Tiny Sandals

I saw them for the first time near Dhaka's Suhrawardy Udyan on Victory Day, 2011 as I was walking from Art Institute towards the TSC. Arranged for sale on the sidewalk, they shimmered like exotic jewels in winter's amber afternoon sunlight: tiny but realistic sandals, full of colour and style. The largest sandals were about an inch long; smaller ones fit on my fingernail. I wanted to speak with the seller, but there were several customers waiting for their turn. Reluctant to interfere with his sales, I took some quick photographs and kept walking. When I returned after half an hour, the vendor and his offerings were gone.

Exactly a year later - on Victory Day last week - I saw those sandals again at the same place. This time I waited and talked with the seller between customers.

Abdus Salam has been making toy sandals for ten years. He sells them during the winter fairs and festivals. A pair costs around 30 Taka. The sandals are made of foam and assembled from ten different parts.

While we were chatting, a customer stopped by, looked at the shoes and pondered. "But... but what practical use are they?" he asked, confused. "You buy them because they are fun," replied Salam. A few minutes later, a group of college girls stopped by and picked up a few pair. Salam says he does good business

on Bangla New Year's Day (Pohela Boishakh), as well as other fairs and festivities. On New Year's he sets up shop near the Art Institute and sells up to 20,000 Taka worth of tiny shoes.

Who buys them? Mostly young people, says Salam. Sometimes a couple stops by and the shoes bring a smile to the girl's face. The boy then buys a pair for her. It certainly makes for an unusual gift.

Salam learned the craft from his master. He used to work in a shoe factory in Bongshal where his *Ustad* taught him how to make real shoes and sandals. But after a few years, he learned how to make these toy shoes, which have become his source of earning.

This year, Salam has added several new items. They are colourful sandal-shoes which can be worn by children. Sized for one- to five-year-olds, they sit next to his toy shoes. On Victory Day, expecting bumper business, he has brought along his son-in-law, Zohirul Islam, to help with the selling.

This brought up the matter of his family. Salam has two sons, two daughters and three grandchildren and lives with his family in Bikrampur.

The next time you are attending festivities in town, you might want to keep your eyes open for Salam's creative offerings.

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Stronger Indo-Bangla ties urgent for dev

Speakers tell seminar

Bangladesh-India relations must be strengthened even more for the greater interest of the two countries' development in economy and culture, said speakers at a seminar yesterday.

Terming India a true friend of Bangladesh, they urged the country's policymakers and diplomats to remove "anti-India mindsets" and formulate a master plan for the betterment of relations.

The seminar, "Bangladesh-India Relations: Reality and Prospects", was organised by Bangladesh-India Maitri Samity at Theatre Institute, Chittagong.

Recalling India's role in the 1971 Liberation War, they alleged that some "ill-desires" of the country's politicians at times attempted to break up the friendly relations.

Ensuring rapid development requires Bangladesh to maintain sound relations

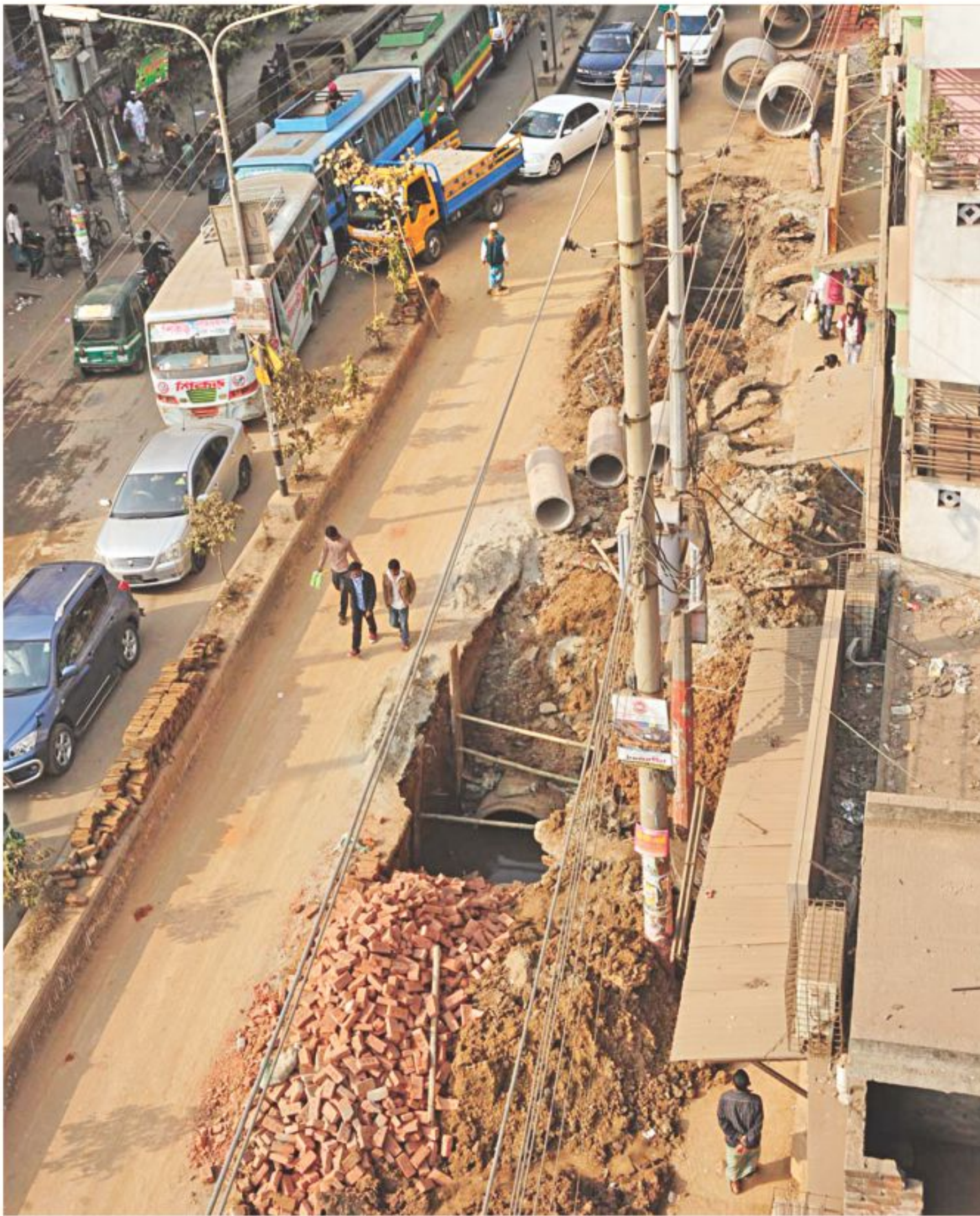
with India as Bangladesh's development in the economic, cultural and educational sectors, historically, was in some ways dependent on India.

Development spills over to neighbouring countries and so Bangladesh must not avoid India, one of the fastest growing countries and an emerging economic superpower, they added.

The speakers suggested the governments and policymakers to discard arguments and inconsistencies and think of working in collaboration to build a prosperous subcontinent.

Prof Emeritus Dr Jamal Nazrul Islam of Chittagong University (CU) chaired the programme where Assistant Prof Mohammad Sajjadur Rahman of CU international relations department presented a keynote.

Premier University Vice Chancellor Dr Anupom Sen and Indian Assistant High Commissioner in Chittagong Somnath Ghosh also spoke at the event.

Two 'outlaws' arrested in Pabna

Police arrested two alleged activists of an outlawed party from Failana village in Chatmohar upazila of Pabna on Thursday night.

The arrested persons Md Shaheb Ali, 30, and Shahed Ali, 26, of the village, are the operatives of Nokshal Bahini, police said.

Acting on a tip off, police raided Failana area at that night and arrested them from a residence of the village, said Md Habibur Islam, officer-in-charge of Chatmohar Police Station.

The two are listed criminals and accused in six cases, the OC said adding that they were sent to jail yesterday morning.

Man held with fake Indian notes

Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB) arrested a man with counterfeit Indian notes worth Rs 16.93 lakh from Satrosia village under Shibganj upazila in Chapainaabganj yesterday.

Lt Col Monzurul Alam, commanding officer of 9 BGB Battalion, said they arrested Mohammad Jewel, 27, with the currencies after raiding his house around 4:00pm.

Jewel was involved in the trading of counterfeit Indian notes, and kept those for smuggling to India, he said.

A case was filed with Shibganj Police Station in this connection.

Mob beats robber to death

A mob beat an alleged robber to death at Madhya-Charogram village in Singair upazila yesterday.

The dead is Harun, 45, son of Minhaj Uddin of Manta village of sadar upazila.

Quoting locals, police said 10 to 12 robbers entered the house of Monsher Ali around 2:00am.

Sensing their presence, locals rushed in and caught Harun while his cohorts managed to flee.

The villagers handed Harun over to police after a mass beating. He was first rushed to Singair Upazila Health Complex and later shifted to Dhaka Pongu Hospital where he died around

Dipu Moni meets Thai premier

Foreign Minister Dipu Moni yesterday met visiting Thai Prime Minister Yingluck Shinawatra and discussed various issues relating to the mutual interests of the two friendly nations.

During the meeting, held at Shinawatra's hotel lounge, they also discussed potential areas of cooperation between the two Asian countries.

Talking to reporters after the meeting, Dipu Moni said, "All issues will be discussed tomorrow [today] during official talks between the two prime ministers -- Sheikh Hasina and Yingluck Shinawatra."

The foreign minister said two memorandums of understanding are expected to be signed today between the two countries on cooperation in agriculture sector and foreign secretary-level regular talks.

Shinawatra, Thailand's first female prime minister, reached Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport at 5:30pm yesterday.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina received Shinawatra at the airport.

Today, Shinawatra will visit National Memorial in Savar to show respect to Bangladesh's war heroes.

CTG RAILWAY STATION

Operational capacity to double

Chittagong Railway Station's operational capacity is expected to nearly double after its remodelling project is completed in October 2013, said the manager of the project's implementing firm yesterday.

Every day over 20 more trains will be able to arrive and depart from the station. At present 44 trains go through the station every day, said Md Ibrahim Khalilulla, project manager of the firm, Max Automobile Products Limited (MAPL), Bangladesh.

Moreover, three new railway tracks will be laid and one will be renovated, taking the total number of

operational tracks to 10, he told The Daily Star.

Under the Chittagong Railway Station Yard Remodelling Project, the station will also have a new platform and adjoining shed and a 250-car parking space while its crossings and signalling system will be replaced, said officials engaged with the project.

Bangladesh Railway (BR) is implementing the three-year project while the government and Japan International Co-operation Agency are providing the finance, Tk 226.46 crore.

The renovation will create ample space for accommodating the increased flow of trains during a post-derailment scenario, said the

station's Manager AA Shamsul Alam recently.

Every day around 30,000 passengers and 16 intercity trains, 10 mail and express trains and 18 local trains go through the station, said BR sources.

On a visit to the station on December 13, Railways Minister Mujibul Hoque said, "I requested the officials concerned to complete the project as soon as possible."

Around 25 percent of the project has been completed till date, said BR General Manager (eastern zone) Md Tafazzal Hossain yesterday, adding that the renovation is one of the five components of Dhaka-Chittagong Railway Development Project.

Founder chair visits JBFH

The founder chairman of Japan Bangladesh Friendship Hospital (JBFH), Dr Sigeru Suganami, visited the hospital in the capital yesterday.

Renowned physicians of the country, staff of JBFH, and reputed pharmaceutical company representatives received him on the hospital premises in Dhanmondi.

Incumbent JBFH Chairman Prof Jonaid Shafiq and Managing Director Prof Sarder A Nayeem handed over a crest to Dr Suganami. It was these three Bangladeshi and Japanese physicians with whom JBFH came into existence, says a press release.

In 1987, Dr Sarder A Nayeem went to Japan to attend Tokyo University. It was when he dreamt of JBFH. He shared his dream with Dr Jonaid Shafiq, a young Bangladeshi physician, also living in Tokyo, but they needed someone to bring their dream to reality. It was Dr Suganami who stepped forward.

The presently 100-bed JBFH was inaugurated in 1993.

During his reception, Dr Suganami lauded JBFH as it is serving not only people in Dhaka but also people outside it.
