Passengers held hostage for hours

26 flights delayed; no luggage handling for 5 hours; strike withdrawn on govt assurance of meeting staff's demands

A seven-hour strike of a section of Biman employees left around 3,000 passengers stuck at Shahjalal International Airport, flight schedule of many airlines in disarray, and Biman and Bangladesh embarrassed.

No flights left Shahjalal International Airport between 8:00am and

1:00pm and some arriving passengers had to walk to the terminal from taxiways and the tarmac as there were no buses to take them There were no luggage handlers either, forcing incoming passen-

gers to remain stranded at the airport for hours. They at one stage lost patience and vandalised seven computers, glass panes and electronic billboards inside the airport, prompting the authorities to deploy riot police.

They demonstrated chanting slogans against Biman officials, staff and the minister concerned.

All the while, departing passengers were pouring in for flights that had been delayed.

Good news for 26,000 schools

PM declares nationalisation today; non-govt teachers continue agitation for MPO

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina today declares the much awaited nationalisation of 26,193 non-government primary schools of the country.

With the announcement, to be made at a grand rally of teachers at the capital's National Parade Square, jobs of 1,03,845 teachers will be nationalised in three phases, said Primary and Mass Education Minister Afsarul Ameen yesterday.

"This will be a historic event for the teachers in Bangladesh," he told reporters at a press briefing at his ministry.

Once nationalised, the teachers of these schools will get the same salaries and benefits as those in government primary schools.

However, more than several hundred teachers staging sit-in since Monday to press for the inclusion of their institutions in the monthly payment order (MPO) list will continue their agitation.

They have announced to lay siege to the education and finance ministries today.
