Poor man's Sobers is no more

Former India all-rounder Rusi Surti, 76, died Sunday morning in Mumbai. The Queensland, Australiabased Surti had been put on life support in hospital after scans revealed he had suffered a massive stroke. Surti, often called the

"poor man's Garry Sobers", played 26 Tests for India from 1960 to 1969 before settling in Australia. He represented Queensland 35 times in the Sheffield Shield and also played for Gujarat and Rajasthan in the Ranji Trophy.

A sound left-hand batsman, a left-arm bowler who could bowl either medium-pace or spin and an outstanding fielder, Surti rendered valuable service to Indian cricket almost throughout the 1960s. He scored 1263 Test runs at an average of 28.70 and a highest score

South Africa were on track for their second successive big win over New Zealand when they claimed four second innings wickets on the third afternoon of the second and final Test at St George's Park on Sunday.

New Zealand were 157 for four at the close, still 247 runs short of avoiding a second consecutive innings defeat, after being forced to follow on 404 runs behind.

Dale Steyn took five for 17 as New Zealand were bowled out for 121 in their first innings.

Left-arm spin bowler Robin Peterson took the first two wickets in the second innings and fast bowler Rory Kleinveldt followed up with two wickets off successive deliveries.

New Zealand wicketkeeper BJ Watling followed up an impressive first innings of 63 -- more than half his team's total -- with 41 not out as he shared an unbeaten fifth wicket stand of 73 with Dean Brownlie (44 not out) to delay South

Africa's progress. On a hot, sunny day, in contrast to the overcast, swing-friendly conditions in which New Zealand crashed to 47 for six on Saturday, South Africa were made to work far harder for their wickets. But they made steady

progress and will be able to call for the second new ball 13 overs into the fourth day's play on Monday. Captain Brendon

McCullum and Martin Guptill made a cautious start in the second innings as New Zealand set out to try to avoid their second successive innings defeat. They saw off the new

ball attack of Steyn and Morne Morkel as they put on 40 for the first wicket. But McCullum fell to

Peterson for the third time in as many innings to provide South Africa with their first breakthrough. After being dismissed by Peterson in the second

innings in the first Test at Cape Town and in the first innings in the current match, McCullum played Peterson with exaggerated caution before missing a delivery which went straight on and trapped him leg before wicket for 11.

Kane Williamson attempted an aggressive back foot shot against Peterson but was bowled by a ball which kept low.

Guptill made 48 before he went back to a ball from Kleinveldt which veered in Steyn and hit his off-stump and Daniel Flynn was out first ball for his second duck of

the match when he edged Kleinveldt to wicketkeeper AB de Villiers.

Ajmal sweeps all bowling honours

Off-spinner Saeed Ajmal won all the bowling honours at Pakistan's inaugural cricket awards ceremony, after he was controversially left off the International Cricket Council's awards list.

Despite bagging 72 wickets in 12 Tests from August 2011 to August 2012, the 35-year-old was not included in any of the ICC shortlists when they were announced in September, sparking outrage in Pakistan at the perceived injustice.

Pakistan's protest over the omission went unheeded, but at the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) awards Saturday night Ajmal was declared best Pakistan bowler for 2012 in all three formats -Test, one-day and T20.

Ajmal, who helped Pakistan rout then world number one Test side England 3-0 in the United Arab Emirates early last year, also won the PCB's special prize for best bowler of the year.

"To be named the best for the year from such a special group, for me this is an out of this world feeling," he said.

Ajmal took 39 wickets in six Tests last year while his tally stood at 31 in 17 one day matches and 25 in 16 Twenty20s.

All-rounder Mohammad Hafeez, captain of Pakistan's Twenty20 team, was named player of the year.

Hafeez was prolific in all three forms of the game last year -- both as batsman and bowler -with 505 runs and eight wickets in Tests, 476 runs and 13 wickets in onedayers, and 398 runs and 10 wickets in T20s.

Williams gets her 13th Melbourne campaign underway Tuesday against Romania's Edina Gallovits-Hall, fresh from claiming her 47th career title in Brisbane and with a rare calendar-year Grand Slam in her sights.

But the formidable and newly focused American, 31, is doing her best to play down soaring expectations before the Grand Slam season gets underway at Melbourne Park on Monday.

Maybe someone else can. We'll see. But it's tough to say."

Williams, who won Wimbledon, the US Open and Olympic gold last year, is also halfway to holding all the major titles at once for the second time, after first completing the non-calendar year

"Serena Slam" in 2002-2003.

behind defending champion Azarenka and Maria Sharapova in the current world rankings, but when it comes to the opening major of the season, she is

peerless in the modern game.

She won in 2003, 2005, 2007, 2009 and 2010, and another Australian tournament victory would return her to world number

Azarenka, who withdrew from her Brisbane semifinal against Williams after failing to recover from a big toe infection, is happy for the American to be favourite, saying it takes the pressure off.

Reigning French Open champion Sharapova, who was beaten by Azarenka in last year's final, is one of the players wanting to topple Azarenka but her preparations have been hampered by a collarbone injury.

However, the world number two said she could play her way into the tournament, starting against fellow blonde Russian Olga Puchkova, ranked 105.

Former world number one Caroline Wozniacki could also be in contention, along with the in-form Agnieszka Radwanska, who has already won twice this year, and China's Li Na, the runner-up in 2011.

Li, 30, admitted that she was already The 15-time Grand Slam winner sits feeling the pace after a frenetic start to the

Australian hopes rest with former US Open champion Samantha Stosur, who is yet to win a match this year.

ICC stands by Pakistan

Cricket's governing body will continue to support Pakistan in its efforts to bring back the international game, but much depends on the security situation, an official said Saturday.

International cricket has been suspended in Pakistan since terrorists attacked the Sri Lankan team bus in Lahore in 2009, leaving eight people dead and seven visiting players wounded.

It led foreign teams to shun tours to Pakistan due to security fears.

David Richardson, chief executive of the International Cricket Council (ICC) said Pakistan will continue to be supported.

"The ICC views Pakistan as a very important part of international cricket," Richardson told a media briefing in Lahore.

"It's our role to support Pakistan in its efforts to make sure that international cricket returns to the country."

But Richardson, a former South African wicketkeeper and batsman, said it was tough to give any time-frame for the return of the game.

"We want to support the return, whenever that may be ... but it's difficult to say exactly when and I think that's about as far as we can go at this stage."

He added that any decision by a team to

play would depend on "a serious assessment of the risk". "ICC is not in a position to do [security assessment] when it comes to teams

touring and countries make their own decisions," he said. "It will be up to Pakistan in convincing

that it is safe to come to the country, and

tourists will make up their own minds in this regard." Bangladesh has twice refused to tour Pakistan because of security fears after

initially agreeing to play a short limitedover series, with its latest refusal coming last week. Richardson hailed Pakistan's decision to

stage a multi-national Twenty20 league in March this year, a move announced by the Pakistan Cricket Board on Thursday, with 30 foreign players likely to participate. "The announcement of the Twenty20

competition where foreign players will be entitled to come is an initiative on the right path, because what you've got to do is regain the confidence of the cricketing world," said Richardson.
