens.

It would need a monumental display of grit and determination from several below-par players if India are to bounce back from this dismal situation and prevent

England from walking off with their first Test series win in India in 28 years.

The home team needs to buck up not just in one department but in SEE PAGE 17 COL 2

The top teams from each of the five groups along with two best runners-up finishers will qualify for the eightteam finals which will be held in 2014 where Maldives will join them directly as host nation. The champions of the AFC Challenge Cup will get ticket to the AFC Asia Cup.

Drought motivates SL

Sri Lanka are putting their faith in the remnants of their "golden generation" as they target their first ever Test win in Australia in the three-match series starting on Friday.

Thirty-somethings Mahela Jayawardene, Kumar Sangakkara, Tillakaratne Dilshan and Thilan Samaraweera, who form the core of Sri Lanka's batting, are shaping as Sri Lanka's best chance of breaking their 10-Test, 25-year winless record.

Sangakkara, 35, the international cricketer of the year, would not be drawn on whether this will be his last trip to Australia, but he said an elusive Test win was a prime motivator for the team elders.

"When you do get older, you do look for achievements where you haven't really tasted victory so, here and in India, [there are] Test matches still to win," Sangakkara

said in Hobart. 'That's a great motivator for guys like Dilshan, Mahela, myself and Samaraweera. We're the older brigade. But whether we get it or not, the key is to

really contribute to the side." Since being hammered in their first Test in Australia in early 1988, Sri Lanka

have lost another seven matches and drawn two, most recently in Cairns in 2004. They have also never won a Test in India.

Sri Lanka's hopes appear to rest on their batsmen providing enough runs to upset Michael Clarke's Australia, the world number three Test side, who are embarking on their first series since the retirement of Ricky Ponting.

Their bowling has been hit by the Test retirements of Lasith Malinga, Chaminda Vaas and the 800-wicket Muttiah Muralidaran. Unorthodox spinner Ajantha Mendis, with 62 wickets from 16 Tests, was passed over for the tour.

Dilshan, 36, admits he is unlikely to have another chance to win a Test in Australia and acknowledges time is running out for him and his teammates.

"Definitely. For me I think this is my last tour [in Australia] in Test cricket. This is a real challenge for everyone," he said.

"We've never won a Test match here. If we can win a Test match it's great for the team and the country. "It's never easy when you're playing

Australia because the conditions are dif-

ferent. But we're looking forward to a

great run with them in this series." Much of Sri Lanka's hopes are pinned on the batting of veteran trio Jayawardene, SEE PAGE 17 COL 2
