



Fragility is the theme

Photography has put Bangladesh on the map. Bangladeshi photographers have firmly established themselves in the international circuit and photographers from across the world are keen on working here, said Shahidul Alam, director of "Chobi Mela" at a press conference held yesterday at Drik Gallery in Dhanmondi, Dhaka.

The seventh edition of the biennial photography festival, which is largest and oldest of its kind in Asia, will begin from January 25. The weeklong festival will feature works of 34 photographers from

Alam informed that India has initiated a similar kind of festival in 2011, while countries such as China, Singapore and Cambodia started their respective festivals after "Chobi Mela" began its journey in 1997. "Fragility" is the theme of this year's festival and

it was picked up from an online poll. But Alam assures that providing participating photographers a chance to focus on socio-political issues has always been the main concern. "The world is seemingly turning more fragile -- both politically and environmentally. Fragility, in that sense, is a very relevant theme," said Alam.

Among 34 photographers, seven are from

Bangladesh. Other participating countries include India, Malaysia, Iran, Italy, Vietnam and Nigeria. The organisers said that the participating Bangladeshi photographers are young and they have the creativity to go far.

The inaugural ceremony of the festival will be held at the National Art Gallery of Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy, on January 25 at 4 pm. Other venues are: Shilpakala Academy, Drik Gallery, Bengal Gallery of Fine Arts, Dhaka Art Center, Chhobir Haat, Lichutala of Faculty of Fine Arts and Mall Chattar of Dhaka University

At the opening ceremony, a Lifetime Achievement Award will be conferred on an internationally renowned photographer whose name will be revealed later. Eight workshops will be conducted by some

world-renowned photographers, including Morten Krogvold, Chris Riley, Chris Rainier and Gaël Turine Several other events such as panel discussion artist's talk, seminar, gallery walk, slideshow and book launch will be held throughout the festival Members of the curatorial panel -- ASM Rezaur

Rahman, Munem Wasif and Tanzim Wahab -- were also present at the press conference. Drik Gallery and Pathshala: South Asian Media Academy are the main organisers of the festival.



Infatuated with nature Solo exhibition of Biren Shome

As a painter Biren Shome's growth has been slow and steady. He was involved in student politics in the 1960s. He took part in all major movements in the country from the mid-'60s on. During the Liberation War, he worked in the publicity wing (as designer) for the Mujibnagar Government. As a freedom fighter, he also witnessed painful and brutal incidents on the battle-


Since childhood, Shome has been moved by rivers nature and the idyllic rural scenery. He was born and raised in Jamalpur, and his village is close to the Brahmaputra river. The painter seeks to depict the simple charms of nature. He began his career as a realist painter, depicting rural landscape with its rich abun-

dance of colours, silhouette and serenity. The painter's current solo exhibition, titled "Life in Abstraction, Abstraction in Life", is now on at the Bengal Gallery of Fine Arts in Dhanmondi, Dhaka.

In the early and mid '70s, a number of painters made the Liberation War the subject of their works. After independence, they reflected their experiences through their art. Shome is one of them. Initially Shome's canvas featured figurative forms

and panorama. Over the years, he engrossed himself in semi and pure abstraction. Flamboyant colours, mellow and uneven texture as well as composition are the main features. At times, his works appear monotonous because of his use of recurring forms and composition.

At the ongoing exhibition, his works on display delve deep into abstract expressionism. The themes emerge

in his works symbolically and at times according to his paintings' characters. The painter feels that nature comes into view in his works through his personal observations and experiences.

For Shome, his paintings are abstract transformations in which, linguistically speaking, the components of the original visual experience have been thoroughly transformed. The movement is from a transient and contingent authenticity into one that captures a sense of immanence and eternity. It is for this reason that Shome lays so much emphasis on colours.

The seasoned artist feels that painters usually start to explore their creativity with the depiction of nature, and the changes it goes through during different seasons. In recent times, the painter has changed his style. His works are now replete with pure forms, compositions and textures. Over the years, Shome has diminished his figures, as forms are very noticeable in space.

His current works -- oil and acrylic on canvas -flaunt textures in blue, emerald green, crimson and brown. In some of the paintings, Shome brought in strokes of scintillating red, black, oranges in intangible

It is easy to comprehend that the artist has made a great attempt to change the composition, but the themes are very limited. At the exhibition, most of his forms and compositions convey nature and its fascinating aspects. The artist is fastidious about his use of

space, which gives an outstanding depth to his works. The exhibition ends tomorrow.






What is your next move after "Shunte

Tilottoma's tribute to **Bulbul Ahmed**




