He also said that he will continue to be an advisor for the team and will remain active on the field as a senior player. Explaining his decision

to take a break from international T20 games, Amla said that his decision was influenced by the hectic international schedule and added that the break will give him more room to manage his time between the formats more constructively. Amla was appointed in

June 2011 and has since captained the Proteas in two T20Is and three ODIs against Australia, as well as five unofficial T20s against Zimbabwe in de Villiers' absence, the report added. (ANI)

Clarke fights Ashwin

Michael Clarke led the fightback for Australia with a wonderfully-crafted century after Ravichandran Ashwin had put India in charge on the opening day of their Test series in Chennai yesterday.

Clarke (103 not out), who was given a major let-off when on 41, sealed his hundred in the final over of the day, but the Australia captain was aided by a fine innings of 68 from the debutant Moisés Henriques, with the pair putting on 151 for the sixth wicket.

That came after Ashwin had single-handedly reduced the tourists to 153 for five and the offspinner then ended Henriques's stay to end the day with figures of six for 88, while Ravindra Jadeja also picked up the late scalp of Mitchell Starc as Australia finished on 316 for seven.

India began the day by handing Harbhajan Singh his 100th Test appearance as well giving the seamer Bhuvneshwar Kumar his debut.

Australia, after winning the toss, got off to a flying start with David Warner and Ed Cowan scoring 50 in the first 10 overs. Warner was dropped in the ninth over, Ashwin's first, when he edged to Virender Sehwag at slip only to see a straightforward chance shelled.

Warner was handed another lifeline when Mahendra Singh Dhoni failed to take a tough stumping chance off Ashwin - a failing he rectified when he whipped the bails off to remove Cowan for

2nd Test still

Hyderabad will host the second Test match between India and Australia as scheduled next week despite twin bombings in the city that killed 14 and wounded dozens, officials said on Friday.

Rajeev Shukla, spokesman for the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI), said government officials had given assurances about security in the wake of Thursday night's deadly attacks.

"I spoke to the (federal) home secretary, who was in Hyderabad, and had discussion with the chief minister and officials of the state government," Shukla, himself a federal minister, told reporters outside parliament.

He said he grabbed a 9-mm pistol from under his bed and went into the bathroom. He said he fired into the locked door of the toilet, which adjoined the bathroom, in a blind panic in the mistaken belief the intruder was lurking inside.

Witnesses said they heard a gunshots and screams from the athlete's home on an upscale gated community near Pretoria. The community is surrounded by 3-metre-high stone walls and topped with an electric fence.

In a magazine interview a week before her death, published on Friday, Steenkamp, a law graduate and model, spoke about her three-month-old relationship with Pistorius. "I absolutely adore Oscar. I respect and

admire him so much," she told celebrity gossip magazine Heat. "I don't want anything to come in the way of his career." Police pulled their lead detective off the
