DEEP-SEA PORT CONSTRUCTION

China reiterates willingness to help

Chinese Ambassador in Dhaka Li Jun yesterday reiterated his country's willingness to help construct a deep-sea port in Bangladesh and enhance connectivity with his country while Bangladeshi experts suggested Beijing's engagement in exploration and providing security in the Bay.

"Our government will provide its all supports especially in infrastructure, trade and investment for the benefit of both the countries," he said.

He was addressing a seminar, "Bangladesh-China cooperation and the security dimension of the Bay of Bengal", organised by Centre for East Asia Foundation in the capital's Cirdap Auditorium.

Li Jun said Beijing was ready to extend cooperation in constructing the deep-sea port and the direct road link through Myanmar to "accelerate economic progress of the region".

"Bangladesh is an important neighbouring country for China. As both Bangladesh and China are developing

countries, there are enormous prospects of the existing ties between the two nations," he said.

Presenting a keynote, Bangladesh Political Science Association President Prof Dr Ataur Rahman said Bangladesh-China relations had strategically assumed a new level of significance.

This was due to Bangladesh's location in the Bay and the growing importance of the seas for security and development of both countries, he said.

The experts said Bangladesh could be a lucrative investment destination for China, the world's second largest economic power, due to its cheap labour costs and urged both governments to take long-term policy approaches to reduce trade gaps.

Former Bangladesh Bank governor Dr Saleh Uddin Ahmed moderated the seminar. Former adviser to a caretaker government Dr Iftekhar Ahmed Chowdhury, former army chief Lt Gen (retd) Mahbubur Rahman and former ambassador Munshi Faiz Ahmed were present.

TUBERCULOSIS AMONG CHILDREN Better medical

facilities sought

Speakers at a discussion yesterday stressed that the country needs better medical facilities and human resources to detect and treat tuberculosis (TB) among children.

In order to lower child mortality rate, focus must be put on the treatment of child TB, they added. Brac, National Tuberculosis Control Programme,

Department of Health, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, and the daily Jugantar jointly organised the roundtable discussion at Brac Centre in the capital. Ten percent of all TB patients in the world are children

while 3 percent of all TB patients in Bangladesh are children, said Dr Mujibur Rahman, national programme consultant of National Tuberculosis Control Programme, while presenting the keynote presenta-He said detecting TB among children is harder than

detecting TB among grownups, as child TB does not show any specific symptoms. Moreover, the medical officials concerned lack ade-

quate training or skills to detect or treat TB patients.

The speakers said lack of adequate diagnostic facilities in the country is another hurdle in detecting child TB.

MD Humayun Kabir, senior secretary to Health and Family Welfare Ministry, while addressing as chief guest said the government is planning to set up a hospital in the capital to treat Multi Drug Resistant TB.

Two teens confess killing woman

Two teenage boys confessed before a Dhaka court on Friday to killing a woman by slitting her throat in the capital's Pallabi on December 8.

Police arrested Abdul Wadud, and his friend Arman Mollah on Thursday.

The victim was Tahura Bibi, 42.

In his confessional statements, Wadud said they planned to extract money from the house of one of their acquaintances Tahura, whose husband is an expatriate in Saudi Arabia.

"The boys came to the flat around 2:30pm when she was home alone. They spent few hours there, chatted with the lady and had food. At one stage, they killed her," said Shah Iftekhar Ahmed, assistant commissioner of Dhaka Metropolitan Police, quoting their confessional statements.

Later, they fled the scene. When Isra, Tahura's adopted daughter and a class VI student, came home she found the door locked. Police broke the door around 9:00pm, he added.

Wadud told the police that they only took Tk 2,000 from the house.

Lt Col (retd) Abdul Khaleque, chairman of Barguna Sadar upazila, said they were able to achieve nearly 90 percent of hygienic latrines in the upazila as they were successful in making common people understand the

importance of hygiene. Elena Ahmed, deputy country director of Plan Bangladesh, also addressed the seminar.

Corruption still prevalent in govt's upper layer: Muhith manifesto. Muhith also informed

Finance Minister AMA Muhith yesterday said corruption was still prevalent in the upper layer of the government but it was seeing a downward trend.

Corruption had gripped the last regime of the BNP-led alliance, when family members and lawmakers of the ruling parties had plundered huge amounts of public money, he said.

Corruption must come to a stop so that the country can move forward, he told an extended meeting of Sylhet sadar upazila unit Awami

League at a hotel in Sylhet city. Addressing as chief guest, Muhith

claimed that there had been no corruption in the Padma bridge project. However, there were initially some corruption conspiracies and the government had foiled those, he said.

The next parliamentary election will be held on time, in the coming year's December, under an interim government, formed after political parties reach a consensus on it, as per the constitution, he said.

Calling upon the party men to prepare for the election, he said the AL would join the polls with a better

that there might be some changes in the party's constitution at its December 29 council. The AL-led alliance already imple-

mented most of its election pledges, like initiating the war crimes trial, holding the trial of Bangabandhu's killers and making progress in education, health, agriculture and industry sectors, he said.

Lawmaker Shofiqur Rahman Chowdhury, the district AL President Abduj Jahir Chowdhury Sufian and the sadar upazila parishad Chairman Ashfaq Ahmed were present in the meeting.
