Add in Abul, get WB fund

Lead financier of Padma bridge advises govt to include him in list of corruption conspiracy accused


The World Bank has told Bangladesh that it would go for financing the Padma bridge project if former communications minister Syed Abul Hossain be on the list of accused in the corruption conspiracy case filed by the Anti-Corruption Commission.

The assurance came during a meeting in Washington last week among the World Bank president, its executive director for Bangladesh and other high officials.

Mukesh N Prasad, the WB executive director, has informed Finance Minister AMA Muhith and Prime Minister's Foreign Affairs Adviser Gowher Rizvi of this stance of the global lender, according to a source at the ministry.

Mukesh had sat with the World Bank officials to urge them to start financing the bridge construction once the lender's external panel submits its report.

4 robbers killed in gunfight

Maj (retd) Ziauddin hurt STAR REPORT

Freedom fighter Major (retd) Ziauddin was

injured when pirates ambushed him and his men at Charaputia area of Chandpai range in East Sundarbans yesterday. At least four pirates were reportedly killed.

Ziauddin, chairman of Dublarchar Fishermen Group and sub-sector commander of Sector-9 during the Liberation War, sustained bullet injuries in the head during the gunfight, reports our Barisal correspondent.

The identities of the deceased pirates could not be known.

A coastguard team and a Rapid Action Battalion team had been dispatched to bring Ziauddin to Mongla, reports a correspondent in Bagerhat.

A blatant abuse of the law

For Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir, his freedom and imprisonment appear to play a game of "hide and seek", as BNP's



acting secretary general's lawyers procure bail in one case, like magic, another case pops up in which he is shown arrested. With 22 cases now staked against him, police will have enough cases to pop up and keep him in jail for months, even if he is granted bail every time a case comes to court.

That's not all. One court finds him the most dangerous person for law and

order. But then another court finds him good enough to walk out on bail. Fakhrul's brush with such blatant harassment began on the evening of December 10, 2012.

Bangladesh fared better than most of South Asia

Says UN report on global economy

Economic prospects for Bangladesh and Sri Lanka, in contrast to the rest of South Asia, remained favourable despite a moderate slowdown last year, says a United Nations report.

Strong growth in private investment and consumption, backed by a steady increase in remittances, contributed to economic expansion in the two countries.

Titled "World Economic Situation and Prospects 2013 (WESP)", the report was unveiled on Thursday in seven cities across the world. Its first chapter was pre-released in New York in December last year.

Police said the seven men kidnapped the 18year-old-girl from her house when her parents were out on the night of January 16.


"They broke into the

Bibiyana field much larger than thought

Chevron pumps most gas in recent years; new gas supply depends on setting pipelines



US oil company Chevron has contributed the most to increasing gas supplies to the energy-starved nation in the

last two years and it is set to do more by 2014. When the Awami League came to power in 2009, the country's gas supplies hovered around 1850-1900 million cubic feet per day (mmcfd), which was a few hundred mmcfd short

of the demand. Over the next four years, the supplies increased up to 2,250 mmcfd due to increased production by the national gas companies, Bapex and Chevron. Of this increase,

Chevron alone provided 250 mmcfd. And now it is investing half a billion dollars to increase Bibiyana gas field's production by 300 mmcfd by early next
