

Dr. Bijoy Krishna Banik, Masud Hasan and Md. Aminul Islam, a lecturer in English addressed the discussion



His paintings are lively and have the right kind of restraint. He knows where to stop. His figures and objects are closely attached and create a unique synchronisation. The artist arranges motifs in different combinations of light

Nabi likes to go into details. Since the late 1960s, Nabi's social commitment has become more and more apparent. His creativity is intensely moved by national, social and political crises. This is also fairly reflected in his creations.


Hasan Hafizur Rahman A multi-dimensional personality

Hasan Hafizur Rahman was a poet, journalist and critic. He was born in 1932 at his maternal uncle's residence. His ancestral home was in the village of Kulkandi under Jamalpur district. He completed his BA and MA in Bangla Language and Literature in 1951 and 1955 respectively from the University of

April 1 marked the 30th death anniversary of the

Rahman's had a full and diverse professional life. He began his career in 1952 as assistant editor of the weekly Begum. Subsequently he worked for Saogat, Ittehad, Dainik Bangla and others. In 1972, he was elected president of the editorial board of the Dainik Bangla. He was also a Professor of Bangla Language and Literature at Jagannath College, and worked at different missions of Bangladesh abroad.

Rahman started writing while still a student. In 1946, while studying at school, his first short story, "Asrubheja Path Chalte", was published in the Saogat. In 1949, the Sonar Bangla published his first poem. During that time, he became associated with the Dhaka Progressive Writers and Artists Association. He actively took part in the Language Movement of 1952, inspired by which he wrote his famous poem "Amar



Ekushey". In 1953 the first compilation work on the Language Movement "Ekushey February", was published under his editorship. He was an associate of Sikander Abu Zafar in editing the literary journal

Rahman was involved with several socio-cultural movements. In 1954, he was elected literary secretary of Dhaka University Central Students' Union (DUCSU) and edited a monthly magazine Spectra. He was committed to Bengali nationalism and culture. In 1971 he took part in the Liberation War. He was a socially conscious writer, and his writings reflect the hopes, sufferings and protests of the

Among his significant literary works are "Bangladesher Shadhinota Judhho: Dalilpatra", "Bimukh Prantar", "Arta Shabdabali", "Shokarta Tarbari", "Amar Bhetarer Bagh", "Adhunik Kobi O Kabita", "Sahitya Prasanga" and more. The poet received several awards for his literary

achievements. He died in 1983 at Moscow Central Clinical Hospital.

First look at Iron Man 3

When you're a genius-billionaireplayboy-philanthropist, very little gets under your skin, especially when most of your problems can best be solved by putting on a mechanised suit of armour. So you know if Tony Stark stops making jokes and starts making threats, then things must really be serious. That's what is seen in the first film

clip for "Iron Man 3," released exclusively on Yahoo! Movies. Stark, played by Robert Downey Jr., is surrounded by reporters outside a hospital follow ing an attack by the international terrorist known as the Mandarin (played by Ben Kingsley). Tony uses the media to get a personal message out to his new enemy. And to show how serious he is, Stark invites the Mandarin to bring the fight literally to his door (plus he smashes a reporter's smartphone to drive home the point).

So what is it that pushes Tony Stark to the edge? It's a combination of both internal and external factors. He's been shaken by his experience in "The Avengers," where for the first time he fought an enemy literally from another world and very nearly died in

the process. His perception of the world and his place in it has irreparably shifted. "Nothing's been the same since New York," he says.

But then the Mandarin leads a terrorist attack, and as is seen in a brief shot in the teaser trailer, Stark's friend and valet Happy Hogan (Jon Favreau) gets injured as a result. That pushes Tony over the edge, inspiring him to call out the Mandarin personally in the press. He even gives the terrorist leader his home address, "10880 Malibu Point."

Of course, the Mandarin takes Tony's invitation to drop by his place. He sends three attack helicopters to fire missiles at the cliff-side structure, sending the whole place sliding into The wait to see just how Tony Stark

Every celebrity attracts attention -- sometimes it's positive, sometimes it nears madness. Many of these stories remain untold. Popular actor Apurba lifted the lid on several memorable incidents in his career, which he recently shared with The Daily Star:

Once I was on my way to Pantapath's UTC Bhaban for a shooting; I got stuck in bad traffic near Karwan Bazar. A boy approached me and claimed he was a huge fan. He asked for my cell phone number, which I declined to offer. But the boy -- in a fit of craziness -- lay down under my car. A crowd soon formed, as we all kept trying to make him understand that it wouldn't be possible for me to give him my phone number. This incident created a long tailback behind my car. After a long time, I was finally able to convince him to give up and eave the scene.

In a separate incident in Bikrampur, I was out at a location to shoot for the drama "Khuje Berai Taare". Humayun Faridee was with our unit. Thousands of people gathered to watch us shoot. We met them after lunch, but they demanded that unless we talk to them and take pictures with them all, they wouldn't let us shoot. I've seen big crowds before, but the Bikrampur crowd was larger than I had ever seen. Eventually, Humayun Faridee and I were able to



convince them to allow us to shoot. I still recall that incident, as it made me realise the intensity of the audiences' interest towards the artistes. Another unforgettable incident took

place during a shooting at Bandarban. I went into the water for a scene, but soon realised that I had lost my footing. I was concerned, but no one in the unit understood what had happened. I kept struggling to stay afloat and tried desperately to find something to hold on to. As I went under water, I kept thinking about my mother and how I wouldn't be able to say goodbye to her. Luckily, an actor named Iqbal realised that I was drowning; he pulled me up and dragged me to the shore. Thank God that Iqbal saved me on that occasion.


