

Juve snap up
Llorente

Athletic Bilbao's Spain forward Fernando Llorente will join Juventus at the end of the season after signing a four-year deal, the Italian club said on Thursday.

"The future of Fernando Llorente is black and white," Juve said in a statement on their website.

The 27-year-old Llorente, whose deal with Bilbao expires in June, has signed a contract with the Serie A side to June 2017 and will stay at Bilbao until the end of the season.

The powerful centre forward, nicknamed the Lion King for his mane of blond hair, turned down the offer of a new contract with Bilbao during the closed season and said he wanted to leave.

Bilbao initially refused to negotiate with interested parties and coach Marcelo Bielsa relegated last season's top scorer to the bench, despite him having helped them to the 2012 Europa League and King's Cup finals by scoring 29 goals.

The Pamplona-born Llorente came up through Bilbao's youth academy before making his first-team debut in January 2005 and became their leading figure over the following seasons.

His relationship with some home fans has soured since his request to leave became public, and he has had to watch from the sidelines while new signing Aritz Aduriz has led the line for the side this season.

Llorente was a member of the Spain squad that won the World Cup in 2010 and Euro 2012, and has scored seven goals in 21 international appearances.

Casillas breaks his hand

Iker Casillas is a major doubt for Real Madrid's Champions League double-header with Manchester United after breaking a bone in his hand.

The World Cup winner suffered the injury in his side's Copa del Rey quarterfinal victory over Valencia on Wednesday when teammate Alvaro Arbeloa kicked him while clearing a ball in the area.

Madrid will assess the injury before deciding what treatment is required while Adam Garrido is likely to deputise for the Spanish No 1.

Casillas will miss Sunday's La Liga clash with Getafe and the second leg against Valencia next week.

He is also struggling to recover in time to face United at the Bernabeu on February 13.

"When I tried to close my fist it hurt. It's just the thumb. The fact that it has nothing to do with the wrist is good," Casillas said.

Meanwhile, the club said in a statement: "After carrying out initial x-rays... it has been confirmed that the footballer Iker Casillas has suffered a fracture at the base of the first metacarpal on his left hand."

"It will be assessed again by a specialist later today to decide what treatment will be followed."

The injury to a key figure comes at a delicate time for Mourinho with Europe's elite club competition resuming in just over two weeks.

Casillas has just been restored to the starting line up after the manager controversially dropped him for the league games either side of La Liga's winter break.

The decision provoked angry reactions from home fans and fuelled media speculation about possible dressing room rifts even though Real's defence has started to tighten up of late.

The 2011 Copa del Rey winners will face a high-profile clash with great rivals Barcelona if the holders can beat Malaga in their quarter-final second leg at the Rosaleda.

Madrid deny Jose rift

Real Madrid denied Thursday a report that top players had demanded coach Jose Mourinho leave before next season, warning the club: "It's him or us."

Top sports daily Marca splashed on the front page its claim of an ultimatum delivered to chairman Florentino Perez on Tuesday.

"President, it's Mou or us," headlined the paper in its account of the meeting between captains Iker Casillas and Sergio Ramos and the club management.

According to the paper, they told Perez that several players were ready to leave the club if the self-anointed "Special One" remained in charge for the next season.

But the club said the claims were false.

"The meeting took place but not the topic of conversation described by Marca," said a spokesman.

"What Marca said is false."

Potts in hospital

West Ham United revealed on Thursday that defender Daniel Potts is due to undergo further tests in hospital after he was knocked unconscious during the 5-1 Premier League loss at Arsenal.

The 18-year-old fell to the ground after an aerial collision with Arsenal right-back Bacary Sagna in Wednesday's game and hit his head on the pitch, leaving him temporarily unconscious.

Potts received lengthy treatment from medical staff on the pitch and was fitted with a neck brace before being carried off on a stretcher and taken to a nearby hospital.

Hazard apologises to ball boy

Eden Hazard has apologised after his extraordinary dismissal for kicking a ball boy during Chelsea's League Cup semifinal second leg at Swansea City.

Wednesday's match finished 0-0, giving Swansea a 2-0 aggregate victory, but the game was overshadowed by an incident 10 minutes from full-time that saw Hazard sent off for an altercation with a ball boy.

The Belgian international seemed to get annoyed when the boy failed to return the ball promptly after it went out of play for a Swansea goal kick.

After a tussle, the youngster ended up lying on top of the ball and Hazard appeared to kick him as he tried to retrieve the ball from underneath him.

Following a brief delay, during which the grimacing boy was attended to by Chelsea's players, referee Chris Foy showed Hazard a straight red card.

"The boy put his whole body onto the ball and I was just trying to kick the ball and I think I kicked the ball and not the boy. I apologise," Hazard told Chelsea TV.

"The ball boy came in the changing room and we had a quick chat and I apologised and the boy apologised as well, and it is over. Sorry."

South Wales police have

announced that they will investigate the incident, but Swansea said the boy had told police he did not want to press charges.

"The police have interviewed the boy and his father and there are no charges going to be pressed. As far as they are concerned, that is the matter closed," said a Swansea spokesman.

"The ball boy has been into the Chelsea dressing room after the game and shaken hands with Eden Hazard. The likes of John Terry and Frank Lampard were exemplary in their behaviour in welcoming him into the dressing room.

"Chelsea asked if he could come in and our kit lady took him in and they shook hands, he is fine.

"As far as we are concerned,

the matter is closed. He has been a ball boy here for six years with no incidents here at the stadium."

Chelsea interim manager Rafael Benitez initially said the ball boy was "wasting time", but he reacted angrily to claims he had condoned Hazard's behaviour.

"I do not know what you expect from me," he told reporters.


"Do you think we are not disappointed with the situation, that we do not regret what happened? Do you think they have not apologised?"

He added: "We will deal with this internally. We will analyse and wait to see if there is any action from the FA (Football Association)."

Chelsea at first reacted by questioning Foy's decision to dismiss Hazard, writing on the club's official Twitter account: "Has football gone mad? Hazard is sent off for kicking the ball under a ball boy attempting to smother the ball rather than return it."

However, they subsequently issued an apology to their 1.79 million followers, saying: "Apologies for earlier ball boy tweet. Hazard has now met with the ball boy and has said sorry."

Swansea manager Michael Laudrup dismissed suggestions the club had instructed their ball boys to waste time by holding onto the ball when it went out of play.

Advantage Roma

AS Roma defeated Inter Milan 2-1 in the Italian Cup semifinal first leg on Wednesday, but face a wait of almost three months to play the second leg.

Four days after the two sides drew 1-1 in Serie A, Roma were worthy winners creating a host of opportunities.

Both Roma's goals came in the first half with Alessandro Florenzi heading in a cross from Ivan Piris in the 13th minute before the Paraguayan also teed-up Mattia Destro for another scoring header after 33 minutes.

But Inter grabbed a lifeline when Rodrigo Palacio latched on to an Esteban Cambiasso free-kick and headed home just before the interval.

Real Madrid have become the first club in any sport to generate more than 500 million euros in revenue in a single year, according to the business advisory firm Deloitte.

The company's Football Money League, published for the 16th time on Thursday, sees Spanish champions Madrid retain their hold on first place ahead of perennial rivals Barcelona.

In an unchanged top six, Manchester United remain third, Bayern Munich fourth, European champions Chelsea fifth and Arsenal sixth, but English champions Manchester City soar five places to seventh.

AC Milan fall one place to eighth, with Liverpool remaining ninth and Italian champions Juventus rising three places to complete the top 10.
