



Nuke power project gets go-ahead

Ecnec okays Tk 5,242cr phase-1

The government yesterday approved the first phase of a 2,000-megawatt nuclear power plant project at Rooppur in Pabna at a cost of Tk 5,242 crore.

The Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (ECNEC) granted the approval at a meeting at the NEC auditorium, with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in the chair.

A planning ministry official said the initial infrastructure would be built in the first phase. Besides, assessment of technical feasibility and overall viability of the project will also be done by 2017.

Bangladesh Atomic Energy Commission (BAEC) will implement the project. Of the Tk 5,242 crore, Russia will provide Tk 4,000 crore (\$500 million) as hard term loan.

Bangladesh will provide around Tk 4,800 crore for the second phase (2017 to 2022).

In January, Bangladesh entered into a \$500 million

Focus on connectivity, hydropower deal

Dhaka to host tri-nation meet involving India, Bhutan this month

Dhaka will host a discussion between Bangladesh, Bhutan and India later this month on connectivity and cooperation in hydropower among the countries.

The potential and feasibility of hydroelectricity and connectivity between the countries will figure in the tri-nation discussion, expected to take place on April 16

Bangladesh Foreign Secretary Shahidul Huq gave the news at a press briefing after the first round of foreign office consultations between Bangladesh and Bhutan

"This will be a brainstorming session where the three sides will explore different aspects of connectivity, power generation and trade," the foreign secretary said.

Bangladesh has long been trying to import hydroelectricity from Bhutan but India has already signed an agreement to import electricity from the landlocked country.

Despite the agreement, said Shahidul, Bhutan is ready to discuss the matter with Bangladesh and forge cooperation in

Myanmar school fire kills 13 boys

A fire blamed on an electrical fault killed 13 teenage boys at a Muslim school in Myanmar's main city yesterday, police and witnesses said, raising fears of a further eruption of tensions after a wave of religious unrest.

Police and soldiers flanked the scorched blue mosque and religious school in central Yangon, where dozens of children had been sleeping when the blaze broke out early yesterday.

Authorities launched an inquiry into the fire, stressing that early indications suggested a tragic accident. Police said two guards at the building had been charged with negligence.

The assurances came amid Muslim suspicions that they had been targeted following a spate of Buddhist-Muslim killings and arson that has spread across central Myanmar in recent days.

Hundreds of mourners, many praying and weeping, packed into a Muslim cemetery in a suburb north of Yangon to bury the victims, with many among the crowd SEE PAGE 19 COL 5
