Mahmudullah fined heavily

Walton Central Zone captain Mahmudullah Riyad has been fined 20 per cent of his match fee for improper conduct on day one of the Bangladesh Cricket League match against Prime Bank South Zone at the Sher-e-Bangla National Cricket Stadium.

"Mahmudullah vented his displeasure by kicking the stumps while bowling in the 64th over of the day, an act which is a breach of code of conduct set for players and officials," stated a press release sent by the Bangladesh Cricket Board yesterday.

Match referee ASM Roquibul Hasaan imposed the penalty after the all-rounder accepted full responsibility for his behaviour.

Rony the difference

Abahani take solo lead with 2-0 win

Abahani to a 2-0 win over archrivals Mohammandan in the Grameenphone Bangladesh Premier League at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

Rony, playing for the starting eleven for the second time in six matches, struck a goal in each half to take Abahani to the top with 13 points from six matches, one ahead of Sheikh Russel KC and three clear of Mohammandan and Sheikh Jamal Dhamondi Club.

"I have been playing in the professional football league since its introduction but never scored against Mohammandan. I am really happy that I did it today which helped my team in winning the game," said Rony.

"I used to get a little too excited when it comes to finishing, but today [Friday] I kept my cool and availed the opportunities I got," said Rony.

Despite deploying five players in the midfield, Mohammandan could

hardly keep possession throughout the game and Ibrahim, who was absent in Abahani's 0-1 loss to Sheikh Russel, played the key role by unsettling Mohammandan's three-man backline numerous times.

Mohammandan struck together a few sporadic attacks and came close to erasing the lead in the 40th minute from a goalmouth-melee but Abahani captain Wali Faisal rescued his side by clearing a header from Mustapha Ibrahim off the line.

Mustapha was unlucky again as his bicycle kick on a Monir Munna free-kick went inches over the cross-piece, eight minutes into the second-half.

"The game was very important for the history associated with it. The boys understood my strategy and tactic what they could not do in the last match," said a smiling Abahani coach Ardesir Pournam.

"We conceded both goals due to mistakes from the defenders, who went charging early instead of holding their line," said Mohammandan's

Yuvraj levels the series for India

Yuvraj Singh cracked a dazzling 72 before the bowlers staged a brilliant recovery at the death overs as India clinched a nerve-wracking 11-run victory over archrivals Pakistan in the second T20 International to level the series 1-1 in Ahmedabad on Friday.

India posted a competitive 192 riding on Yuvraj's 36-ball knock that included seven huge sixes, and then restricted the visitors to 181 for seven with the bowlers finding their mojo just in the nick of time.

Paceman Ashok Dinda scalped three for 36 including the important wicket of rival captain Mohammed Hafeez (55) in the penultimate over to turn the tide in India's favour at the jam-packed Sardar Patel Stadium.

At one stage, Pakistan seemed to be well and truly on course to overhaul India's challenging target but Dinda and Ishant Sharma kept their cool during the death overs to seal the issue in hosts' favour.

Needing 20 runs off the final over bowled by Ishant, Umar Gul and Shoaib Malik could manage only eight runs much to the delight of the home crowd and captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni whose leadership has been under the scanner for some time now.

Apart from Hafeez, who scored his runs off only 26

Runs aplenty on Day 2

While the second day's play of the Bangladesh Cricket League at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium didn't quite produce an innings that could even remotely be compared to Ziaur Rahman's stunning 152 on the first, it did however, witness a fine display of batting from two youngsters, battling to break into the national team.

Half centuries from Shamsur Rahman (84) and Marshal Ayub (65 not out) dominated the match between Prime Bank South Zone and Walton Central Zone in Mirpur yesterday as the latter finished the day on 210 for 3.

The BCB North Zone continued to pile on the runs against Islami Bank East Zone, in the day's other game at the Shaheed Chandu Stadium in Bogra, as they finished the day on a staggering 499 for 6. Nasir Hossain, once again became a victim of the 'nervous nineties' as he fell seven runs short of a century. Another potential centurion, Naeem Islam, who had an overnight score of 50, was bowled out for 82.

Foggy conditions disrupted the morning sessions of the matches, as both the

games began after 1 pm.

Prime Bank South Zone vs Walton Central Zone

It was a 75-run, third wicket partnership between Shamsur and Marshal that steadied the ship for Central Zone after they were reeling at 72 for 2 at one point. While Rahman preferred the cut shot, Ayub was on the drive. The shot of the day, in fact, was scored by Marshal, as he went down the track to Murad Khan and found the gap between cover and mid-off, to reach his half-century. Shamsur, on the other hand, preferred taking the aerial route against the spinners as he hit four sixes against Shohag Gazi and Khan.

Shamsur's dismissal was followed by a quick 50-run partnership between captain Mahmudullah Riyad and Marshal, which came off just 45 balls. Earlier, the

HOCKEY CONSTITUTION AMENDMENT Proposal to be tabled today

The Bangladesh Hockey Federation (BHF) is going to amend its constitution in a bid to bar inexperienced organisers from running for key posts of general secretary and joint secretaries as the Constitution Amendment Committee has prepared their recommendations for today's adjourned meeting of the governing body.

According to the recommendations, general secretary candidates will have to have at least four year's involvement with the hockey federation to be eligible to contest in the polls while joint secretary candidates will need three years of involvement with the game's governing body.

The recommendations also included the cancellation of councillorship of the umpires committee and suspending the councillorships of the head of any sub-committee if the committee does not submit its expenditure within one and a half months of the completion of tournaments or leagues.

The BHF is currently run by an ad-hoc committee which was formed in November 2011 after most of the members of the then elected committee resigned from their respective posts at sports minister's request.

Referring to former non-technical and inexperienced general secretary Khandoker Jamiluddin, BHF joint secretary and member secretary of Constitution
