Bogra DB recovers 5 hijacked automobiles

The Detective Branch (DB) of police has recovered five hijacked vehicles--three microbuses and two private cars--and rounded up four men of the gang, raiding different places in Pabna and Bogra between December 8 and December 13.

The gang had hijacked the vehicles either disguising as clients of car renters or as law enforcers, said Officer-in-Charge of DB (Bogra) Mizanur Rahman.

He said the arrested snatchers told detectives that they rented car or microbus first and hijacked those in far away and lonely places by forcing the drivers, sometimes using torture, and doping them.

A victim, Nayeb Ali, 36, owner of Bismillah Rent-a-Car in Bogra, said some unidentified people rented his microbus and took it to Natore on November 21 They fed the driver drug-laced food en route and fled with the microbus, he added.

It has not been recovered yet.

The DB official said sometimes the gang members impersonated police personnel posing with walkietalkies. They used to signal to stop vehicles and told the drivers to come to a nearby police station with their papers, he said. When they came, the carjackers fled with the vehicle, he added.

The carjacking ring has more than a hundred members and is operating all over the country.

Police said the snatchers changed the number plates and registration documents, bribing some corrupt officials of Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA).

An arrestee told the DB how they managed to have a new number plate and new registration number bribing BRTA officials for one of the three seized microbuses they had hijacked in Bogra in May 2010.

OC Mizanur Rahman said they were trying to crack the carjacking ring soon and hoped that police could recover more snatched vehicles.

Police are applying new technology to track down the gang of snatchers, said Superintendent of Police (SP) of Bogra Mozzammel Haque.

Speakers at a discussion yesterday demanded a ban on the use of mercury in dental amalgam in the country.

They called for mass awareness and formulation of an integrated national policy to check the use of this toxic compound in dental and health care. Environment and Social Development Organisation

held the discussion in the capital's Jatiya Press Club on Thursday, said a press release. Mercury is emerging as a major threat to human health

and environment, and exposure to it weakens the body's immune system and causes damage to brain, kidney and skin, said speakers.

World Alliance for Mercury-free Dentistry President Charlie Brown and Bangladesh Dental Society President Md Ashraf Hussain also addressed the programme.

PM tells foreign friends

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday expressed her steadfast resolve to live up to the expectation of the international community by upholding the principles and values of equity, democracy, social justice, inclusive development and rule of law for which Bangladesh was born 41 years ago.

The world acknowledges Bangladesh as a country where moderation and tolerance are practiced, she said.

"We are steadfast in our endeavour to live up to your expectations and turn Bangladesh into a country that you had envisioned while extending your support in 1971," she added.

The prime minister was addressing a gala ceremony of conferring the 'Bangladesh Liberation War Honour' and 'Friends of Liberation War Honour' to foreign friends and institutions for their outstanding contribution to the country's liberation war.

A total of 60 individuals and two institutions were given the honour at a function at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre in this phase under a plan taken by the government in 2011 to honour more than 500 foreign friends and institutions.

The prime minister availed the occasion as an opportunity to extend the country's Victory Day greetings to the foreign friends.

"Bangladesh will celebrate the

41st anniversary of its Victory Day tomorrow, which marks the victory for foreign friends as well," she said yesterday.

"On this occasion, we are offering

you, the nation's deepest sense of gratitude for what you have done towards attainment of statehood by Bangladesh." "Our tribute epitomises the senti-

ment of an indebted nation, love of its people and it's the manifestation of how deeply we value our friendship," she said.

Hasina said this grand congregation exemplifies the strength and beauty of amity. "This is also a rare opportunity for

our people particularly the young generation to know and learn about their foreign friends and unsung heroes, many of whom worked behind the scene for our independence," she said. The support of the foreign friends

came at a critical juncture when the country's freedom-loving innocent people were trying to ward off the wrath of a ruthless modern occupation army, Hasina said. "Our fault, we stood up against

discrimination and fought for a just cause, self-determination," she said. It was immensely emboldening to

find the majority of the world community on our side in our trying time, Sheikh Hasina said. "We knew that we were not alone,

The contribution of foreign friends is immeasurable and it cannot be repaid, Hasina said adding that it was purely a selfless act which would serve as glaring examples for the humanity and the posterity.

"It would not have mattered anything to many of you had Bangladesh not become independent. Still you stepped forward, provided us moral, spiritual and material support. You simply listened to your heart, rose in protest against the atrocities perpetrated by the occupation army," she maintained.

INDO-BANGLA LAND BOUNDARY DEAL

New Delhi talking to parties for consensus on ratification

New Delhi is engaged in negotiations with political parties to reach a consensus for parliamentary ratification of the crucial Land Boundary Agreement signed with Bangladesh, visiting Indian law Minister Ashwani Kumar said vesterday.

"The external affairs minister [Salman Khurshid] is in extensive discussion with the political parties to reach an agreement for the ratification," he told the news agency on the sidelines of a ceremony to honour the foreign friends of the Liberation War.

"We are very hopeful that the issue will be resolved very soon," he said as asked if the current session of Indian parliament by the end of this year.

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could ratify the treaty, a long outstanding issue of bilateral ties.


The Indian minister was in Dhaka to receive an honour on behalf of his father late Shree Prabodh Chandra for his support to Bangladesh in the 1971 war.

He was admitted to the hospital following a cardiac arrest a few days ago, said family sources. He left behind his


age of 72.
