Pistorius too 'traumatised'

South Africa's

Paralympian sprint star Oscar Pistorius, who is charged with murdering his girlfriend on February 14, is still too traumatised to start training for competition, his family said on Thursday.

Pistorius last week succeeded in having his stringent bail conditions relaxed to allow him to travel abroad for competitions, but his uncle Arnold Pistorius said he was still battling to even step out of the house.

"Oscar is not back on any official training programme. This may change in future, but this will be a decision taken by Oscar."

"At this point Oscar is still in an extremely traumatised state and has made it clear to all of us that he is not able or willing to even contemplate this issue at this stage," the uncle said in a statement.

The statement came after South African news papers published a photo graph of the athlete wearing training clothes and his blades on a track at the University of Pretoria.

Afrikaans daily Beeld said the photo was taken by a schoolgirl in a group of high school hockey players on March 24.

Pak tour of WI in doubt

Pakistan's tour of the West Indies in 2013 is in serious jeopardy, after both boards failed to find a suitable window for the tour. Pakistan were originally scheduled to play two Tests, five ODIs and two Twenty20s in the Caribbean in June and July, but ESPNcricinfo understands that the tour is unlikely to go ahead.

According to the FTP, West Indies are scheduled to host Pakistan from the last week in June to the last week in July, but they planned a tri-series against India and Sri Lanka during that time. To avoid a clash, the WICB earlier had asked the PCB if their tour could be rescheduled to August. The idea, however, interfered with the Pakistan's own plan to host India and to play out the Zimbabwe series that was postponed last year. West Indies thereafter had also

scheduled their Caribbean Premier League tournament from 29 July to 26 August. "It's a very tricky situation here as

our first priority to play according to the FTP," Zaka Ashraf, the PCB chairman, told ESPNcricinfo. "They actually planned their tri-nation series within our window and left us with a choice to reschedule the series, however after a lengthy deliberation we failed to find a window to go ahead with it. "Earlier there were plans to split

the tour but it's not working as we want to play a full series. West Indies is an important cricket team and we have always had cordial relations with them, and hopefully we will find another window next year."

The PCB was hoping to host India in August this year after a successful series in India last December.

However ESPNcricinfo has learnt that India have declined, citing player rest, while Zimbabwe responded positively.

Pakistan were scheduled to tour Zimbabwe for a series of two Tests, three ODIs and two T20s from December 2012 to January 2013 but had played the series with India instead. So, having the August window open, they offered Zimbabwe the option of playing the pending series.

Last year West Indies A team's reciprocal tour (after 2010) to Pakistan also fell through as the visitors were reluctant to visit Pakistan. The idea was floated to play in the UAE but due to the excessive cost of arranging a series for A teams away from home, it was scrapped by the PCB. Pakistan last visited West Indies in 2011, drawing the Test series 1-1 winning the ODI series 3-2 and the hosts taking the only T20I.

O'Neill warns Cook targets dominance

England captain Alastair Cook believes his team could be on the verge of a period of sustained dominance which would peak with a World Cup triumph in two years.

Cook is confident England's recent lacklustre displays in the drawn Test series against New Zealand were just a blip that will soon be forgotten as they head into a frenetic programme over the next few months.

England play New Zealand in a Test series rematch then host the limited overs Champions Trophy and the Ashes Test series before heading to Australia for a second Ashes campaign.

Cook's men will be back in Australia and New Zealand for the 2015 World Cup and the opening batsman is convinced a good run over the next year can be the catalyst for England to win the tournament for the first time.

"We haven't won an ICC 50-over event so that is certainly a priority," Cook said on Friday.

"We've got the tournament here in our home conditions which we hope to make the most of and then in two years' time there is the World Cup. We haven't won that either.

"They are two big tournaments coming up and we have certainly got the team, if we keep developing, to have a chance of

winning them.

The Champions Trophy begins on June 6 and England play in Group A against Australia, New Zealand and Sri Lanka.

But before that Cook wants England to make amends for their tame showing in New Zealand.

"We knew how tough it would be," said Cook. "New Zealand have got some really good young players who we will hear a lot

more about in the future. "The bottom line is we did not play as well as we could have done and if you do that in any international team you don't

deserve to win.' Regardless of his team's result against New Zealand, Cook refuses to accept England will start as firm favourites when

Australia arrive for the Ashes after being hammered 4-0 in India recently. "We're the first England team to play back-to-back Ashes series so close together so the potential and the opportu-

nity to do something very special is there," Cook said. "I wouldn't read too much into what happened in India with Australia. The

conditions were very different to what we are going to experience in England. "They are going to be a very tough side to

beat. They have got some world-class players. The Ashes is a unique event so hope-

fully it will bring the best out of both sides. "The favourites stuff is all off the field.

You can read all you want about that sort of stuff but it is irrelevant."

Former Sunderland manager Martin O'Neill has warned the Premier League strugglers they might regret the decision to sack him.

O'Neill was dismissed by the club's American owner Ellis Short just hours after last Saturday's 1-0 home defeat against Manchester United.

Sunderland have gone eight games without a win in the Premier League and are dangerously close to the relegation zone.

But O'Neill, who has since been replaced by former Swindon boss Paolo Di Canio, is convinced he would have kept the Black Cats in the top-flight if he had been allowed to remain in charge.

The former Aston Villa and Celtic boss had already inspired a Sunderland team bereft of confidence and languishing in 16th place when he took over in December 2011, guiding them to a 13th-placed finish.

Indian cricket legend Rahul Dravid was awarded the Padma Bhushan on Friday by President Pranab Mukherjee at the Rashtrapati Bhavan in New Delhi, for his outstanding contribution to the sport.

Padma

The Padma Bhushan is India's third highest civilian honour, after the Bharat Ratna and the Padma Vibhushan. The awards were announced in January 2013.

Friday's ceremony was of the first batch of awards being conferred. Two Padma Vibhushan, 10 Padma Bhushan and 42 Padma ShrI awards were given to personalities from different professional backgrounds for their contribution to the nation.

The government had come out with a list of 108 Padma awardees this year In all four personalities were awarded Padma Vibhushan, 24 for Padma Bhushan and 80 Padma Shri. Nobody was named for Bharat Ratna for this year.

Last year, Dravid was once again overlooked for the Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna-the nation's highest sporting honour, losing out to Olympic medal winners Shooter Vijay Kumar and wrestlerYogeshwarDutt.

Improve swing, says Wasim

Famed paceman Wasim Akram Friday told Pakistani bowlers that they must master swing bowling to win internationally, as he readies to nurture the country's talent at a key training camp.

"I was disappointed the way our fast bowlers performed in South Africa, so I will try to teach the fast bowlers how to swing the ball which is important for performing well at international level," Wasim said at the launch of the camp.

Known fondly as "Sultan of swing" for his mastery, the 46year-old left-arm fast bowler will train around 15 current and upcoming bowlers at a camp in Karachi from April 20-29.

Wasim was invited to do so by the Pakistan Cricket

Board ahead of the eight-nation Champions Trophy in England in June, after Pakistani pacemen failed to impress on tour in South Africa earlier this year. Frontline paceman Umar Gul managed just five wick-

ets in two Tests while lanky Mohammad Irfan took two in two. Rahat Ali was the best with six wickets in two matches after going wicketless in his debut Test.

"If someone wants to be a really good fast bowler he will have to bear with the scorching sun and heat. If he does that, only then he can become a good bowler and it's a continuous process of learning," said Wasim.

Wasim said that Irfan, the world's tallest bowler who stands at seven feet one inch, has to work hard on his fitness. "If he keeps fit then I am sure he can play for three-four

years," said Wasim, who took 414 Test and 502 one-day

Wasim also expressed hope that India would allow Pakistani players to feature in their lucrative Twenty20 Indian Premier League (IPL).

"I think politics should stay away from sports," said Wasim, who was the bowling coach of Kolkata Knight Riders in the IPL until last year.

"Since Pakistani bowlers are better than India's, it will benefit the Indian league," he added.

Pakistani players featured in the inaugural IPL in 2008 but India stalled all bilateral ties after the November 2008 attacks on Mumbai killed 166 people and were blamed on Pakistani-based militants.

The 31-year-old Ronchi is New Zealand born but was raised in Australia where he

played four one-day internationals and three Twenty20 internationals in 2008-09 before returning to his country of birth.
