CU teacher 'commits suicide'

A Chemistry professor of Chittagong University (CU) allegedly committed suicide by hanging himself from his bedroom ceiling at his residence in CU campus area yesterday evening.

The deceased is Didaul Islam Chowdhury, 60. Quoting family members, CU police sources said Didarul went to his bedroom for saying Maghrib prayers and locked the door. Later, the members saw him hanging by a rope when they looked through the window.

Police broke open the door and recovered the body around 7:00pm.

Man killed in road accident

LABOUR MARKET FOR BANGLADESH

KSA may consider reopening

Saudi Arabia may consider reopening its labour market to Bangladeshi workers after a discussion with the government in March, Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment Secretary Dr Zafar Ahmed Khan said yesterday.

"As a delegation of the Saudi Arabia government is scheduled to visit Bangladesh next month, we hope there will be an effective discussion on reopening of the market and working out other labour related issues," he said.

Saudi Arabia has unofficially stopped recruiting Bangladeshi workers since 2006, bringing allegations of malpractices in the recruitment process.

Zafar Ahmed also said the government was trying to reduce the cost of migration.

He made these remarks at the launching ceremony of the project, "Strengthening Labour migration management capacity in Bangladesh, Indonesia, Nepal and the Philippines for replication in other Colombo Process member States",

organised by International Organisation for Migration (IOM) at the European Commission office in the capital.

Later, at a press conference on "Kafala

System in GCC Countries", the secretary said the government would take reasonable steps to solve the problems with Kafala system, under which migrant workers are closely monitored. Refugee and Migratory Movement

Research Unit (RMMRU), which held the conference at the capital's Hotel Purbani International, says huge numbers of Bangladeshi workers in the Gulf countries are being deprived of basic rights due to some unfavourable provisions of Kafala system, which needs reformation.

As an individual employer regulates the system, the workers cannot enjoy their freedom, said Dr Tasneem Siddiqui, chairperson of RMMRU. The government should raise the issue of reforming the system, she added. Dr Siddiqui also said the Gulf countries were now considering reforming the system as it was widely criticised by international organisations.

DEVELOPMENT, NATURAL DISASTER | Planned Government making long-term plan

With a long-term vision of 100 years, the government is formulating a holistic and cross-sector plan on how to manage natural resources and reduce negative impacts of natural disasters for ensuring sustainable socioeconomic development of the country.

The Netherlands government is providing technical and financial support to Bangladesh to formulate the development strategy titled "Bangladesh Delta Plan 2100", first of its kind in the country.

Bangladesh and the Netherlands have already signed a memorandum of understanding regarding the delta plan last year, Water Resources Minister Ramesh Chandra Sen said yesterday.

The minister was speaking at a workshop titled "Building Climate Resilience in the Bangladesh Delta: Managing for Effective Water Solutions" organised by the Institute of Water Modelling, and the Centre for Environment and Geographical Information System.

Bangladesh, one of the biggest deltas in the basin of the Brahmaputra, the Ganges and the Meghna, is one of the most vulnerable countries in the world due to climate change, said Samar Kumar Ghosh, joint chief of Planning Commission, adding this prompted the government to make the long-term development plan.

The general economic division of the Planning Commission would prepare the development strategy while an inter-ministerial national advisory committee would guide them.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in parliament yesterday said various efforts, including torching of garment factories, are being planned to ruin the garment sector and create political unrest in the country.

She made the comments when the ruling Awami League lawmaker Nur Afroz Ali wanted to know whether any political party or group is

involved in this regard. The premier also said a ten-member cabinet committee led by labour and employment minister has been formed to monitor the situation in the garment industries sector constantly and give directives to improve the situa-

tion in the garment sector. Besides, 15 teams are visiting the garment factories to ensure fire safety, she added.

During the question answer hour, the premier also spoke about her government's measures and achievements to establish good governance and rule of law and to improve communications network.

JS body spurs communications ministry for road safety

It also asked the ministry to take effective measures to stop haphazard parking of vehicles in the capital to reduce traffic jam.

Meghna and Meghna-Gumti bridges will remain closed for a week from March 15 for repair works.

For once again, the traffic movement on the two key bridges will remain suspended from 8:00am of March 15 until 8:00am of March 21, said Communications Minister Obaidul Quader yesterday at a review meeting held at the Secretariat. Bangladesh Army will carry out the repair works.

People will use an alternative route during the repair time. Vehicles of Chittagong-Comilla-Dhaka route may use Chittagong-Comilla-Mainamati-Brahmanbaria-Sarail Biswa road crossing, Ashuganj-Bhairab-Tarabo crossing (Rupganj), or Kanchpur bridge.

While those of Dhaka-Chittagong route may use Dhaka-Kanchpur bridge, Tarabo crossing (Rupganj) Narsingdi-Bhairab-Ashuganj-Sarail Biswa road crossing or Brahmanbaria-Mainamati-Comilla-Chittagong road as alternative routes, he said.

The meeting reviewed the progress of Mirpur-Banani flyover and upgrading works of Joydevpur-Mymensingh road. Army is implementing both the projects.

Quader said Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina will open the Mirpur-Babani flyover by the end of next month.

Meghna, Gumti bridges to close again from March 15 development path: Greens

Rather than following the path to development taken by the western nations, Bangladesh should learn from their mistakes and avoid those, said speakers yesterday stressing on conservation of natural environment.

They were addressing the inaugural session of a daylong event titled "40 Years of Environmental Conservation in Bangladesh" organised by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) at a hotel in the capital marking the 40th anniversary of the organisation's works in the country.

"We need both industrialisation and development, but we also need to conserve nature for future generations and make our development sustainable," said Kartikeya V Sarabhai, director of Centre for Environment Education, India, also

the keynote speaker.

Taking the nature of infrastructure in Dhaka as an example, Kartikeya said, "No matter how many flyovers and roads you make in the city, the traffic congestion will not ease in the long run if you don't change your approach to development."

In his opinion, different modes of public transport, namely railway services, are more sustainable than using private cars that take up a lot of space on the road but can carry only a few persons. Pointing out the importance of sustain-

able development models, Sarabhai said, "The development model borrowed from the west is completely backdated and unsustainable."

Environment and Forests Minster Dr Hasan Mahmud inaugurated the event and also underscored the importance of conserving nature in his speech.
