# Ctg BGMEA leaders vow to work together to help garment sector flourish

The newly elected first vice-president of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association Nasiruddin Ahmed Chowdhury yesterday said the association is keen on cooperating with all BGMEA leaders to help ensure growth in the readymade garments sector.

He urged the government to provide special services at Chittagong Port and Chittagong Customs to ease trade for the apparel sector that has been made vulnerable by recent political volatility.

He also insisted on establishing an industrial zone in the Chittagong region to attract more local and foreign well at the programme.

investment, which would play a bolder role in the growth of the apparel sector in Bangladesh.

He was speaking at the reception accorded to newly elected directors of BGMEA Chittagong at its port city office.

Meanwhile, Nasiruddin Chowdhury, outgoing first vice-president of BGMEA, said if they don't work seriously from now on, the RMG sector may incur more losses.

Currently the Chittagong RMG sector accounts for nearly 30 percent of the country's total exports but if the current downtrend prevails, contribution could fall to as low as 10 percent in the next ten years, he said.

## Russian tycoon offers to buy Orascom Telecom

Orascom Telecom, a heavyweight on the Egyptian Stock Exchange, is controlled by Russia's Vimpelcom. Altimo owns 47.85 percent of Vimpelcom.

Vimpelcom is seeking to keep operating control and the right to consolidate its Algerian unit Djezzy, held by Orascom, while the local government aims to acquire a 51 percent stake. The sale of Djezzy will be a driver for Orascom's stock, according to Ivan Kim, a telecom analyst at VTB Capital in Moscow.

The Algerian government and VimpelCom may reach an agreement soon, local newspaper Al Khabar said last week. Buying out the 48 percent of Orascom that Vimpelcom does not own may require \$1.8 billion, according to BCS.

"The premium to market price that Altimo offered doesn't look impressive," Kurbatova said, estimating Altimo may gain a 15 percent to 20 percent stake. "Not everyone will sell."

Amsterdam-based VimpelCom does not plan to sell its 51.9 percent stake to Altimo, Bobby Leach, a spokesman, said by mobile phone, according to the Bloomberg report. Altimo's spokesman Evgeny Dumalkin declined to comment.

"We were expecting that they would be taking Orascom out of the market, but we think it's a very low price," Maria Samir, a telecom analyst at Cairobased investment bank Beltone Financial, said.

"I will tell the Danish consumers that they can buy goods safely from GMS. Next time, I will also be proud to buy a new T-shirt sourced from the company."

He, however, urged the garment manufacturers in Bangladesh to continue improving the working conditions.

Around 70 percent of the factory's capacity is used for Danish buyers like Bestseller (65 percent) and Rex & Holm (5 percent). The remaining 30 percent is used to make clothes for other European customers, said Md Golam Mostafa, managing director of the company.

The company's annual turnover stands at \$150 million, employing 12,000 people, he said.

Situated upon around 11 lakh square feet, the factory produces different products like Tshirts, polo shirts, sweat shirts, ladies' and children's wear for renowned brands like FOTL, KAPPA, ORSAY, PIMKIE, said M Golam Mustafa, executive director of the company.

Value addition of the factory is around 60-65 percent, he said.

GMS is the largest composite factory in knitwear in Bangladesh and they received the National Export Trophy from the commerce ministry in 2009-10 for the highest exports, according to the manag-

ing director. The company provides all types of facilities to ensure better working conditions and has wellequipped fire extinguisher systems, day care and in-house doctors, the company said in a statement.

One of the unique features of the factory is profit-sharing with the workers. "We provide 5 percent of our profits to the workers along with other benefits such as incentive bonus, attendance bonus and yearly increment."

The factory also has a modern laboratory with the latest equipment including the Spectrophotometer, to perform comprehensive lab tests to meet internationally recognised standards, according to the statement.

The company does not employ children and has a workers' participation committee to ensure labour rights, the managing director said.
