Kolkata Book Fair opens PALLAB BHATTACHARYA, New Delhi The magic of printed words will never die nor will the pleasure of holding a book. That is the refreshing message that emerged at the opening day of the Kolkata Book Fair, with Bangladesh as focal theme country, on January 26. This is at a time when the rising spectre of e-books is casting a shadow over the

What future holds

for the printed word

future of not only publishing industry but also the brick-and-mortar book And the message of hope came from none other than veteran and venerable academician-critic Professor Anisuzzaman of Bangladesh who inaugurated

the Book Fair at the Science City complex in South Kolkata on Saturday. It was in a way in the fitness of things that Anizuzzaman voiced concern over growing popularity of online reading habit, particularly among the youth, but sounded optimistic that printed books cannot be totally replaced by their

"There has been apprehension about the future of printed books as digital technology is advancing very fast. In western countries several big book chain stores have closed down. A magazine like Newsweek stopped publishing. Even

Encyclopedia Britannica has announced that it will no more come out in a book form but only online issues will be available," said Anisuzzaman. This led him to pose: "Does this signal the demise of books?" And he replied firmly: "No. For all of us, who love books, believe our relationship with books is

integral and cannot live without them." However, the words of 76-year-old Professor Emeritus of Dhaka University reflect more of a wish than perhaps a reality that is slowly dawning on the

"We should know that, like us, there are millions of people who love books in printed form. Books are connected with our souls and we can't do without them," said Anisuzzaman

Echoing the Bangladeshi author, West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee said Internet and technology could never replace printed books. "So many news channels have come up but we have not stopped reading newspapers. We read papers and also watch TV," she said.

Heart-warming words from Anisuzzaman and Mamata about printed books notwithstanding, it is time we discuss certain issues that will increasingly challenge the entire publication business chain right from authors, editors, booksellers, agents and reviewers.

The fear of growing competition in digital reading has already seen consolidation in online publishing business by Amazon and other net-based sellers, forcing traditional leading book stores to do a rethink on their retail

strategies. It has also prompted book publishing industry to merge like Penguin of Britain and Random House of Germany have done last year to take on competition and price under-cutting from online stores.

Do we change the way we have bought books all these years? Don't we go to brick-and mortar book stores? Do we read books in printed form or online -either on your table-top or laptop computers or tablets? Do we conjure up the scary picture of a day when there will be no book fair at a particular site?

These are the questions Professor Anisuzzaman has made us think about and challenged us to find an answer. This, one also hopes, will make us love


