

Tazreen Fire Punish responsible persons

Demand speakers

Speakers at a rally in the capital yesterday demanded that the government brings the responsible persons including Tazreen Fashion's owner to book and punishes them for the deadly fire which killed 112 garment workers on November 24.

Their other demands include making of a proper list of the killed and injured persons; ensuring necessary treatment to the injured workers and compensation on the basis of "loss of earning"; and taking steps to ensure safe workplaces in the country's garment factories, said a press release.

The speakers were addressing the rally organised by National Garment Workers Federation (NGWF) in front of the Jatiya Press Club.

The probe committee, formed to investigate the blaze at the garment factory, released their report identifying some Tazreen's employees and its owner as responsible for the fire, they said.

Although the committee recommended taking legal action, none of them have been arrested yet, they added.

With NGWF President Amirul Haque Amin in the chair, NGWF General Secretary Safia Parvin and Workers' Party of Bangladesh General Secretary Anisur Rahman Mallik, among others, spoke.

BGB detains two Indians

Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB) yesterday detained two Indian nationals near Doikhowa border in Hatibandha of Lalmonirhat when they entered Bangladesh illegally.

They are Nipin Chondro Bormon, 38, and Nikhil Chondro Roy, 36, of Cooch Behar of Paschim Banga.

Lt Col Mehedi Hasan, commanding officer of 31 BGB Battalion, said BGB would hand over the detainees if Indian Border Security Force returned the two Bangladeshi farmers whom they picked up near the border yesterday and on Tuesday.

Mob beats 4 cohorts of robber Nizam

A mob beat up four suspected robbers and cohorts of robber ringleader Nizam at Kaladorap in Hatiya upazila of Noakhali last night after hearing his death in 'shootout'.

The suspected robbers were Joyal, 35, Md Seraj, 45, Fayej Akerani, 50, and Belal, 30.

Witnesses said following the death news of the robber ringleader, locals raided the area of 'Nizam Bahini' and beat them indiscriminately.

At one stage, the four got unconscious and the locals informed police of the matter. Later, police arrested the alleged robbers.

Swapan Kumar Bhowmik, in-charge of Naler Char Police Camp, said the four were sent to the court yesterday.

Nizam, 35, son of M Ruhul Amin, a resident of Shiba village in Ramgati upazila of Laxmipur, was killed in a 'shoot-out' with Rab at Charbata village in Subarnachar upazila of Noakhali early Thursday.

Three cars damaged in fire, explosion

The gas cylinder of a car kept in an open car park of EPI Bhaban in the capital's Mohakhali exploded after the car and an adjoining one caught fire yesterday.

The explosion could be heard in a half a kilometre radius, shattering glass windows and ripping off chunks of plaster from an adjacent building and damaging a third car in the car park, said witnesses.

However, no injury was reported.

Quoting locals, Fire Service and Civil Defence Director (operations) Maj Muhammad Mahboob suspected that a saloon car caught fire in the parking lot

around 6:00pm and the fire spread to an adjoining four-wheel drive.

The flames went up at least 40 feet into the air and, at one stage, one of the saloon car's two gas cylinders exploded. None was injured as the EPI Building was closed due to the day being a weekly holiday, he said.

Ten fire fighting units doused the fire around 6:30pm, he added.

Officer-in-Charge Bhuiyan Mahbub Hasan of Banani Police Station said they were investigating to confirm whether the fire on the government cars was an accident or intentionally lit.

IEB poll Monday

The biennial election to the Institute of Engineers, Bangladesh (IEB) will be held on Monday, with around 18,500 engineers from across the country expected to cast their ballots to elect a 10-member executive committee for the next two years.

The voting will take place at 45 centres and sub-centres across the country from 9:00am to 5:00pm. It will elect a president, a general secretary, four vice presidents, and four assistant secretaries of the IEB.

Candidates from two unofficial panels--Bangabandhu Prokashali Parishad backed by the Awami League and Association of Engineers Bangladesh (AEB) backed by the opposition BNP and Jamaat--will contest in the poll.

The pro-AL president candidate is Shamim Z Bashunia. No-one will vie for the post from the rival panel as Bashunia, who was primarily an AEB candidate, has joined the AL-backed panel in a last moment drama. An independent candidate, Dr MA Kasem, will contest against Bashunia.

On the other hand, three candidates will vie for the general secretary post. The AL backs Nuruzzaman, while the opposition panel's candidate is Miah Muhammad Quayyum. The third general secretary candidate, Sirajul Alam Swapan, will contest independently.

Meanwhile, AEB President ANH Akhtar Hossain complained that incumbent IEB President Nurul Huda had violated the IEB constitution by introducing the pro-AL candidates at a programme at the Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet) on December 2. Nurul Huda however denied the allegation.

Chairman of Central Election Commission Md Khizir Khan said they received the complaint but it was not possible for them to take action against it due to time constraint.

Woman, daughter die as train hits them

A woman and her four-year-old daughter were killed as a train ran them over on Joydevpur-Rajshahi route in Bhannara area of Kaliakoir upazila in Gazipur district yesterday afternoon.

The identities of the victims could not be known immediately.

Witnesses said, taking the girl on the lap, the woman, aged around 32, was standing on the railway tracks in the area at about 1:45pm.

When the Rajshahi bound train 'Nilshagar' was approaching, the nearby people raised a hue and cry asking them to move. As the woman did not do so, the train finally crushed them, killing them instantly.

Sub-inspector Azhar, in-charge of Joudevpur Railway Police, said the woman along with her daughter committed suicide under the wheels of the train in Gate No-12 area. Police recovered the bodies.

Stop fair on playground

Demand green activists

Speakers at a human chain yesterday demanded an end to the month-long fair held on the Banani Chairmainbari playground for the sake of psychological and physical growth of children.

They said while open spaces and playground from the cityscape are diminishing fast and the prime minister is asking for adequate playground, the fair occupying the Banani playground is being held right under the nose of the administration.

Poribesh Bachao Andolon (Poba), Architect Alumni Association of Buet, Banani Society, Banani Chairmainbari House Owners Association and Nabarun Shangkha jointly organised the programme on the playground, said a press release.

The fair is hampering children's sports and is depriving the elderly from their exercise space, the speakers said.

They added that it has become imperative to ensure adequate playgrounds and open-spaces in every locality to help flourish children's physical and mental health and entertainment of the elderly people.

Mentioning the high frequency of earthquakes in Dhaka, they said there should be enough open-space in the city so that people can stay safe during earthquakes.

They urged authorities concerned not to give permission to hold any programmes like jatras or fairs on playgrounds.

Abdus Salam, vice president of Banani Society, and architect Sajjadur Rashid, president of Architect Alumni Association of Buet, spoke among others.
