## Woman kills herself

A woman killed herself by hanging from a ceiling fan in the capital's Bashundhara Residential area on Saturday nigh allegedly following a quarrel with her husband.

Police yesterday recovered the body of Nur-e-Ara Ashrafi, 24, from Satkhira district and detained her husband Faysal Liakat for interrogation.

The couple lived at a rented flat at G-block in the area. Faysal was a student of a private university while his wife was studying at Jagannath University but both dropped out six months ago, said Zia-uz-Zaman, OC of Bhatara Police Station.

Faysal went out for tuition on Saturday afternoon and found their bedroom locked after returning home at night, the OC said quoting her husband.

After opening the door with a duplicate key, he found Nur hanging and informed the police, the next morning.

Nur was suspecting illicit affair between Faysal and one of his female students. When she came to know of that student's visit to their home two days ago, argument flared up between them. Nur might have killed herself in a fit of passion, police said, quoting Faysal.

## Affordable healthcare for rural people urged National Prof Dr MR Khan said providing STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Affordable healthcare facilities should be delivered at rural people's doorsteps by creating skilled healthcare providers through community paramedic courses, said discussants at a roundtable yesterday. The roundtable, "Need of skilled service

providers in health sector and community paramedics: A new initiative", was organised by Prothom Alo, supported by TARSAN project of Swisscontact, in the daily's office in the capital. Government doctors do not attend their

village offices, said the health ministry Senior Secretary Md Humayun Kabir, adding that skilled paramedics could meet the huge demand for primary healthcare facilities in rural areas.

He expressed hope that 13,000 trained paramedics would be made available by 2015.

healthcare was social welfare work, not business and that trainers must be wellequipped to produce skilled paramedics. The ministry formed a policy on a twoyear training course for paramedics in 2009

to meet the crisis at the grassroots, said Anisul Awal, director of training at National Institute of Population Research and Training. Bangladesh Nursing Council Registrar Suraiya Begum said, "We must ensure that

the trained paramedics return to villages after training." Referring to a Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics data, Prothom Alo Associate Editor

Abdul Qayyum said Bangladeshis mainly suffer from fever, diarrhoea, and other less severe diseases. He opined that paramedics, on receiving proper training, were enough to treat these

ailments.



### Dr Mallick's anniversary of death today

Today is the 16th death anniversary of Dr AR Mallick, an eminent educationist and the first technocrat finance minister of the country, says a press release.

Dr Mallick was professor of South Asian Regional Studies at the University of Pennsylvania, USA, in the early '60s, and the founding vice-chancellor of Chittagong University where he set up resistance against Pakistani occupation forces during the Liberation War.

He was president of the Liberation Council of Intelligentsia and Representing Bangladesh at the UNO in 1971. He was the first educa-

tion secretary, the first High Commissioner to India, concurrently ambassador to Nepal and Bhutan. He was also elected chairman of Asian Development Bank. Bangla Academy has

published "Dr. AR Mallick Sharak Grontho" comprising 32 articles by renowned personalities from home and abroad, along with 50 commemorative photographs, texts of his speeches, etc. On this occasion, a

discussion and milad mahfil will be held at RKB Mallick School/College at his village in Rajapur (Dhamrai), Dhaka today.

# BOU at standstill

Academic and administrative activities at Bangladesh Open University (BOU), country's lone public institution for distant learning, came to a virtual standstill as the institution has been running without a vice chancellor (VC) for around 10 days now.

The tenure of its VC Prof Aminur Rashid ended on January 24, yet the government did not appoint anyone to the post as of yesterday.

Teachers and officials of BOU said since the university act entrusts the VC with authority over all academic and administrative activities, BOU's operations have been stalled in the absence of a VC.

If the impasse prolongs, it might plunge BOU into a severe session jam, causing irreparable loss to the academic lives of around 4.5 lakh students of its 19 academic programmes.

They also said a number of examinations under the university may get delayed as necessary arrangements for them require VC's approval.

Printing of question papers for the HSC programme examination, scheduled next month, awaits VC's approval while the SSC programme examination results could not be published on time for similar reason, said campus sources.


BOU Pro-VC Prof Khondoker Mokaddem Hossain said, "From policy work to routine work, everything came to a standstill. We have not received any order from the Chancellor Secretariat to run the university in the absence of aVC."

He urged the government for immediate steps to solve the matter.

Contacted, Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid said a few other universities lack VC and the ministry is working to solve

the issue soon.
