



45,000 get registered for KL jobs

As many as 45,000 people registered for jobs in Malaysia online at information service centres of local union parishads across Dhaka and Barisal divisions yesterday.

The online registration, first of its kind, will continue in these divisions for another two days, followed by primary selection through lotteries. The names of the candidates will be announced on Wednesday at the offices of local deputy commissioners.

Job seekers in the remaining five divisions of the country can get their names listed between 16 and 22 January.

The first day of the process went more or less smoothly amid much enthusiasm of overseas job seekers. All 23 districts of the two divisions observed long queues at their information service centres.

Applicants, meanwhile, raised some complaints of overcharging and technical problems.

Quoting some aspirants, our Manikganj correspondent reported that they were very happy with the government move but staff of some centres had charged each SEE PAGE 19 COL 1

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Lankan president sacks chief justice

Sri Lankan President Mahinda Rajapakse yesterday sacked the chief justice by ratifying a controversial parliamentary vote, defying international calls for restraint and plunging the country into a constitutional

S Bandaranayake Shirani Bandaranayake, the first woman to hold the office of top judge,

had issued several decisions at odds with the government. Rajapakse dismissed her after a closed-door meeting with other judges on Saturday, according to a presidential spokesman.

The move came despite mounting calls on the president to halt the impeachment, which is seen by rights groups and Western nations as a blow to judicial independence in a country just emerging from decades of ethnic war.

Parliament voted on Friday to approve an impeachment

report that last week had been quashed by the country's highest courts, which ruled that the process was unconstitutional. The United States and Britain expressed deep concern at the vote.

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
