### BCS exams postponed for hartal

Bangladesh Public Service Commission has rescheduled the written tests of the 33rd Bangladesh Civil Service (BCS) exams, which were to be held on December 18, due to a countrywide hartal to be enforced by leftist political parties on the day.

Contacted, AYM Nesar Uddin, controller of examinations (cadre), PSC, yesterday said the tests for English 1st and 2nd papers have been shifted to December 24.

Written test of Bangla 2nd paper due for December 24 has been moved to December 26 while tests of medical sciences 1st and 2nd papers scheduled for December 24 and 26 will now be held on December 30, he added.

The examinations on December 19, 20 and 23 will remain unchanged.

### Dhaka expresses | concern over missile launch

Dhaka has noted with deep concern the recent missile launch conducted by North Korea and said such action is not conducive to maintenance of peace and stability in the Korean Peninsula and the world in general.

A statement issued by the foreign ministry yesterday said Bangladesh, as a signatory to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NNPT) and the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty (CTBT), strongly supports all international measures for a nuclear free zone in the Korean Peninsula.

Bangladesh considers that nuclear testing of any kind undermines nuclear non-proliferation, both horizontal and vertical, and constitutes a major threat to international peace and security.

# Int'l lobbyists hired to AG slams Moudud hinder war crimes trial for ICT-1 remarks

Alleges Dipu Moni

Vested interest groups have appointed international lobbyists in different countries to hinder the ongoing trial of the 1971 war criminals, Foreign Minister Dipu Moni said yesterday.

"We don't have any pressure from the outside, but lobbyists from all over the world are being appointed at the expense of huge money," she said, replying to a question at a press briefing at the foreign ministry.

Dipu Moni also said an external and internal machination was underway spending huge money to upset the trial.

"Domestically anarchy is being created...if there has not been enormous evil effort, the Skype conversation [of a war crimes tribunal chief], be it true or false, would not come."

In reply to another question whether the trial would be questioned after the disclosure of the Skype conversation, the minister said the tribunal had been conducting its proceedings fairly and transparently maintaining international stanthe proceedings. Moreover, she said, the International

Crimes (Tribunals) Act 1973 had been standardised through amendments and with advices from the UN. So there is no · scope of questioning the trial process at . home or abroad, she said. On another question about US official

## Use water, gas, power sensibly

PM urges Dhaka residents

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged Dhaka city dwellers to be more judicious in using water, gas, electricity and other civic amenities considering the scarcity of the natural resources.

"There should be no misuse...it is the demand of time," she said while addressing a function over the inauguration of Sayedabad Water Treatment Plant Phase-2 at the plant premises.

With the plant's inauguration, the Wasa supply line will have an additional 22.50 crore litres of safe drinking water every day.

"The judicious use of water will also lead to reduced bills for the users and help them save money...there should be more campaign by Wasa to create awareness in this regard," said Hasina.

Voicing her optimism to create a livable Dhaka, she commended Dhaka Wasa's initiative to preserve rainwater and recharge groundwater.

Hasina said the Awami League government took Sayedabad Water Treatment Project in 1996 and started implementing the project in three phases.

The second phase, work of which started in 2010, was inaugurated yesterday, six months ahead of schedule.

Phase-2 of the project was implemented costing Tk 1,140 crore with Danida of Denmark contributing 68 percent of the total cost, excluding the cost of land.

Svend Olling announced that his government would provide US\$ 100 million for the project's 3rd phase.

Hasina mentioned that the government plans to set up water treatment plants at Josholdia near Mawa Ghat to use water from the Padma while at Khilkhet near the Meghna to reduce dependency on groundwater.

As the water of the rivers surrounding the city are basi-

cally the sources of water for most of the treatment plants in Dhaka, the government is removing wastes from the beds of those rivers to ensure contamination-free water. Besides, a project has been undertaken to bring water

from the Jamuna River to increase the flow of rivers surrounding Dhaka city during the dry season. LGRD Minister Syed Ashraful Islam chaired the func-

tion where State Minister for LGRD and Cooperatives Jahangir Kabir Nanak and Dhaka Wasa Board Chairman Md Rahmatullah and Managing Director Taqsem A Khan also spoke.
