Record remittance despite ME crisis

Bangladesh earned \$14b last year

Bangladesh earned a record amount in remittance, more than \$14 billion, and exported the second highest number of workers last year despite the Middle East crisis, said researchers.

The remittance earning of the country was around \$13 billion in 2011.

Last year, Bangladesh exported more than six lakh workers. The largest number of workers, more than eight lakh, was exported in 2008, said sources of the Ministry of Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment.

Although the migration rate increased by around 6 percent in 2012 over 2011, the growth rate began to decline from September owing to the United Arab Emirates' (UAE) sudden ban on manpower recruitment on various grounds, including allegations of malpractices in recruitment, said a report of Refugee and Migratory Movements Research Unit (RMMRU).

The RMMRU, a non-government organisation that works with migrants, said the UAE had received the largest number of workers, around 44 percent of **SEE PAGE 19 COL 5**

125 killed as deadly blasts rock Pakistan

Extremist bomb attacks killed 125 people in one of Pakistan's deadliest days for years, raising concerns about rising violence in the nuclear-armed country ahead of general elections.

Two suicide bombers killed 92 people and wounded 121 after they targeted a crowded snooker club in the southwestern city of Quetta Thursday, in an area dominated by Shia Muslims from the Hazara ethnic minority.

Extremist Sunni militant group Lashkar-e-Jhangvi claimed responsibility for what was the worst single attack ever on Shias, who account for around 20 percent of Pakistan's 180 million population.

It was the deadliest attack in Pakistan since twin suicide bombers killed 98 people outside a police training centre in the northwestern town of Shabqadar on May 13, 2011 -- shortly after US troops killed Osama bin Laden.

Earlier Thursday, a bomb detonated under a security force vehicle in a crowded part of Quetta, killing 11 people and wounding dozens.

Separately, a bomb at a religious gathering in the northwestern Swat valley killed 22 people and wounded more than 80, the deadliest incident in the district since the army in 2009 fought off a two-

year Taliban insurgency. At the snooker club, the first bomber
