



Ghulam Azam aided attacks on Bangalees

He considered it his duty, war crimes tribunal told

War crimes accused Ghulam Azam at a meeting in Rawalpindi of Pakistan 18 days before the 1971 victory tried to justify the attacks on Bangalees, saying it was his duty.

"We [Azam and the organisations under his control] have assisted the Pakistan Government in taking measures against the separatists because it was our duty," prosecutor Sultan Mahmud Simon yesterday told the International Crimes Tribunal-1, quoting the accused from newspaper reports.

Azam made the remarks at the United Coalition Party (UCP) meeting on November 28, 1971, which was published at the daily Sangram, Jamaat-e-Islami's mouthpiece, the next day.

Simon, while placing closing arguments in the war crimes case, said Azam used to brand freedom fighters of the then East Pakistan as "separatists" and "anti-state elements". SEE PAGE 6 COL 5

Govt should explore opportunities, recruiting agencies say

Ahead of the World Cup football in 2022, host country Qatar is recruiting foreign workers in large numbers, creating many job opportunities for Bangladeshi workers.

But due to a lack of coordination between the government and the private sector, the number of Bangladeshi workers going to the Middle Eastern country is insignificant, said recruiting agencies.

Qatar is hiring many people for the construction sector as it plans megainfrastructure projects in advance of the World Cup.

The agencies think that the Bangladesh embassy officials in Qatar are having trouble dealing with labour issues effectively.

Journalist leaders deplore desecration of national flag, Shaheed Minars, demand punishment to fanatics

Condemning the recent attacks on newsmen and desecration of the national flag · and Shaheed Minars by religious fanatics, : journalist leaders yesterday demanded exemplary punishment to the attackers.

"If there is any further attack on journal-· ists and media from the defeated forces of : 1971, they [attackers] will be resisted with : full strength," Iqbal Sobhan Chowdhury, president of a faction of Bangladesh · Federal Union of Journalists (BFUJ), told a · rally before the Jatiya Press Club.

The BFUJ and Dhaka Union of Journalists (DUJ) jointly organised the rally protesting the attacks and demanding death penalty for all war criminals.

Expressing solidarity with the Shahbagh movement, Abdul Jalil Bhuiyan, secretary general of BFUJ, said journalists did not sit back during the Liberation War and this time also they would not.

Arrest warrant sought for 3 Jamaat leaders

Absent again from contempt rule hearing

Three top Jamaat-e-Islami leaders for the second time yesterday did not appear before the International Crimes Tribunal-2 citing "unavoidable circumstances" to explain a contempt of court rule issued against them.

Claiming their absence as "disobedience to the court's order", the prosecution sought issuance of arrest warrant to ensure their presence.

The three-member tribunal led by Justice Obaidul Hassan "for the last time" extended time until March 3 saying "necessary order" would be passed if the Jamaat leaders failed to appear before it next time.


