Another BCL man nabbed

Detectives nabbed yesterday another Bangladesh Chhatra League cadre, Emdadul Haque, identified as one of the killers of Bishwajit.

This raised to 11 the number of arrestees in the gruesome murder in the capital during the December 9 opposition-enforced blockade.

Test of brutes

Bishwajit murderers wanted to prove they were fit to be on

A group of BCL activists from Jagannath University had launched a brutal attack on a defenceless Bishwajit during an opposition blockade to show off strength to their leaders, organisation insiders say.

The rogues also had wanted to prove that they could tackle any "subversive activities".

They swooped on Biswajit, a tailor boy who was on his way to work, near Bahadur Shah Park in Old Dhaka, taking him for a problockade activist involved in a cocktail blast.

Critically injured, he died at Mitford Hospital.

"I actually told them [the activists] to slap Bishwajit and beat him

a little," JnU BCL President FM Shariful Islam told The Daily Star two days after the blockade. "But they lost their sense of propor-

He admitted asking the BCL followers to "teach the Shibir man a lesson", pointing at Biswajit, who was a Hindu by religion. There was hardly any possibility of his involvement with an Islamist organisation like Islami Chhatra Shibir, the student wing of Jamaate-Islam.

Wishing anonymity, another leader of the unit said, "We could not imagine they [the attackers] would beat him so hard."




The main opposition BNP expressed regret about the sufferings the day-long programme would cause to city residents.

"We are sorry for the inconvenience [to be caused due to the rallies], but I

believe city residents will cooperate with us," Abdus Salam, member secretary of Dhaka city unit BNP, said at a press briefing yesterday.

Abdullah Al Mahmud, joint commissioner (traffic), said the opposition's programme might disrupt traffic movement in the capital, but necessary measures have been taken to ease sufferings of commuters.

Uttara Bridge Project

Bid documents snatched

Victim points at minister's relative; denial follows; Rajuk to decide on re-tender today

The Rajuk authorities will decide today on whether to retender the Tk25-crore Uttara bridge project, as a gang of thugs snatched the bidding documents from one of the prospective bidders on Monday.

Backed allegedly by Abdus Salam Khan, proprietor of a bidder firm Padma Traders, the thugs snatched the bidding documents of Abdul Monem Ltd. Salam is a relative of Abdul Mannan Khan, state minister for public works.

The bridge will be built in Uttara 3rd phase, a residential area under development by Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha (Rajuk). The deadline for bidding passed on Monday.

Md Nurul Huda, chairman of Rajuk, said he would consider the overall situation before deciding on the issue today.

There is no legal bar to go ahead with the tender process if at least two bids are received, he mentioned.

The Rajuk chief claimed that the incident occurred outside of Rajuk premises and neither the victim nor any of his (victim's) officials had informed him about the incident until 2:30pm on Monday, when he left the office. Later he learnt of the incident from newsmen.

Law minister questions intention

The Turkish team stayed in Dhaka for five days and had meetings with the law minister, an adviser to the prime minister and a top leader of
