BPL auction on Dec 20

The second edition of the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL), which is scheduled to begin on January 17 and hold the players' auction on December 20, will go ahead despite the fact of non-payment to players in the league's first edition.

In a press conference at the Sher-e-Bangla National Cricket Stadium yesterday, Afzal Rahman Sinha, chairman of the BPL's Governing Council, stated that the committee wanted 'to get the ball rolling' since the board wouldn't get a free slot to host the competition later in the season.

He further claimed that while the irregularities with regard to payment of the foreign players have been resolved, payment to all the local players though hasn't yet been completed. The board has provided the franchises with yet another deadline -- December 30 -- to clear the dues.

"We will definitely solve the disputes with the franchises, but as of now the tournament has to go on," said Sinha. "We have been given the responsibility [to organise the tournament] just around 10-12 days back and that time is not enough to organise a league," he added.

Meanwhile, the league might also witness an additional team this year. "Event management company Game On is handling the new team's auction. We will probably get it finalised tomorrow [Saturday]. As the seventh team we will bring on board Rangpur," said IH Mallick, member-secretary of the council.

In another change in the rules of the league, the governing council has decided that no employee of the board would be allowed to be a part of the teams. "There can't be any direct involvement, the coach, board's physio or even the selectors; none can be a part of any team," informed Sinha.

Furthermore, members of the governing council

Action after goalless draw

The insecurity of footballers and football officials was once again nakedly exposed as rowdy fans injured a coach and two Bangladesh Football Federation officials at the Bangabandhu National Stadium last evening. The incident took place after the end of the Grameenphone Premier League encounter between defending champions Abahani and contenders Sheikh Jamal which ended in a goalless draw. As the Sheikh Jamal coach Joseph Afusi was making his way to the press conference room, he was struck by a piece of brick on his head. Minutes later BFF's media

manager Ashikur Rahman Habibe Rabbi and BFF executive Mohibul Islam were physically assaulted inside the field by some Abahani supporters who had entered through the fences from the VIP galleries. Police finally stepped in to rescue the BFF officials.

The incident once again revealed the insecure condition of the BNS as only two months ago, Mohannedan coach Saiful Bari Titu was also assaulted by some of his club's supporters during the Grameenphone Federation Cup.

Fortunately for Afusi, the injury was not that serious as he confirmed over phone after the incident. "It was a minor cut and did not need any stitch and fast-aid was enough. But this is very unwanted and unfortu-

nate incident and it is harmful for Bangladesh football. Football means and requires respect to the opponents," said Afusi who, along with his captain, refrained from attending the press conference following the incident.

Afusi's opposite number Ardeshir Pournemati was of the same sentiment and felt things should be taken care of by the authorities.

"It is not acceptable. He (Afusi) came from abroad to help your football and you (spectators) should control yourself," said the Abahani coach at the press conference.

"However, it is not our job to control the spectators rather it is a job of police or the officials of game's governing body," Ardeshir added.

James Anderson took three wickets to put England in control after Day Two of the final Test against India in Nagpur yesterday.

The paceman bowled both Virender Sehwag (0) and Sachin Tendulkar (2) and had Gautam Gambhir (37) caught behind.

Off-spinner Graeme Swann dismissed Cheteshwar Pujara (26) as India closed on 87-4, still 243 runs behind England, who lead the series 2-1.

Joe Root scored a patient 73 and Graeme Swann smashed 56 to help England to 330 all out on a slow, low wicket.

Having reached that score from their overnight total of 199-5, England's bowlers were in an ideal position to apply some pressure on the Indian batsmen.

And, like so many other times before in this series, the home side duly crumbled.

The pitch offered little seam, swing or spin for the Indian bowling, but as soon as Anderson got the new ball in his hand he immediately had India in trouble.

First he got one to come back in and bowl Sehwag, then he returned later in the evening session to nip one back into Tendulkar.

Finally, he got one to shape away from Gambhir, who went for an expansive cover drive and got a faint edge behind to Matt Prior.

However Anderson will also be grateful for the intervention of Swann after he broke up a promising 58-run partnership between Gambhir and Pujara to hand England the momentum.

It was a superb, diving catch by Ian Bell that brought about the end of Pujara's innings, but the batsman will be disappointed after replays

showed the ball may not have hit his glove on the way to short leg.

Swann's wicket capped a superb individual day for the off-spinner, who scored his first Test half-century since 2009 in typically belligerent style.

He came to the crease after Prior had played down the wrong line to Ravichandran Ashwin -- the wicketkeeper being bowled for a valuable 57 to end a potentially match-changing 103-run partnership with debutant Root -- and Tim Bresnan was pinned in front by Ishant Sharma for a second-ball duck.

Root continued where he left off on the first day, as he showed a solid defence while keeping the scoreboard moving. He looked assured and confident from the first ball of the day and his gritty knock was complemented by Swann's stroke play -- the Nottinghamshire man hitting six fours and two sixes in his breezy innings.

BCB CONSTITUTION

BDDSOC protests NSC amendment

The Bangladesh District and Divisional Sports Organisers' Council (BDDSOC) condemned and protested the amended constitution of the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) ahead of the country's most affluent sports body's election.

The council organised a press conference yesterday at the conference room of National Sports Council (NSC) to clear their stand against the amended constitution. They alleged that the NSC approved the BCB constitution unlawfully while another organisation named Dhaka Premier Division Club Samity (DPDC) in a press conference at a local hotel thanked the NSC, State Minister for Youth and Sports Ahad Ali Sarkar and BCB president Nazmul Hassan Papon for the amended constitution.

"Some amendments have been made as per guideline in the BCB constitution's (2008 amended) clause 26 and these were approved in the board's extraordinary general meeting on March 1 this year after several executive committee meetings had already given their green signals. But unfortunately the chairman of the NSC on November 29, 2012 unilaterally approved the constitution of which some clauses and sub-clauses are in contrary with the one that the BCB sent on November 26, 2012," said a statement of the BDDSOC.

The council also raised questions about the way the constitution had been amended and forming of the ad-hoc committee to run the board.

Ashiqur Rahman Miku, secretary general of the organisation, read out the long statement at the press conference where they also informed that they tried their best to communicate with the NSC chairman and BCB president to discuss these issues, all in vain.

They condemned the clause in which it's stated, the BCB president will be elected by the directors instead of councillors which they believe is in contrary with the
