

Casual brilliance

The second edition of the Bangladesh Premier League has already seen some outstanding catches from both foreign and local players. But Cameron Borgas' amazingly nonchalant effort in yesterday's Duronto Rajshahi versus Rangpur Riders game might have set the gold standard.

In the 16th over of the second innings, Rajshahi's Dilshan Munaweera pulled Kevin O'Brien towards mid wicket for what seemed to be a sure six.

Borgas, however, standing at the edge of the rope had other ideas. He extended his body behind him to pluck the ball out of the air but in the process lost his balance. With his feet threatening to betray him on the wrong side of the rope, Bogras threw the ball in the air, stepped out beyond the rope, regained his balance, and stepped back in to complete a seemingly routine take.

"I think it's mainly instinct, but I was just trying to be aware where my feet were so I didn't step on the rope, I knew I was falling back so I threw it up in the air. Sometimes it works, sometimes it doesn't," said Borgas at the end of the match.

"I have practiced it a little bit, but I guess playing on a short boundary, I try staying right on the rope rather than coming in and then having to go back and that makes it a little easier."

Payment issue

The BPL governing council confirmed yesterday that all franchises except one paid the twenty-five percent fees of the play-

IH Mallick, member secretary of the BPL's governing council, said that they were hopeful that the long-standing problem will be solved by today, the last deadline for the franchises to solve all financial problems.

"The good news is that we have already gotten money from six franchises and are hopeful that Sylhet Royals will also complete the payment before the deadline. We once again want to say that there is no point in being worried with the payment," said IH Mallick.

The non-payment issue has become a headache for the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) as the franchises have defaulted on one deadline after the other, although it was promised that the twentyfive percent fees will be paid before the start of the

tournament. "It takes at least a week for the players to receive the payment as there are some processes. We are actually facing difficulties with the proper documents," said BCB's acting CEO Nizamuddin Chowdhury.

An emergency board meeting however will take place today at Mirpur where BPL issues will form the main agenda, besides which the board is likely to take a decision against umpire Nadir Shah after a threemember investigation committee found him guilty of spot-fixing.

The investigation committee, headed by retired district judge Jamil Mustafa with former cricketer Shakil Kasem
