AFC U-14 QUALIFIERS Bangladesh in ASEAN zone

Bangladesh have been included in the ASEAN zone when the forty sixnation inaugural AFC U-14 Championship qualifiers were held at the AFC House in Kuala Lumpur on Tuesday.

Forty-six teams have been divided into four zones (West, Central and South, ASEAN and East) with 12 of the teams coming from West Asia, 13 from Central and South,

11 teams from ASEAN and 10 teams from the East. Since there were 13

teams from the Central and South zone, the AFC has decided to move Bangladesh to the ASEAN zone as it is geographically closer to Southeast Asia.

As result of the move, Bangladesh will have to face tough opponents like Thailand, Indonesia, Cambodia, Singapore and Laos in Group F Qualifiers. The top two teams

from each zone, totaling eight teams, will qualify for the AFC U-14 Championship 2014 Finals. The venue and dates have not been finalised yet.

"Stuart is out of this Test match," he said.

"His scan has showed a bruised heel, and we'll assess him over the next day or so to see what happens with the Twenty20. We'll know a bit more when it settles down."

Broad has endured an especially miserable tour, in which he did not manage to take a wicket in either of the first two Tests and was then dropped for the third, in order to accommodate fit-again seamer Steven Finn.

"It's the nature of sport isn't it? Some people have good tours, and some people don't," added Cook.


"Unfortunately, more down to niggles and and illnesses, Broady hasn't quite managed to get into the tour.

Angelo ready to captain

Angelo Mathews has expressed enthusiasm for the leadership role and appears ready to take over the captaincy once Mahela Jayawardene, Sri Lanka's current Test captain, steps down. Jayawardene accepted the post reluctantly in January and has seemed eager to be rid of the reins ever since. He has hinted he will step down after the tour of Australia as long as Sri Lanka avert disaster there, and his deputy's apparent willingness to take over will only make that move easier.

Mathews is already Sri Lanka's Twenty20 captain and has been groomed for the role in the longer formats. He arrives in Australia in form, having been the team's top-scorer in the home series against New Zealand, and has seen his Test batting bloom over the last 18 months. He has been the vice-captain in all formats since July 2011, and in the SLPL, he led the Nagenahira Nagas to the final of the competition.

Mathews' unflinching attitude and an

expanding reputation for even-headedness under pressure have made him appear much more like captaincy-material than at the end of Kumar Sangakkara's tenure, when he was considered for the role, but lost out to Tillakaratne Dilshan.

"I think that's totally up to the selectors -- if they think I'm ready for the captaincy, I'm ready," Mathews said. "It doesn't really matter for now because Mahela's been a great captain for years and I think he's been serving the country for decades. But if the selectors think I'm ready -- it's up to them."

If he does succeed Jayawardene after the tour, and there are no retirements, he will lead a side with three former captains and several other players senior to him in age, if not always in international experience. At 25, Mathews may be leading one of Sri Lanka' oldest Test sides, but he said he sees the older players' presence as a boon, rather than a challenge. Indeed, the prospect of having time to mentor Mathews in the initial phase of his captaincy has been the reason Jayawardene has cited for wanting to relinquish the captaincy before he retires.

Sangakkara and opener Dilshan, who urged the top order to make runs or risk being whitewashed in the series.

"Definitely in the top order someone has to put their hands up and put some big runs on the board, to help the middle order and the tailenders," the opener said.

"That's our target. The top order should make some runs this series. It's really important that Mahela and Sanga come into form. They're two experienced guys in the side."

However, Sri Lanka's lead-in form does not augur well with just four victories in their last 20 Tests. Their last away series win was in Bangladesh in 2008, and their

current Test ranking is a lowly sixth. Australia are coming off a 309-run drubbing by world number one South Africa this month, and Hobart will be the first

after the record-breaking Ponting retired

with 13,378 Test runs.

Phil Hughes returns to the Australian squad at the ground where he was dropped after their shock loss to New Zealand a year ago, with a likely role at number three instead of opening the innings.

"This is the ground where things probably didn't pan out perfectly on a personal note," Hughes said this week. "Twelve months down the track, I feel like I'm in a better place now."

All-rounder Shane Watson has said he will be given the first opportunity to fill Ponting's vacancy in the batting order at number four against Sri Lanka.

"[Coach] Mickey Arthur talked to me at the end of the last [Perth] Test to say the way it was looking, they were going to move me down to four," Watson told reporters.

The series continues in the Boxing Day Test at the Melbourne Cricket Ground followed by Sydney, starting on January 3.

several to stop the visiting team from running away triumphant for the first time since David Gower's outfit in 1984-85.

Indian openers Gautam Gambhir and Virender Sehwag have been pretty casual in their approach thus far, in stark contrast to the grinding efforts of rival skipper Alastair Cook, England's top batsman in the series, and rookie Nick Compton, who has slowly and steadily found his feet after a nervous debut in Ahmedabad's opening Test.

The middle order has been pathetic with only Cheteshwar Pujara showing spunk in the first two Tests before going off the boil.

To give an impetus to the nonperforming middle order, the Indian selectors have chopped the underperforming Yuvraj Singh from the squad and brought in the in-form Ravindra Jadeja and the Saurashtra all-rounder is almost certain to make his Test debut.

Jadeja can certainly complement the style of Pragyan Ojha and the off-spin of Ravichandran Ashwin, who has not looked the part of a Test bowler except in the closing stages of the Kolkata game when he concentrated on sticking to a correct line and limit-

ing his variations to the minimum. The other spinner, who has been

included in the squad at the expense of Harbhajan Singh, leg-spinner Piyush Chawla would bring in some more variety if picked in the eleven.

India have also dropped the out-ofform Zaheer Khan and replaced him with Delhi pacer Parvinder Awana.

But Ishant Sharma and Ashok Dinda, yet to play his first Test, appear to be the two first-choice pacers for the hosts and Awana may have to wait for his chance.

While India have a load of problems to confront, England are having very few and are expected to retain the winning eleven for the series finale.

They can sit on the 2-1 lead by playing for a draw, but it's fraught with danger and captain Cook has responded in a similar fashion after the team's victory in the third match.

While Cook has led from the front with aplomb, the other leading batsmen have rallied around him, with top batsman Kevin Pietersen playing the defining knock in the Mumbai Test and Matt Prior and Compton playing the supporting roles with panache.

The wicket at the Jamtha Stadium appears to be a dry one and should aid spin bowling quite early.

Sachin should do what Ricky did

Former Pakistan captain Wasim Akram feels it is difficult for Indian selectors to give any sort of retirement advice to Sachin Tendulkar and, at the end, the batting maestro himself will have to do some assessment like Ricky Ponting did.

As the pressure of retirement mounts on Tendulkar, Akram feels that Indian cricket is in a "delicate situation".

"The question is who will bell the cat? Who will pop the question? Today, former cricketers are openly asking for Dhoni's head. Can you do the same with Tendulkar? A lot of people, like Sourav Ganguly, feel he should retire, but Sachin himself might still want to continue for another six months or so. It's difficult to give any advice to a legend like Sachin," Akram was quoted as saying by ESPNStar.com

assessment as Ponting did," he said.

The legendary fast bowler feels that Tendulkar has achieved everything in his cricketing career and now he himself must decide when to leave.

"When Sachin first stepped into international cricket, nobody would have thought that this lad would go on to score 100 tons and smash all batting records. If I was in his shoes I would have stepped down by now because there is nothing else left to achieve," he said.

Akram said the pressure on Tendulkar was mounting and India's twin defeats in the Test series against England were only making things difficult for him.

"When your most experienced batsman hasn't scored a Test century in almost two years, questions are bound to rise," said Akram.

As the Indian team goes through a period of transition with the retirement of stalwarts like Rahul Dravid, Ganguly and V.V.S. Laxman, Akram said changes should be made carefully and it was high time that the selectors asked Tendulkar about his future plans. "The changes have to be made

"It finally boils down to your own carefully. One shouldn't tamper too much with the team line-up. But the middle order needs a few new faces. And somebody needs to ask Sachin about his future plans and for how long does he want to continue," suggests Akram.

NZC says sorry to Ross

New Zealand cricket chiefs issued a public apology to axed captain Ross Taylor Wednesday, as a weakened Black Caps side prepared to depart for South Africa without the in-form batsman. Taylor opted to sit out the tour against

the Proteas after being replaced as skipper by opener Brendon McCullum last Friday, leaving a gaping hole in the New Zealand batting line-up as the side faces the world's top-ranked Test team. The axing also exposed deep divisions

within New Zealand cricketing circles and provoked a backlash against administrators over Taylor's treatment. New Zealand Cricket (NZC) chairman

Chris Moller acknowledged the issue could have been handled better, but stood by the decision to appoint McCullum and said there would be no sackings at the organisation.

"The board has reviewed all aspects of the captaincy issue and wishes to publicly place on record its apologies to Ross Taylor and his family for the manner in which events have unfolded," Moller told reporters. The drama is a distraction any team

poised to confront the Proteas at home could do without, let alone one ranked eighth in the world and already without star spinner Dan Vettori and gifted batsman Jesse Ryder.

"What's unfolding at the moment is very disappointing," McCullum, a close associate of coach Mike Hesson, told reporters this week after denying he had any role in Taylor's downfall.

"I'm sure that will all heal in due course," he added.

McCullum's optimism appears misplaced, as cricketing greats and media commentators called for heads to roll at NZC amid claims the sport has lost its way
