Ricky Ponting, the Australian batting legend, bid adieu to international cricket after a stellar 18-year career.



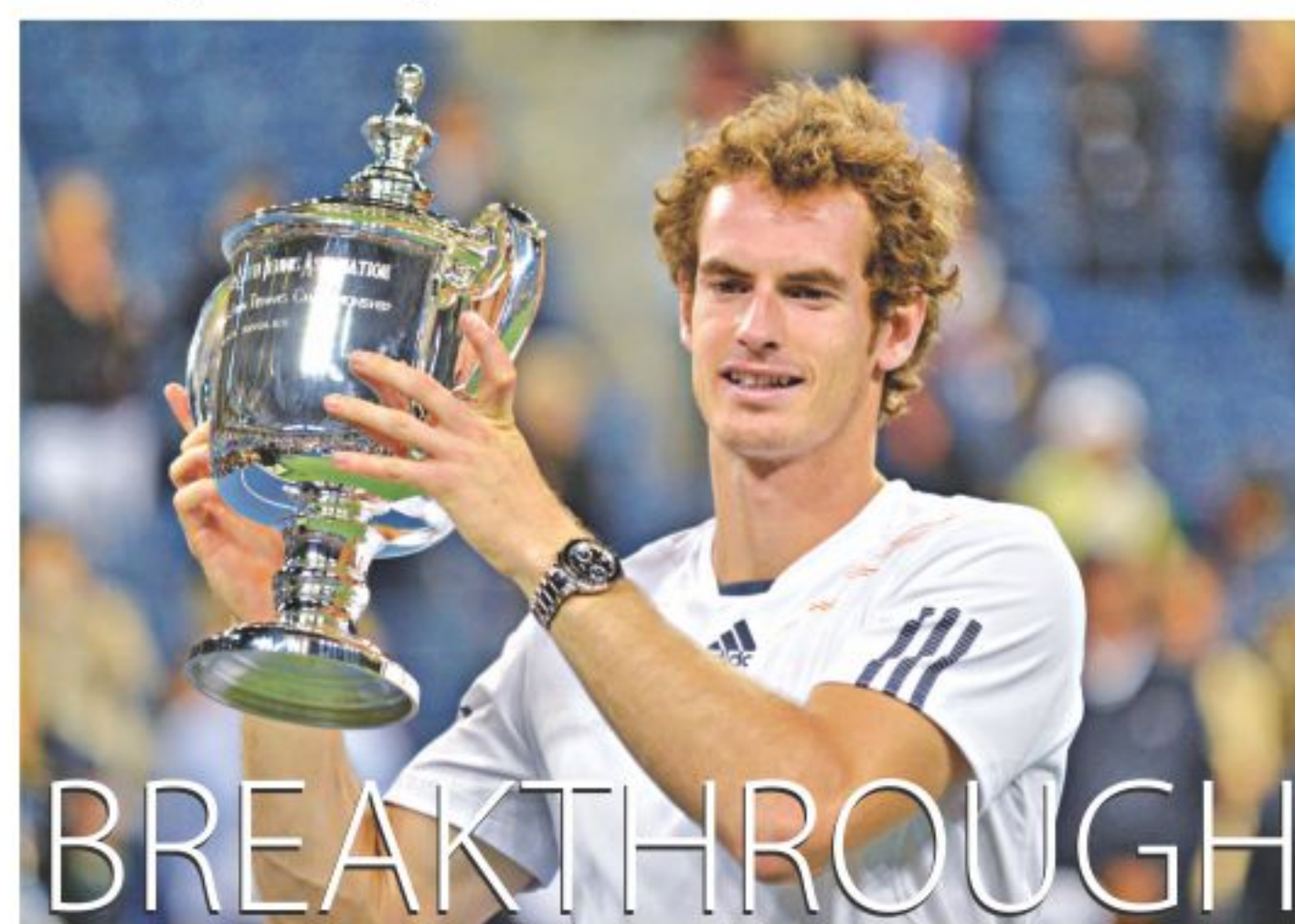
## INJURY HORROR

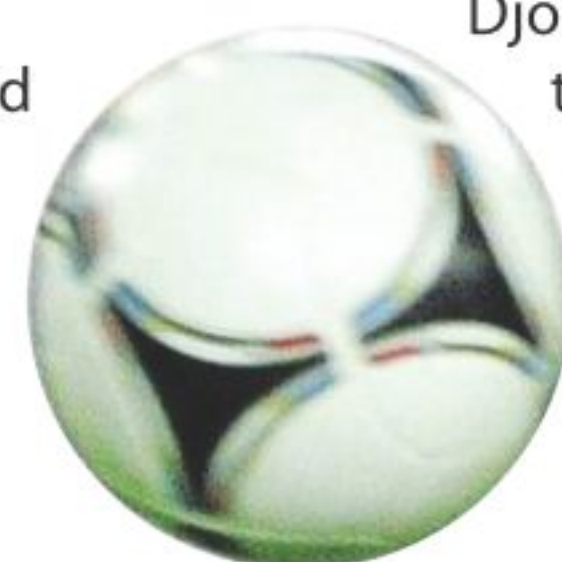
## DROGBA SPECIAL

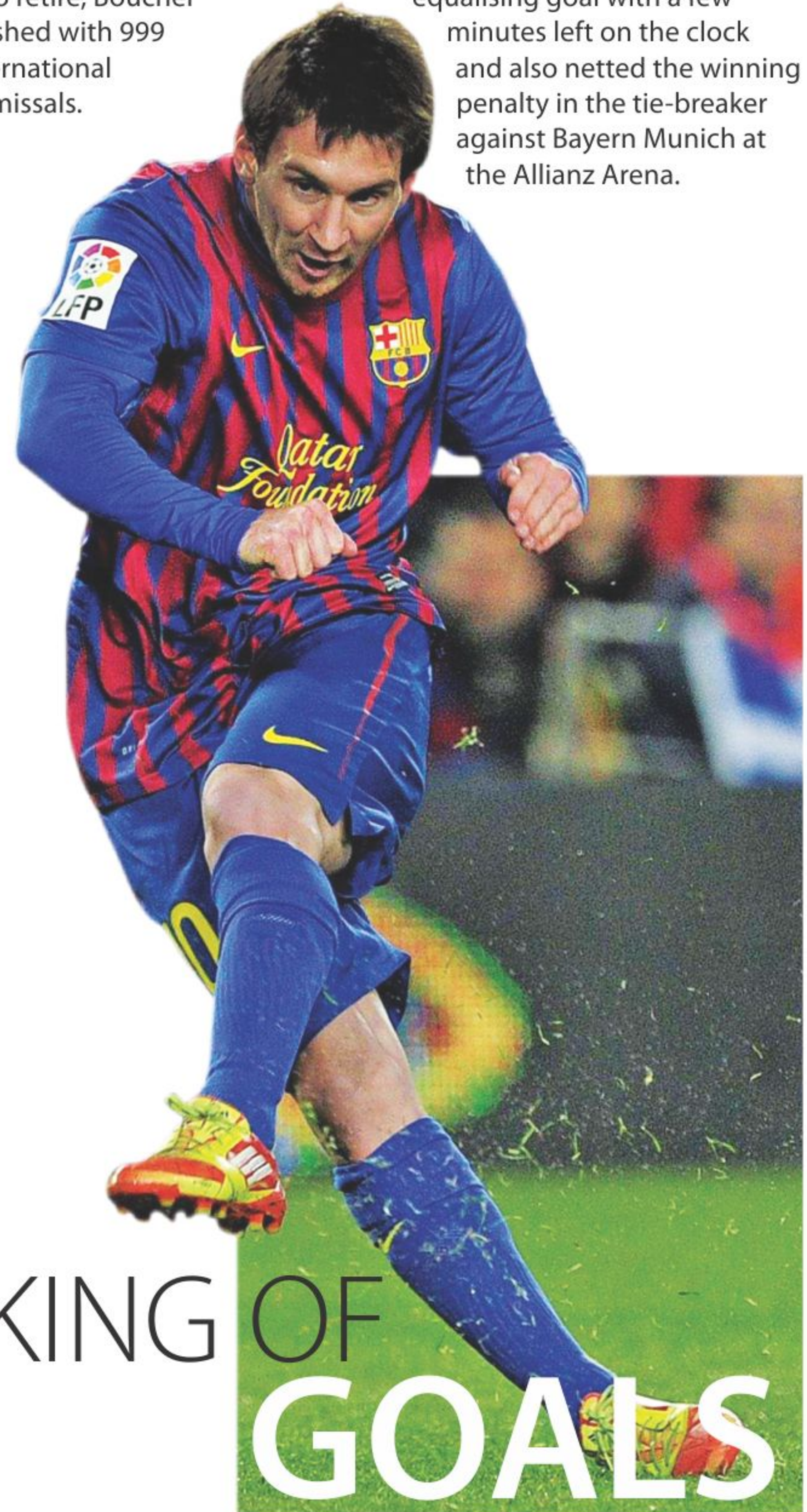
