### Woman 'commits suicide'

A pregnant woman allegedly committed suicide in the capital's Mirpur Section-12 yesterday.

The deceased Shilpi Akhter Riya, was a first year degree student of Mirpur University College.

Her husband Imam Ahmed told reporters that their relationship was in a crisis over a family dispute. "Shilpi told me over phone that she did not want to live anymore and switched off the phone at 6:00pm," Imam said.

Later, he came home and found his wife hanging with the ceiling fan with a scarf.

Shilpi was declared dead at Dhaka Medical College Hospital on arrival.

### 291-member JCD central committee approved

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia yesterday approved a "full-fledged" 291-member central committee for the pro-BNP student body Jatiyatabadi Chhatra Dal last night.

She had announced names of the first five committee members, including the president and general secretary, on September 3, 2012.

Yesterday's 286 members comprise 31 vice presidents, 21 joint secretaries, deputy secretaries and assistant secretaries, said JCD Assistant Organising Secretary Jahangir Alam Jahangir.

Party sources, however, said the members include over 100 former students.

### Article 19 condemns attack on female journalists

## Expansion of coastal dev activities a must

Expansion and coordination of development activities in the country's coastal areas are necessary for the welfare of the victims of climate change, said speakers at an experience-sharing meeting yesterday.

"Twenty eight million people live in coastal areas and their lives and livelihood are challenged due to ground water salinity," said Md Abdul Qayyum, additional secretary and also national project director of disaster management department's comprehensive disaster management programme-II.

He said the solution is not migration to big cities rather they should come up with a comprehensive solution to protect the coastal communities.

Practical Action, a UK-based development organisation, organised the programme at Spectra Convention Centre for disclosing experiences gathered during a pilot project carried out in Shyamnagar and Kaliganj upazilas in Satkhira.

The two year-long project began in 2011, with Asian Development Bank's assistance, to improve the resilience of vulnerable communities living in south-western coast of Bangladesh.

Teresa Kho, country director of Bangladesh Resident Mission of ADB, among others, spoke.

## Held bloggers' bail hearing Apr 17

A Dhaka court yesterday fixed April 17 to further hear the bail petitions of the four bloggers arrested for allegedly hurting religious sentiments via social media.

The court also asked the two investigation officers of the cases against the bloggers to submit their probe reports by that date.

The arrestees are Subrata Adhikari Shuvo, 24, a master's student of Dhaka University, Russel Parvez, 36, a teacher at an English medium school, and Mashiur Rahman Biplob, 42, a blogger, and Asif Mohiuddin, 28, a former student of American International University, Bangladesh (AIUB).

Metropolitan Magistrate Tarique Mainul Islam Bhuiyan fixed the date after hearing from both the defence and the prosecution on the bail petitions.

Shuvo, Parvez and Biplob were arrested in the capital on April 2 for their online posts deemed insulting to Islam and Prophet Muhammad (pbuh). The fourth blogger, Asif, was arrested the next day on the same charge.

The arrest of the bloggers drew huge criticism from people across the board as it followed a campaign by radical Islamist groups that "atheist bloggers" were involved in the Shahbagh movement to demand the death penalty for war criminals.

## D-8 chief praises Dhaka's role

Commending Dhaka's role in the D-8 activities and its institutional development, the secretary general of the body sought support and guidance from Bangladesh for widening and deepening the impact of the D-8 on the socio-economic development of the member states.

Sayed Ali Mohammad Mousavi, secretary general of the Organisation of Developing Eight (D-8), made the remarks when he paid a courtesy call on Foreign Minister Dipu Moni at the foreign office in Dhaka yesterday.

Dipu Moni remarked that with vast human and natural resources, and complementary economies, the D-8 countries collectively had a great potential to emerge as a powerful economic bloc. The D-8 offers an excellent platform for cooperation for realising that potential, she added.

The secretary general sought support and guidance from Bangladesh in his efforts for the socio-economic development of the member states, based on the new D-8 Charter and new paper on D-8 Global Vision.

Dipu Moni reiterated Bangladesh's commitment to the D-8 process.

Mousavi, now on a two-day official visit to Bangladesh, is meeting the government and private sector officials to explore ways to further enhance cooperation between Bangladesh and the D-8.

The D-8 involves eight major developing countries-- Bangladesh, Egypt, Indonesia, Iran, Malaysia, Nigeria, Pakistan and Turkey.

### HACKING OF BUET STUDENT

## Class boycott continues

The Buet students boycotted classes and formed a human chain for the second day yesterday to press home their demands, including formation of a high-profile probe body incorporating the home ministry to investigate the attack on Arif Raihan Dwip.

Dwip, a third year student of mechanical engineering, is undergoing treatment in Square Hospital's ICU in the capital after being hacked by an unidentified man at Nazrul Islam Hall in broad daylight on April 9.

Hours later, the students, accompanied by Bangladesh Chhatra League leaders, had locked up the main gate that day and the new academic building on April 13 protesting the attack.

The protesters also demanded that Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet) security officials state their stance regarding the attack and that they, if found negligent in duty, be removed.

Directorate of Students' Welfare Director Delowar Hossain, against this backdrop, had submitted his resignation letter to the vice-chancellor on April 13.

## Inefficient handling of welding cause

Says Caab probe report

Inefficient handling of welding at Royal Asia Courier Service's warehouse caused the devastating blaze at the Courier Cargo Building in Shahjalal International Airport on April 5, a Caab probe report revealed yesterday.

It also blamed poor security measures, for which welding was going on without proper permission and precautionary measures. It suggested demolishing the airline offices around the building and shifting the building from the "high security area".

Probe bodies of Civil Aviation Authority of Bangladesh (Caab) and the fire service submitted two reports to the civil aviation ministry yesterday.

Caab Chairman Air Vice Marshal Mahmud Hussain told journalists yesterday that the extent of damage was "big" as Biman, after hiring the building from Caab, had sublet it to nearly double the number of tenants it could accommodate. Caab will demand compensation from the courier and Biman, he added.
