It took about 2/3 minutes to process what we just saw. Acclaimed TV serial director and actor Afsana Mimi did a presentation at The Daily Star Centre last Tuesday. The subject: her first feature film. Based on what I saw, I'd definitely want to go to the theatre, buy a ticket and watch this film.

What is it called? "Run", says Mimi. Why "Run"? Mimi: "It's about cricket. More specifically, a young cricket team called 'Bengal Tigers'. Hence, 'Run'."

What is it about? "It's an adaptation of Dr. Muhammad Zafar Iqbal's 'Camp'. I wanted to make a TV play/serial on it, but when I approached Zafar Sir, he suggested that the story was better suited for the big screen. Those who have read 'Camp' know that it's a story of a freedom fighter. When we decided to make a film, we wanted to see it from another angle. Azad Abul Kalam adapted the story and connected the spirit of Liberation War to the nation's love for cricket. Both are sources of national pride and both represent the indomitable youth of Bangladesh," she says. "Run" is a big budget (around Tk 10 crore) film --

evident from the presentation; I noticed the art direction team constructing a whole building. "We were location scouting, and could not find any

school that looked like it was built in the '70s. Those fitting the description had other buildings around it, so that didn't work. Eventually, we found a location in Sylhet that we liked and decided to build the school from scratch. That wasn't enough though; we had to fix the road to the school. Ranjan Rabbani, our art director, is a miracle worker," Mimi informs.

She adds: "We are all newbies; we have been working in the TV industry. This is also a learning process for us. We held workshops -- covering acting, cricket, Liberation War, Bangladeshi films -- conducted by Raisul Islam Asad, Khaled Mahmud Sujon and Suborna

Highlights (without giving away much): "Run" is a commercial film without a "heroine" or lead female role.

The cast includes seasoned actors Afzal Hossain Suborna Mustafa, Azizul Hakim, Dolly Zahur and


"My math teacher in school was a very irritable person, who scolded us on and off in class. That's why my friends and I once punctured the tire of his cycle. My school days were really fun-filled."
