War crimes trial not anti-Islamic activity: Inu

Information Minister Hasanul Huq Inu yesterday said the trial of war criminals is not an anti-Islam activity in any way as the trial is a strong initiative to establish justice.

The war criminals are clearly guilty under international law, he said, adding, "They are being tried for crimes like killing, mass rape, looting and arson attack. These crimes are also unpardonable according to Islamic laws."

The demand, made by youths and organisations including Ekatturer Ghatak Dalal Nirmul Committee, for constitutional amendment to disqualify war criminals for presidential clemency is logical, said National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) Chairman Prof Mizanur Rahman yesterday.

Who knows, a party might come tomorrow and declare a general clemency, he told a discussion marking the first anniversary of "Manobadhikar Khobor", a monthly rights magazine, in the capital's Jatiya Press Club.

On the latest amendments made to International Crimes (Tribunals) Act, 1973, he said the state and the defence got equal facilities. "Now, the tribunal has been elevated to international status."

The amendments gave the opportunity to the government to appeal against inadequate sentence and to the tribunal to try organisations for committing crimes against humanity during the Liberation War.

Ruling out the possibility of controver sies, he said nothing new was inserted and that it was the second standardised tribunal after the Nuremberg Tribunal, where people who committed war crimes during WorldWar II were tried.

The nation is not willing to accept any compromise and so the state must ensure the highest punishment, he added.

Eminent jurist Barrister Rafique-ul Huq said war criminals should be awarded capital punishment but through a proper trial.

Two Islami Bank officials arrested

Police on Sunday arrested two officials of Islami Bank Bangladesh Ltd (IBBL), Mirpur Branch for their alleged involvement in financing Jamaat-Shibir for creating anarchy and carrying out subversive activities in the capital during hartals.

Mirpur police yesterday forwarded Manager AKM Shahidul Haque and Senior Principal Officer Hassan Mahmud Mithu before the Chief Metropolitan Magistrate's Court, Dhaka with a five-day remand prayer. Sub-Inspector Masudur Rahman, the investigation

officer (IO) of the case, told the court that they needed to be remanded for finding out the vital clues about the hartal violence. Police also arrested Ashik Mohammad Jonayed, SM

Hasanul Manna, Mohammad Kafil Uddin, Mohammad Nur Alam and Mohammad Rabiul Islam on the same charge and produced them before the court with a fiveday remand prayer.

Metropolitan Magistrate MA Salam after rejecting the remand prayers ordered to send them to jail as the police filed the case under the Speedy Trial Act.

Cabinet okays law construction

The cabinet yesterday approved a law to form a body to ensure development and to check unplanned construction in Cox's Bazar district.

Once the law, styled as Cox's Bazar Development Authority Act-2013, is passed, the development authority will be empowered to control unplanned structures which have become a worry for tourism in the southeastern district.

A board comprising a chairman and three members will be formed to discharge responsibilities, Cabinet Secretary M Musharraf Hossain Bhuiyan told reporters after a weekly cabinet meeting.

The cabinet also approved the birth and death registration act with a provision to fine Tk 5,000 and maximum a one-year imprisonment for providing false information and violating the law, he said.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina presided over the meeting which was held at Bangladesh Secretariat.
