Comilla pulsates with a unique festival





The cultural programmes that were lined up for this festival caught the imagination of the people of Comilla.

It was informative, educational, entertaining, and most of all, thought-provoking. The 3rd Comilla Cultural Festival came to a rapturous close last Thursday evening at the Comilla Town Hall with the staging of "Teen Konya", an adaptation of British Asian writer Farrukh Dhondy's play on Shakespeare's three heroines. personalities with experience of working in radio and

The festival was the brainchild of an expatriate from Comilla, Manjurul Azim Palash, who after a decade in the UK, returned to his hometown. He was joined by an enthusiastic group of young volunteers.

With a slight delay, the festival began on January 29 with group renditions of songs by the artistes of Rabindra Sangeet Shammilan Parishad (RSSP), Comilla, which was followed by a seminar on 'Liberation War: National Reawakening'. The Vice-chancellor of Jahangirnagar University, Professor Anwar Hussain, was the chief guest with a host of speakers present from Comilla and outside.

The speakers emphasised the necessity of national reawakening, so that the youth of 1971 who fought for the independence of the country could hand over the baton of their thoughts and ideas to the younger generation to take the country forward and achieve the goals for which the country was liberated. Professor Hussain said reawakening in the present scenario of Bangladesh is not only necessary, but is also inevitable. He urged upon all to kick-start this idea of reawakening from the town of Comilla that has been the path-provider of many historical events.

The second day of the festival saw a daylong workshop being held on 'Journalism: Preparation and Com-

mitment', attended by more than 40 young journalists, mostly from the print media, and working in Comilla. Well-known columnist and media personality Md. Jahangir inaugurated the workshop and elucidated the situation prevailing in the media of Bangladesh. The workshop was conducted by a number of experienced journalists -- both from the print and electronic media. In order to give a bit of an international flavour, some

A seminar was organised in the afternoon of the second day where a keynote paper on the evolution of Bangla poetry was read by a local journalist, Arshad Siddiqui. The paper received rave appreciation and it was proposed to incorporate this paper with some amendments in the festival brochure in future.

TV in the UK and the USA were also present.

The third and final seminar was held on the last day of the festival, the title being 'State, Globalisation and Self-identity of the Adivasis'. The keynote paper was presented by researcher and development worker The cultural programmes that were lined up for this

The programmes included flute recital, rendition of thumri, Bangla poetry recitation, traditional folk songs, and to roundup the festival -- a play on Shakespeare's three heroines with a Bangladeshi perspective. Veteran flute player Ustad Azizul Islam, who hails from

greater Comilla region, gave an extraordinarily absorbing recital on the opening night, playing the Raag Jhinjhoti, which has a tinge of Bhawaiya in it. He concluded his recital with a short dhoon on Raag Mishra Khamaj. One of the highlights of the second day's cultural

programme was a session on Bengali poetry recitation by

the local elocutionists, where 'yours truly' was invited as the chief guest. The chief guest also recited a few poems written by poets of Bangladesh and West Bengal (India).

The second evening rounded up with a performance by vocalist Chandra Chakraborty who came from London. Although renowned for thumri, she demonstrated that she had kajri, ghazal and also Nazrul Sangeet, to name a few, in her repertoire.

The organisers should be lauded for not forgetting our age-old heritage and traditional folk songs. Before the staging of the play, "Teen Konya", noted folk song exponent Mahbub Piyal gave a unique presentation of different forms of the genre with narration.

A documentary film on the role and work of cultural activists during the Liberation War, mainly those who worked with Swadhin Bangla Betar Kendra, was screened on the final day. Director Shajal Khaled answered questions from the audience at the end of the show.

About the play, "Teen Konya", Mukul Ahmed, a Britain-Bangladeshi theatre director, said that with changes worldwide, in the male dominated society in Bangladesh women are raising their voices in asserting their rights.

All in all, the cultural activists in particular and the inhabitants of Comilla, a town which has always played a significant role in the sub-continent's socio-cultural progress, have taken a pioneering responsibility in reawakening the cultural heritage of their town. Guests from other districts have expressed their willingness to replicate such festivals in their hometowns, so that not only are the local talents given an opportunity to flourish, but also as the organisers have said, they could move away from 'Dhaka-centric' cultural activities.

Imdadul Haq Milon: Romancing the readers

Imdadul Haq Milon is often credited along with Humayun Ahmed for creating and expanding readership in Bangladesh. His fame has crossed over to India's West Bengal, as well as among other Bengali speaking readers across the world. In 2005, Milon was invited to the Takeshi Kaiko Memorial Asian Writers Lecture

Series, organised by the Japan Foundation. At the annual event, which invites one writer from each Asian country, Milon represented Bangladeshi literature and delivered lectures about his writings at four international centres in Japan.

Born in Bikrampur's Medinimondol village, the writer spent his childhood with his maternal grandmother. His journey from that village to Dhaka's Gendaria, later in his life, has been portrayed in many of his works. Milon penned his first story "Bondhu" in 1973. His first novel "Jabojjibon" was published in Bangla Academy's Uttaradhikar magazine. However, before his novel was printed, he published a collection of stories titled "Bhalobashar Golpo".

Among the many recognitions Milon has received is the 1992 Bangla Academy Award. The author treasures the admiration of the readers as one of the greatest

Several books by Milon are being published by Ananya Prokashoni at the Ekushey Boi Mela this year. They include: "Paach Nayika", "Shada Ghorar Sawari", "Motku Miyar Girlfriend" and "Srabon Jochhna-e". Two other collections of stories are also being published: one is compilation of 50 love stories, while the other is a collection of Liberation War stories.

Milon has also written a book on fellow author Humayun Ahmed, titled "Priyo Humayun Ahmed", which is being published by Anyaprakash. Nandonik is publishing a novel on the Liberation War, called "Shonar Manush". On his latest writings, Milon says, "Every book is like a child to me. Whenever I write, I try to put in all my

The Ekushey book fair was held for the first time right after independence, when Chittaranjan Saha laid down a mat on the Bangla Academy grounds to set up a book stall. Milon has been a regular visitor to the annual fair since then. He said, "At that time, I used to go there because I felt a calling of the heart. Poetry recital sessions also used to take place during those days."

Asked about how he felt when his first book was published, Milon took a walk down memory lane. He said, "Back in 1985, I travelled to Germany. I handed in a manuscript to a publisher before leaving. Returning home after two years, I found that the book hadn't been published yet. Qayyum Chowdhury illustrated the book cover with care, and the novel 'Jabojjibon' went on to become very popular." Milon has published over 150 books so far. His "Bhalobashar Shukh Dukkho"

sold over 85,000 copies at a book fair. Aside from being a popular romance author, Milon has also worked on books on

very serious issues, such as "Kalakal," "Bhumi", "Poradhinota" and "Nurjahan". Milon received the Surma Chowdhury Award in Delhi for writing "Nurjahan". On the book, the author says, "Kolkata's Ananda Publishers first brought out 'Nurjahan', a 1,300 page book. It took me 18 years to complete."

Like all other book enthusiasts, Milon waits round the year for the Ekushey book fair. "The fair creates a bond between readers, authors and publishers," he says.

Sylvester Stallone supports assault weapon ban in US

Sylvester Stallone says that despite his "Rambo" image and new shoot-em-up film "Bullet to the Head", he is in favour of new US national gun control legislation. Stallone supported the 1994 "Brady bill" that

included a now-expired ban on assault weapons, and hopes that ban can be reinstated. "I know people get (upset) and go, 'They're going to

take away the assault weapon.' Who ... needs an assault weapon? Like really, unless you're carrying out an assault. ... You can't hunt with it. ... Who's going to attack your house, a (expletive) army?" The 66-year-old actor, writer and director said he

also hopes for an additional focus on mental health to prevent future mass shootings.

"It's unbelievably horrible, what's happened. I think the biggest problem, seriously, is not so much guns. It's that every one of these people that have done these things in the past 30 years are friggin' crazy. Really crazy! And that's where we've dropped the ball: menta health," he said. "That to me is our biggest problem in the future, is insanity coupled with isolation." Stallone is now in production on his next project,


pairing up with the former "Raging Bull" Robert De Niro for "Grudge Match", about two aging boxers. "People think it's going to be some geezer brawl.

Really? OK, they're in for a surprise. I'm telling you. I've been working on the fight, the choreography. He's tak ing it deadly serious. Because no one wants to be

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shown up," Stallone said of De Niro. "It's going to be like a 'Rocky' fight. This will be 'Rocky 7', with me fighting -- with Rocky fighting the Raging Bull."





"I was born in an 'uncivilised' 20th century family, and started photography in 1972, completely illiter ate of the art" -- Nasir Ali Mamun, one of the pioneering figures of Bangladeshi photography, began his 'Artist's Talk' session at the Goethe-Institut in Dhaka on January 31 on a rather dramatic note. At that time, there were less than 150 cameras i

Dhaka, he said, comparing the number to the 2 crore-plus [including camera phones] today. He said that his interest in portrait photography was fuelled by pictures of Bangabandhu and Mawlana Bhashar The little portraits of them that appeared on booklets or posters were plain and had no flaw; Mamur said that he wanted to take "up front" photos. It's not easy to take photos of famous people,

Mamun said, as he kept on showing his portraits taken between 1972 and '82. It's difficult to keep up with them, and many would "burn out" in their vicinity, but "if they played the sitar or the sarod, I played tabla with them," Mamun added. It was also hard to know who the important people were, as there were not many forms of recognition back then in post-Liberation War Bangladesh. So he made a list, showed it to people, and asked them to add

Mamun said that he first used a camera on March 3, 1968 -- a toy-like non-branded plastic camera -and had no gear of his own for the first six years. He used to borrow a camera from 'Studio Nihar', from 9pm-8am [when the studio was closed]. He also

began stealing international magazines from wealthier households in Dhanmondi, and cut out the pictures to study them.
