Letters to martyrs read out

Projonmo Chattar in the capital's Shahbagh once again echoed with the aspirations and promises of the reawakened youths as their letters, in memory of the 1971 Liberation War martyrs, were read out in public to inspire others.

"From today onwards, we pledge that for as long as the blood of martyrs runs in our veins, we will prove ourselves to be their rightful successors," wrote one Sifat.

The letters, symbolically addressed to the martyred freedom fighters, were released with balloons on February 20 and copies were given to Gonojagoron Mancha.

Yesterday, prominent theatre personalities, including Asaduzzaman Noor, Shomi Kaiser, Ahkam Ullah, Rezina Wali Lina, Belayat Hossain and Tamanna Tithi, read out selected letters that best exemplified people's sentiments.

"Dear father, 42 years ago you left us for an unknown land. You gave your last ounce of blood for this country, but this sacrifice has not gone in vain...your golden children will create a secular Sonar Bangla," wrote a martyr's child, Lucky.

Protesting today's hartal, Gonojagoron Mancha will bring out a procession carrying black flags at 11:00am.

WAVE OF SHUTDOWNS

Rajshahi economy hit hard

The agriculture-based rural economy and small businesses in Rajshahi district are going through hard times and counting losses due to the political unrest and frequent shutdowns since late February.

Unavailability of vehicles to transport the harvest to markets and cold storages means the agricultural products are left to rot in the fields while depriving the farmers of just prices.

Vegetables like bitter and pointed gourds, tomato, garlic and cucumber are being sold at half price due to the discolouration and weight loss resulting from long storage and the low turnout of wholesale buyers in markets.

Masud Rana, a potato farmer of Rajshahi's Tanore upazila, said the majority of his harvest on eight bighas of land was rotting following the shutdowns.

A fellow farmer, Shipon Karigar, said just three weeks back he had sold potatoes at Tk 750 per 90 kilogrammes but as of last Monday the figure had come down to Tk 400. "What are we to do?" he asked. Sunil Das, a rice trader of Shitli

village, said last month he suffered a

loss of Tk 2 lakh after buying paddy at Tk 700 to Tk 800 per maund and later being forced to sell those at Tk 500 per maund. "If hartals continue like this, we will not be able to recover from the losses," said Aminul Islam of

Bagmara and Durgapur upazilas and are even exported abroad. Fruit traders are also counting losses

Mohonpur who sells betel leaf,

which grows aplenty in Mohonpur,

due to the lack of buyers on hartal days. Unable to transport vegetables to different cities including Rajshahi and Dhaka from Tanore, Saiful Islam, a vegetable trader, said he was incur-

ring a loss of Tk 50,000 daily. He said there were hundreds of

others whose lives depended on transporting vegetables and other crops. The small shops are forced to stay closed for nearly half the month

while their owners are still having to

pay the whole month's rent, employees' salary, and electricity, telephone and other necessary bills. M Rofiqul Islam said he was able to open his IT-based shop in Rajshahi

New Market for only 14 days in February and 17 days in March. "Now it has become difficult to bring in even one tenth of my average monthly income," he said. Stating that agricultural losses

would be dangerous for the region's economy, Rajshahi Chamber of Commerce and Industries President Abu Bakkar Ali urged politicians to consider the plight of the farmers and traders.

7 held with bullets, Stabbed Buet student

explosives in capital

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) detained seven people with bullets and explosives in their possession after raiding the capital's Jatrabari and Mohakhali areas on Tuesday night and yesterday morning.

A Rab-10 team arrested six people at Mominbagh of Jatrabari with 100 grammes of sulphur, 50 grammes of gunpowder, and one kilogramme of another bomb making substance, said the operation officer Capt Riadul Islam.

He said the detainees--Mostafizur Rahman, 32, Rafikul Islam, 26, Mohsin, 30, Abdus Sattar, 32, Alim Miah, 25, and Jamal Hossain, 25--were professional makers of bombs and cocktails and suppliers of explosives.

"They were trying to produce bombs and cocktails for pickets who use these during political programmes," said the Rab official. "We are yet to discover their affiliations with any political party or any gang of snatchers."

In another raid, Rab-1 men arrested a youth with some explosives and 11 bullets at Sattola Bosti in Mohakhali area, said Abhishekh Ahmed of Legal and Media Wing of Rab. He, however, did not disclose any detail of the youth for the sake of investigations.

fighting for life STAFF CORRESPONDENT

A Buet student who suffered critical stab injuries to the head, back and left eye on Tuesday was fighting for life at Neuro Intensive Care Unit in the capital's Square Hospital as of last evening.

Arif Raihan Dwip, a third year student of the mechanical engineering department, underwent a major operation on Tuesday and was in an unconscious state, said hospital sources.

An unidentified man had dragged Dwip, a member of the Buet unit Bangladesh Chhatra League convening committee and resident student of Nazrul Islam Hall, down the hall's stairs and stabbed him indiscriminately before fleeing.

None has been arrested till last evening. Dwip's brother, Riaz Morshed, filed a case yesterday with Chawkbazar Police

Station accusing unidentified people.

Meanwhile, around 150 students, teachers and staff of Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet), under the banner "Buet Poribar" formed a human chain and brought out a silent procession on the campus protesting the attack.

Alleging that Jamaat-Shibir men were behind the attack, they demanded that the perpetrators be arrested and handed down punishment after a proper probe.

Some Buet officials were patronising Shibir men while names of 59 Shibir leaders involved in different violence perpetrated on the campus were handed over to the university authorities. But no steps were taken against them, they said.

They also demanded enhanced security measures for students. Buet Teachers Association also condemned the attack.

Decapitated body of man found by Buriganga

Police recovered the decapitated body of a man, with the head missing and hands and legs tied up, stuffed inside a sack and left on the bank of the river Buriganga near Basila Bridge in the capital yesterday.

The victim Kawsar Mollah, 36, hailing from Agailjhara in Barisal, used to reside in the capital's Mirpur and worked in a car workshop, said Ashiqur Rahman, subinspector (SI) of Hazaribagh Police Station.

The SI told The Daily Star that three identity cards, including the national ID card, and a driver's licence were found in one pocket of the clothes Kawsar was wearing.

According to the information on the cards, police contacted his relatives, who later arrived and confirmed that it was him.

Police sent the body to Sir Salimullah Medical College Hospital for autopsy.
