# Farmers expect bumper mustard production

Farmers and agriculture officials in several northern districts are expecting a bumper production of mustard this season.

Mustard cultivation is gaining more popularity among the farmers in Thakurgaon and Panchagarh districts as they got good yield as well as good price of the winter crop during last couple of years, reports our Thakurgaon correspondent.

The farmers have cultivated mustard on 10,470 hectares of land this season against the target of 9,300 hectares with the production target of 11,160 tonnes (1.20 tonnes per hectare) in Thakurgaon district, said officials of the Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE).

In Panchagarh, 1225 hectares of land have been brought under mustard cultivation against the target of 425 hectares with the production target of 50 tonnes, DAE sources said.

The farmers have cultivated mainly six varieties of mustard -- BARI Sharisha 9, BARI Sharisha 11, BARI Sharisha 14, BARI Sharisha 15, Tori 7 (local improved variety) and Bashori (Indian).

"Most of the mustard plants have already passed the pod formation stage.

They are now growing well and a bumper production is expected this season," said Zaherul Islam, crop production specialist of Thakurgaon DAE office.

Farmers have been suggested to spray 3/4 ML Melathion mixed with 1 litre water on the fields if there is aphid attack on the crops due to dense fog and severe cold, he said.

During this correspondent's recent visit to different areas of Sadar upazila in Thakurgaon and Boda upazila in Panchagarh, farmers said that they will start harvesting the crop in the second or third week on January.

Azizul Islam, 45, a farmer of Gobindapur village in Sadar upazila, said he cultivated mustard on one bigha (0.3306 acre) of land and made a profit of Tk 6,600 last year. He cultivated mustard on two bighas of land this season and expects a bumper production.

"Mustard cultivation, requiring only two times light irrigation, is easier and less costly than cultivation of other crops but returns much profit. It is done between the gap period of aman and boro paddy farming," said Sirazul Islam, 58, a sharecropper of Sahapara village under Boda upazila, who cultivated mustard on 1.5 bighas of land.

October to mid-November is the suitable time for mustard cultivation

and it takes 65/70 days to get the yield, said farmers and officials.

Our Pabna Correspondent adds: Farmers of the district are expecting bumper production of mustard this season as many of them have opted for mustard cultivation to recover losses of boro and aman paddy farming during the last two seasons.

Thirty thousand 347 hectares of land in Pabna district has been brought under mustard cultivation this year, DAE officials said.

"We expect production of 36 thousand 4 hundred 16 tonnes of mustard this season. Production will be even better if the weather remains favourable," Mostafizur Rahman, deputy director of AED, Pabna said.

But many farmers are now worried about the production due to the ongoing cold wave.

"To recover earlier losses in paddy farming I have cultivated mustard on five bighas of land this year and expected bumper production. But now I am worried due to dense fog and continuous cold wave," said Rumi Khandaker, a farmer of Dashuria village.

AI Shahin, a development officer of DAE, however, said, "Dense fog and cold wave will not threaten production as it will be gone within a few days."

## Nabinagar health complex upgraded in name only

Lacks manpower, furniture and equipment

Although the 30-bed Nabinagar upazila health complex was upgraded to 50-bed one about one and a half years ago, it could not be operational due to lack of manpower, furniture and equipment.

As a result, about five lakh residents of the upazila are being deprived of getting proper health services.

The new building was handed over to the health complex authorities after the health engineering department constructed it at a cost of Tk 6.80 crore last year.

After upgradation of the health complex, 10 consultant physicians, 19 medical officers, 15 nurses and eight office staff along with adequate operation equipment were supposed to work at the health centre.

But till date the necessary facilities for the 50-bed health complex were not increased, said local sources.

Two ambulances at the health complex also remained inoperative. Of them, one did not run in the last 16 years while the other out of order for last one month.

In the upazila, there are also eight sub-health centres

and 12 health and family planning welfare centres. At those health centres, there are only two doctors although they have 21 posts of physicians.

Upazila family planning officer Dr Mohammad Sadeq Mia told the news agency that their repeated appeals to the authorities concerned to solve the problems went unheeded.

## Top outlaw held with firearms

A top operative of an outlawed party was held with firearms in Santhia upazila under the district on Friday night.

Police identified the arrestee, Md Jamin Uddin, 40, son of Mofiz Uddin of village Alokdiar in the upazila, as the regional commander of outlawed Purba Banglar Communist Party (PBCP-Janajudhha faction).

Officer in-charge of Santhia police station Md Ekramul Haque said, acting on a tip off, a team of Pabna

police raided Dhulauri Bazar area at about 10 pm on Friday when Jamin along with his accomplices were moving suspiciously around the village.

During the drive, police caught Jamin while his accomplices managed to flee, the OC said.

Police recovered a light gun and four bullets from his possession, he said.

"Jamin is accused in a dozen of cases including three for murders. He was one of the most wanted criminals in the district, the OC added.

### Death anniversary observed

Monajat Uddin died in 1995 while on professional duty on a ferry boat in the River Padma in Gaibandha district. Born in June 18 of 1945 at Morneya village in Rangpur, he received a number of awards, including Ekushey Padak in 1997.

### Two held with firearms

Members of Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) and Detective Branch of police in separate drives arrested two alleged criminals and recovered two firearms and three bullets from their possession in Abhoynagar upazila and district town on Tuesday night. Police said, a team of Rab raided the town's bus stand area at 10:00pm and arrested a man along with a revolver and two bullets. The arrestee was identified as Shafiqul Islam Babu alias 'Polythene' Babu, son of Zihad Ali of the area. In Abhoynagar, detective police in a drive arrested an alleged criminal along with one shooter gun and one bullet from Ali Bazar area of the upazila on the same night. The arrestee was identified as Rony, son of Farhad Hossain of Kapashati village in the upazila.

### Man killed in Habiganj

Police recovered the body of an unidentified man, aged about 40, from near Olipur rail crossing on Dhaka-Sylhet highway in Habiganj Sadar upazila yesterday. The body was tied up with ropes and it bore marks of injuries on chest and other parts.

Police recovered the body and sent it to the Habiganj Sadar Hospital morgue for postmortem. Officer in-charge of Shaistaganj police station Nizam Uddin Chowdhury said, a general diary on unnatural death was registered. Criminals killed him and dumped the body at Olipur, since it is close to deep forest of Raghunandan hills, he said.

### Six gamblers held

### Shoe store gutted
