6 hartals plus weekends, holiday serve severe blow to economy


The economy is set to bleed after the export and service sector have become a hostage at the hands of the opposition parties, with fall in productivity punctuated by holidays and weekends.

Until April 14, when the country will celebrate Pahela Baishakh, the first day of Bangla New Year 1420, businesses will have had four workdays to operate, thanks to six shutdowns and four weekends and holidays.

Each shutdown costs Tk 2,000 crore, and the garment industry, which accounts for 80 percent of all the country's exports, loses Tk 360 crore for a day's hartal, according to the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FBCCI).

"We have already become a hostage to politics," Asif Ibrahim, former president of Dhaka Chamber of Commerce and Industry (DCCI), said yesterday. "Buyers are cancelling orders. We are counting losses every day.

Another hartal tomorrow

1 killed, 50 hurt on first day of shutdown by BNP, allies

Sporadic violence in different parts of the country left one person killed and more than 50 injured yesterday as the 36-hour shutdown imposed by the BNP-led 18-party alliance began to press for the release of its leaders.

To add to the woes of city dwellers, especially the poor, Islami Chhatra Shibir, the student wing of Jamaat-e-Islami, has called for another hartal tomorrow protesting the "torture of its detained president Delwar Hossain in police remand".

In the capital, several crude bombs were

BNP behind bars

Finds it hard to hold political programmes as over 50 active central leaders in jail

The crackdown on main opposition BNP has plunged the party into a temporary leadership crisis, as more than its 50 central leaders, including the acting secretary general, are now in jail.

The situation has put the opposition in a quandary. Many of its activists are confused about the fate of the ongoing anti-government agitation, as almost all the leaders active on the street have been put behind bars in less than a month.

Against such backdrop, BNP has asked its young leaders to stay safe from arrests, said party's senior leader Khandaker Mosharraf tion's agitation. · Hossain yesterday.

He said his party would step up the ongoing

agitation and the legal battle to free their detained leaders.

Talking to The Daily Star yesterday, some political analysts and opposition leaders observed that the crackdown would not yield positive result; rather deteriorate the situation further by closing the window for resolving the crisis through talks.

On Sunday, eight senior BNP leaders, including its acting secretary general Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir who had earlier been put behind bars twice in less than a year, were denied bail and sent to jail. They have been charged with torching vehicles and assaulting police during opposi-

EC fixes schedule; writ petition for stay

The presidential election will be held on April 29, Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad announced yesterday.

Aspirants for the post will have to submit nomination papers on or before April 21 to the CEC.

The nomination papers will be scrutinised on April 22 and the last date for withdrawal of those is April 24.

The CEC announced the polls schedule at a press briefing at the Election Commission shortly after a meeting with acting Speaker Shawkat Ali.

According to the electoral law, president is elected by the MPs through open voting with the CEC as election officer.

As per the schedule, the MPs will cast votes from 3:00pm to 6:00pm in parliament, which goes into session

on April 21.

"The work on the Padma bridge project will start from where it was left off [in September 2011]," Muhith

said adding that river training would also start from where it was stopped. He reiterated that the bridge would be constructed with the government's own funds. For this, the

ministries would not be given additional allocations in the next year's budget.

However, the finance minister said, the previous development partners like ADB and Jica, if they want, could still participate in the Padma bridge project.

Buet student stabbed at dormitory

With serious injuries to the head, back and the left eye, Arif Raihan Dwip, a thirdyear student of mechanical engineering and a resident student of Nazrul Islam Hall, is now admitted to Square Hospital in the capital.

today, surgeons were operating on Dwip. He was taken to the operating theatre around 8:30pm, a relative of the victim told The Daily Star.

As of filing this report around 1:10am

Hall guard Zakir Hossain said he saw a punjabi-clad man, aged between 25 and 30, dragging Dwip down the stairs from the first floor of the dormitory around 11:30am. The attacker was carrying a bag on his back.
