




















National Film Award 2011 announced

Siva Kumar's observations on Abanindranath Tagore

R. Siva Kumar (an art historian fron Shantiniketan), during a recent con versation with art critique Mustafa Zaman, at the Dhaka Centre for Art, said that he has been at Shantiniketan since 1980. At first he used to teach European Renaissance Art. Now he concentrates on Indian Modern Art

He pointed out that this was his first trip to Dhaka, and he had met noted Bangladeshi artists Farida Zaman and Nisar Hussain. He was visiting with another Indian artist, Nandi Mojumdar.

When asked to comment on the art market, Siva Kumar said that no arti wants to sell; he/she wants to communicate. Kumar said that he was no impressed by Abanindranath but intrigued by his ideas and style of writing. He wrote on the modernity of Bengali artists, and praised those like Souza, who were at one time considered as street painters.

The end of colonialism did not mea the end of colonial art in British India he asserted. Until 1930, writers and painters in India were concerned with individuality. Vinod Bihari and KG Subramaniam admired Abanindrana

As Abanindranath was a private individual, he stuck to the beliefs of Mallarme, and other French thinkers who gave importance to the individual thinking of man rather that the spirit of nationalism. Abanindranatl combined Persian and Bengali calligraphy, said Kumar. He felt that it was time that there was a mixture of cultures in India. Meanwhile, he was a great admirer of the late Islamic cu ture of India. Like the French Impres sionist painter, Degas, who was happiest in the older part of Paris, he too welcomed old ideas.

Critique, art historian and a curator, Kumar studied at Kala Bhavan in Shantiniketan. He dealt with revivalism, different from the nationalism of Mahatma Gandhi and Subhas Chandra Bose. Abanindranath Tagore taught his nephews to move away from it. He was concerned with sensi tive modernism. He realised that a mixture of eastern and western philosophy and art was what India needed at that time, said Siva Kumar Siva Kumar's shows included those

in London, Chicago, Paris, Berlin, Ontario and Rome, apart from Delhi. He was awarded the Kesari Puruskarum for art writing by Lalitkala Academy, Kerala. He served as curatorial advisor for "Rhythms of Art: The Art of Nandalal Bose", curated by Sonia Rhie Quintella, for the San Diego Museum of Art.


Folk songs by Pandit Ramkanai Das at IGCC

Pandit Ramkanai Das received the Bangla Academy Fellowship in 2011 and the Rabindra Padak in 2000 for his dedication to music. David Bowie: "Where Are You Now?"

Veteran British singer David Bowie's latest single -- his first in a decade, has ended years of silence and speculation. The Rock and Roll Hall of Famer released "Where Are You Now?" on his 66th birthday on January 8, as a video and download. His web site also confirmed that his new album, "The Next Day", is coming out in March. Bowie's last studio album "Reality" came out in 2003, he has not performed live since 2006, and has rarely been seen in public since then. His absence, and a heart surgery in 2004, raised speculations about his health. But his longtime friend and producer of the single, Toni Visconti said he "is extremely healthy and rosy cheeked."

The release was shrouded in secrecy, arriving in the dead of night without a hint of an engineered marketin campaign, and was warmly greeted by critics and fans alike, including a flurry of praise on social networking hub Twitter.

The track went straight to the top of the UK iTunes chart after it was put on sale, and also made the UK

"Where Are We Now?" is a simple, unfussy ballad --Bowie singing mournfully over a piano motif that slowly builds to an understated coda. The song includes several references to the city of Berlin, where Bowie and Visconti produced a critically-acclaimed trilogy of albums -- "Low", "Heroes" and "Lodger" -- in the 1970s.

David Bowie, considered one of the major figures of international popular music for four decades, first caught the eye in 1969 with his single "Space Oddity", and produced numerous hits that carried his signature voice, considerable depth and eclecticism. His 30 studio albums venture from psychedelic folk, glam rock, grunge, soul, funk and electronica. He is remembered most as the original artiste of "Man Who Sold the World", a song that was massively popularised by Kurt Cobain. His other biggest hits include "Heroes", "Life on Mars" and "Ziggy Stardust".




