Fire license, a serious safety prerequisite, has to be issued on the basis of physical verification and inspection of the factory premises, carried out at regular intervals against a factual check list, which has to be duly signed by fire brigade authorities and kept in their record!

The safety provisions need physical existence of safety stairs, emergency exists, and other spelled-out features. Importantly, fire resistant electric wiring and electrical equipment is spelled out for all hazardous operation involving fire risk.
