Ash hattrick in even battle

Mohammad Ashraful proved he is never far from the limelight as Bangladesh cricket's prodigal son hogged the spotlight with a hattrick on the second day of

the five-day Bangladesh Cricket League (BCL) final at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur last night.

In the 79th over and his first over, spinner Ashraful made best use of the pink ball as he dismissed Forhad Reza, Sajedul Islam and Saqlain Sajib in the last three deliveries to become the first bowler to achieve this feat in the newly-designed first-class competition.

It also meant that the Walton Central Zone ended the day with a 62 run overall lead with eight wickets in hand at stumps over BCB North Zone.

"Obviously I am excited and hope this success gives me some confidence to bat well in the second innings. I bowled straight and flat to get the first two wickets and then it was a slower ball," said an excited Ashraful after the day's play.

Ashraful became the eighth bowler to take a hattrick in the domestic first-class competition after Waswaurni Palash, Elias Sunny (who has done it twice), Nur Hossain Munna, Yasin Arafat, Mohammad Sharif, Dollar Mahmud and Shohag Gazi, who have all achieved the feat in the National Cricket League (NCL).

But it was left-arm spinner Mosharraf Hossain who combined with young paceman Taskin Ahmed to give Walton Central Zone a slim three-run lead. Almost all the North Zone batsman got starts but failed to carry on. Mosharraf finished with 4-65 and Taskin claimed three wickets for 50 runs.

Nasir Hossain was the brightest player for North Zone as he scored a well-made 74 from 88 balls with eight fours and four sixes, but missed out on the second cen SEE PAGE 17 COL 1

Shakib out of tour

Ace all-rounder Shakib Al Hasan will miss out on Bangladesh's tour of Sri Lanka next month as he is scheduled to undergo an operation in Australia on his right leg this week. He'll be going under the knife to treat one of the three problems that he was earlier diagnosed with by the Bangladesh Cricket Board's (BCB) physicians.

Chairman of BCB's cricket operations committee Enayet Hossain Siraj confirmed the news at Mirpur yesterday. The operation is expected to sideline the player for six weeks.

"He'll have to stay in Australia for a week or 10 days immediately after the operation. After a week there will be an assessment. Once he can move, he'll return to the country. Theoretically it'll take him six weeks to return to the cricket field. He'll begin exercising three weeks after the operation," said Debasish Chowdhury, BCB's physician, adding

that hopefully Shakib will be available for the Zimbabwe tour in April.

"He has an appointment with a podiatrist (feet specialist) this Monday. We just wanted to talk to a podiatrist to get a biomechanical assessment from him and get as much information as possible. After that he is most likely to undergo surgery by Thursday," added Chowdhury.

Shakib's impending surgery and subsequent time out of the team made life difficult for the national selectors, who met with the national team's head coach yesterday afternoon to finalise the team for the first Test against Sri Lanka

"Losing Shakib for the series is obviously a big loss. It's almost impossible to replace a player of his calibre. It's as good as losing a batsman and a bowler," said chief selector Akram Khan.

"But it's a part of life and honestly speaking we were ready for it and we'll choose someone from the preliminary squad accordingly. We will be finalising a 15member team by Sunday and hopefully the management can work out a good strategy.

Shakib, who went to Australia on Wednesday night for a second opinion on his shin bone injury, met Dr. Scott Burne on Thursday. After checking all the reports the Sydney expert suggested the all-rounder have surgery on his calf to eliminate the stiffness that has been causing him problems for some time.

"The main problem is the Exertional Compartmental Syndrome, which means that his right calf muscle, due to repeated SEE PAGE 17 COL 5



Bangladesh past Fiji hurdle

Play against India tonight



The win helped Bangladesh land their third win from four games and, with a game against India tonight, Bangladesh are hopeful of causing an upset to try and make it through to round three.

Bangladesh made their intention of winning by a big margin very clear from the beginning as they went for the long-ball play instead of building attack. And it looked like it would pay off when Krishno Kumar Das scored twice in the opening eleven minutes, first with a tidy oneon-one finish, next when he guided home Moshiur Rahman Biplob's whipped pass. Veteran Kamruzzaman Rana then made it made it 3-0 in the 16th minute excellent rising effort before Fiji stormed back into contention with two goals late in the first half to make it 3-2 at half-time.

Bangladeshi strikers were guilty of spurning quite a number of easy chances while, on the other hand, Fiji made sure they got in the scoresheet each time they got the ball inside the Bangladesh's danger zone.

first-team spots at those positions. The lone striker's choice is thought to be Abahani's in-form striker Shakhawat Hossain Rony, who scored six League goals and has impressed the coach in the training sessions.

Bangladesh will be fielding a relatively inexperienced frontline against the likes of Palestine, Nepal and Mariana Island. However, the challenge will not only come from those quarters; the challenge will also be for the whole team to adapt to the coach's Dutch style of play and tactics.

The coach tried to get his charges acquainted with the pressing game -where a host of players including defenders go pressing into the opposition half and retreat in defence -- during yesterday's practice session. He formed two groups of seven players who would go for the ball all the time in seven-minute periods which test the players' skill, strength and stamina.

De Kruif's style of coaching has already won the admiration of his assistant local coach and some of the Eplayers. It remains to be seen if it conjures up any unexpected results in the short time they have at hand.

Sachin Tendulkar showed glimpses of his vintage form with a fluent unbeaten half-century as India recovered from two early jolts to leave the first Test against Australia evenly poised here on Saturday.

The 39-year-old veteran, who had been struggling for form for a long time, played with decisive footwork and a positive frame of mind to guide India to 182 for three in 52 overs on the second day at the MA Chidambaram Stadium, which saw local boy Ravi Ashwin grab a careerbest seven-wicket haul.

Tendulkar (71 batting) and Virat Kohli (50 batting) were at the crease when stumps were drawn with India still trailing by 198 runs. The two have so far added 77 runs for the fourth wicket.

Tendulkar, in the course of his 67th Test half-century, touched another milestone by surpassing 7,000 runs on home turf. Kohli, on the other hand, completed his seventh Test half-century at the fag end of the day.

Resuming at the overnight score of 316 for 7, the Australians continued to frustrate the Indians with captain Michael Clarke (130) and the tail-enders combining to

score 64 more runs to take the score to a competitive 380. Ashwin, who had scalped six wickets on the opening
