Money talks in 2nd BPL

At the end of the day when one looks back at the month-long Bangladesh Premier

League, it can be safely put that the competition with all its glitz, money and exposure, was more then just cricket. Intertwined with the tournament were so many parallel issues that they often threatened to outweigh the extent of coverage given to the on-field events.

The players-payment issue was a problem that engulfed the second edition of the tournament right from the very beginning and stuck firmly throughout it cropping up during the matches. The severity of it came to the fore when a number of foreign players almost boycotted some of the games in the tournament while the outburst from Duronto Rajshahi's captain, Chamara Kapugedera, was another such example.

The players' distrust over the board was fuelled mainly due to the negative reputation that the inaugu-

ral edition of the competition had received. The issue was so pressing that some of the foreign players compelled the franchises to make direct payments rather than following the normal procedure of going through the board. While payment issues still remain, players though are a bit more confident this time as the franchises have signed contracts with the board and are answerable national bowling line up. to them.

unwillingness to send their players to the competition was another highlight. The PCB's decision led to a new low in the PCB-BCB relations. President Nazmul Hasan Papon's statement at a press conference in the eve of the competition, where he claimed that 'Bangladesh were not bothered much about touring Pakistan anymore' best described the state of the boards' relations. The president's fiery reply however, did not go too well with last-placed, Khulna Royal Bengals who had seven Pakistani players in their side and suffered the most.

versies though, the BPL did see a number of local players rise up to the occasion. Shamsur Rahman's sudden The Pakistan Cricket Board's return to form, which saw him score six 50s and earned him a call in the preliminary squad for Bangladesh's tour of Sri Lanka was another positive. The batsman believed that his performance in the BPL put his cricketing career 'ahead by two to three years' and hopes to make debut soon.

"I am looking forward to the training in the coming week. And then when we get to Sri Lanka, we need to work hard. First we

will focus on Test match fielding and then progress from there," he added.

Assigned as a specialist fielding coach, Corey however will be responsible for the team's batting until the BCB hires a batting coach. "Batting is what I did prior and what my initial introduction to coaching was for. I haven't in particular had a technical role such as the fielding coach before but when you're an assistant coach, or when you're head coach of a team, you need to know all three fundamentals of the game," explained Corey.

"Technically I have not had that title yet but I have done a lot of work, particularly with the New South

Corey believed that the key to improve a side's fielding ability was to make the training sessions 'enjoyable'. "The time when fielders may get bored or lazy with fielding is when there's no intensity or you don't mix it up. I am looking forward to working with the players, sitting down with them and telling them what my expectations are on the field," he said.

National booters believe that the increased competition in the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) will foster a fighting attitude that will help them in the AFC Challenge Cup qualifiers, as the residential camp of the national team got underway at the BFF artificial turf yesterday.

The title race of the sixth edition of the professional football league is mainly confined to three teams -Abahani, Sheikh Russel and Sheikh Jamal KC. And 23 players out of the preliminary 33-member squad came from these three teams.

"To be truth, the fighting attitude of the players has increased due to the nature of the ongoing football league and I am sure you will see that reflection in our international matches," said Abahani midfielder Pranotosh Kumar Das on the verge of the training.

Pranotosh said that they have shifted their focus to the AFC Challenge Cup from the Bangladesh Premier League.

If you look back to our (Sheikh Russel) league matches, we fought back from behind on a few occasions and even won the game scoring in the dying moments and it was possible because of the fighting tendency of the players," said Sheikh Russel midfielder Mamunul Islam. "Besides, the temperament, stamina and understating between players have increased a lot due to the competitive league."

Mamunul said that all their players have put the sights on the AFC Challenge Cup from the professional football league and all are determined to bring some good results for the nation.

Defender Atiqur Rahman Meshu believes the overall standard of country's football has improved thus the standard of the local footballers have also increased.

"We are taking the AFC Challenge Cup seriously as the football federation has already declared it as part of vision 2012," said Abahani defender Meshu.

However, Bangladesh's mission to the AFC Challenge Cup may get a jolt even before they travel to Nepal on February 25. Goalkeeper Mustakur Rahman and defender Rezaul Karim have already been ruled out due to their injuries while striker Zahid Hasan Emily, wingers
