Provision for appeal endorsed

Cabinet okays change to war crimes trial act STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The cabinet yesterday approved proposed amendments to the International Crimes (Tribunals) Act to introduce a provision for plaintiffs to appeal to the apex court against verdicts delivered by the tribunals.

The amendment is likely to be placed in parliament and passed this week, Agriculture Minister Matia Chowdhury told The Daily Star.

An official claimed that the state would be able to appeal against the life sentence handed down to Abdul Quader Mollah, by a tribunal on February 5, as the amendment would be passed by parliament very soon.

The stipulated time for filing an appeal with the Supreme Court is 30 days from verdict delivery.

IMPORT OF DUTY FREE CARS

All but 35 MPs did it

Govt deprived of Tk 1,000cr in taxes

As many as 315 incumbent lawmakers have imported duty-free cars depriving the state exchequer of more than Tk 1,000 crore in taxes, according to a list placed in parliament yesterday.

This is not the first time. Without paying Tk 280 crore in taxes, 275 lawmakers of the last Jatiya Sangsad imported luxury vehicles.

The list placed by Finance Minister AMA Muhith says more than 200 MPs of the ninth Jatiya

Sangsad have imported Toyota Land Cruisers. Over 18 MPs have bought Voxwagons while the rest various other brands.

As per the list, so far each of 70 MPs has enjoyed tax exemptions of over Tk 5 crore, 55 lawmakers over Tk 4 lakh each and 16 MPs over Tk 6 crore each to import duty-free cars. Also, 54 MPs got tax exemption of

more than Tk 3 crore, 90 MPs more than Tk 2 crore each and each of around 60 MPs got tax exemption of Tk1 crore.

However, at least 35 MPs have not

used the facility. They include Leader of the House Sheikh Hasina, Leader of the Opposition Khaleda Zia, Finance Minister AMA Muhith, Agriculture Minister Matia Chowdhury, LGRD Minister Syed Ashraful Islam, Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid, Commerce Minister GM Quader, Social Welfare Minister Enamul Haque Mostafa Shahid and Civil Aviation Minister Farukh Khan.

A schoolteacher was stabbed to death by an SSC candidate yesterday allegedly because the teacher obstructed him from copying during the examination the previous day at South Keraniganj on the outskirts of the capital. The deceased, Mostafa Bhuiyan, 35,

was an English teacher of Chunkutia Girls' High School in South Keraniganj.

Riyad, a secondary school certificate examinee, stabbed Mostafa in the chest

around 7:30am in his flat on the second floor of a six-storey building at east Chunkutia, Shakhawat Hossain, officer-in-charge of Keraniganj Police Station, said
