Book on Bengal's economic history published

The publication ceremony of "An Economic History of Bengal (1757-1947)", a book written by prominent economic historian Prof M Mufakharul Islam, was held at the Department of History of Dhaka University yesterday.

The book summarises the main features of the economy of the Bengal province of that period, including the battle of Palashi and the beginning of the economic drain, de-industrialisation, development of some modern industries, trends in agricultural production, land transfer, construction of the railway network, and the 1943 famine, among others.

Trader stabbed to death in Sylhet

A young trader was stabbed to death on Sunday night in Sylhet city.

The deceased was identified as Sumin Ahmed, 27, also vice-president of the city's ward-24 unit of Jatiyatabadi Swechchhasebak Dal. He hails from Kushigaht Fulbag area of Sylhet.

Locals found a critically injured Sumin in an abandoned market and rushed him to Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College Hospital where doctors declared him dead.

Contacted, Kazi Bazle Maola, assistant superintendent of police (ASP) of Rab-9, said Rab arrested one Lokman Ahmad from Dewanerchar village in this connection.

He said Lokman admitted stabbing Sumin to death.

Law enforcers involved in Rafiqul murder

Allege BNP leaders at namaz-e-janaza

A number of senior BNP leaders yesterday alleged that the government and law enforcement agencies were involved in the planned killing of Rafiqul Islam Mazumdar, general secretary of BNP's ward-56 unit of Dhaka City Corporation.

BNP leaders Chowdhury Alam and Ilias Ali had disappeared in the same way, BNP Standing Committee Member and spokesperson Tariqul Islam told journalists prior to Rafiqul's namaz-e-janaza before the party's Naya Paltan office in the capital.

The handcuffed body of Rafiqul was recovered from Kushtia on Saturday night, around three hours after he was allegedly picked up by Rab members from Jhenidah.

Citing the killing of journalist couple Sagar-Runi and pedestrian Bishwajit Das, Tariqul said there is no security to public life.

BNP Standing Committee Member MK Anwar said if the law enforcement agencies deny their involvement, it is the government's duty to identify the killers through a proper investigation. BNP's Dhaka city unit Convener Sadeque

Hossain Khoka said killings has become a common phenomenon during the present government's tenure. Rafigul was buried at his village home in

Chondipur of Saharasthi upazila of Chandpur around 9:00pm yesterday.

Protesting the killing, BNP Dhaka city unit will hoist black flags at ward-56 and hold a protest rally before the office at 2:30pm today and hold a doa and milad mahfil in the office after Asr prayers tomorrow.

BNP Chandpur district unit will also organise demonstrations and a protest rally at Shahrasti gate on Chandpur-Comilla Highway at 3:00pm today.

Recruit more Bangladeshis PM urges Saudi Arabia

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday called upon the Saudi government to recruit more manpower from Bangladesh for mutual benefits of the two countries.

The prime minister made the call when a threemember delegation of Saudi Majlish-e-Shura led by its Speaker Dr Abdullah Bin Mohammed Bin Ibrahim Al-Sheikh made a courtesy call on her at Gono Bhaban in the capital yesterday evening.

Deputy Press Secretary to the Prime Minister Nazru Islam briefed reporters after the meeting.

During the meeting, the prime minister also urged the Saudi government to boost investment in Bangladesh and increase bilateral trade between the two brotherly countries.

In response, the Saudi Speaker said he has already discussed recruiting more manpower and boosting trade and commerce with Bangladesh during a meeting with the Bangladesh Speaker.

The Saudi Speaker stressed the need for regular visits of high-level delegations of both the countries to further strengthen bilateral ties.

GRAFT CASE AGAINST HASINA

HC for not

The High Court yesterday granted a prayer for not proceeding with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's 2007 writ petition challenging the legality of a corruption case against her under the Emergency Power Rules (EPR).

The prayer stated that Hasina would not run the petition as another HC bench had quashed the case proceedings. Hasina had filed the petition with the HC on October 28, 2007, also seeking bail and for staying the case.

A group of lawyers led by Ahsanul Karim moved the prayer before the HC bench of Justice Farah Mahbub and Justice Abdur Rab.

The Anti-Corruption Commission filed the case with Tejgaon Police Station on September 2, 2007 accusing Hasina and six others of corruption in setting up a bargemounted power plant in Khulna.

The HC on November 4, 2007 granted the bail, stayed the case and also issued a rule on the government and ACC, asking them to explain why bringing the case under the ambit of EPR should not be declared illegal.

Following another petition, the HC bench of Justice Md Shamsul Huda and Justice Abu Bakar Siddiquee scrapped the case proceedings on April 13, 2010.

Advocate MA Aziz Khan, representing ACC, did not oppose the prayer.

NIKO GRAFT CASE AGAINST KHALEDA

HC hearing on 2008 rule tomorrow

The High Court yesterday fixed tomorrow for hearing a rule it issued in 2008 over the legality of filing the Niko corruption case against BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia.

Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) filed the case with Tejgaon Police Station on December 9, 2007. It accused Khaleda and several others of abusing

power while she was the prime minister to award a gas exploration and extraction deal to Canadian company Niko.

Following a writ petition filed by Khaleda, the HC on July 9, 2008 stayed the case and issued the rule upon ACC and the government to explain why the initiation and proceedings of the case against her should not be declared illegal.

Yesterday, the HC bench of Justice Farah Mahbub and Justice Abdur Rob fixed tomorrow to hear the rule.

ACC's lawyer Khurshid Alam Khan told The Daily Star that he prayed to the HC last week to fix a date for hearing the rule as per the ACC's instruction.

ACC decided to get the old cases disposed of at the HC, he said, adding that Khaleda was on bail in the case.

Strict laws to restrict hartal demanded

Strict laws need to be established and implemented to restrict hartals and protest movements in the country, demanded speakers at a discussion in the capital yesterday.

They also urged two leading political parties--Awami League and BNP--to refrain from such movements for the well-being of the nation as such movements only create chaos and disrupt normal life.

The speakers said they will place a 12-point demand, including these issues, before the two parties.

Citizens Rights Movement (CRM) and Green Club of Bangladesh (GCB) jointly organised the discussion followed by a press conference at Jatiya Press Club. To reduce the immense pressure on the capital city, the

speakers called for a decentralised government to strengthen local governments.

CRM President Maj (retd) Mafizul Haque, said, "It is important to divide the country into four states with each state controlled by their own local government to ensure optimum service for people."

This will also enable individual provinces to independently solve their problems without turning to the capital, he added.

CRM Secretary General Tushar Rahman said an effective framework defining local governments is needed in the country.

Moreover, the tenure of local representatives serving in the parliament needs to be reduced to four years for more efficient performance, he said.
