Matosevic now faces Nadal test

Australian Marinko Matosevic faces the toughest ask in tennis after winning his first match on clay in almost a year to open with a 7-5, 6-3 success over Fernando Verdasco at the Monte Carlo Masters on Tuesday.

But the number 54 won't have time to celebrate an upset of Spain's former ace.

Instead, he will become just the first obstacle placed in the path of Rafael Nadal as the king of clay begins a bid for an unprecedented ninth straight championship at the Country Club overlooking the Mediterranean.

Matosevic sprang a surprise on Verdasco, the one-time clay powerhouse and 2010 runner-up here to Nadal, going through to the second round in a struggle as his Spanish opponent fought back at the end in the one-hour, 51-minute contest.

KKR stunned by Punjab

Gautam Gambhir's stupendous batting and Sunil Narine's splendid hattrick went in vain as Kings XI Punjab made a miraculous comeback to stun defending champions Kolkata Knight Riders by four runs in a thrilling Pepsi Indian Premier League encounter here on Tuesday.

Chasing a decent target of 158, KKR managed 153 for nine in the end despite a 105-run second wicket partnership between Gambhir, 60 off 39 balls with eight fours, and Eoin Morgan, 47 off 38 balls that included six boundaries.

This is Kings XI's second win from four matches while KKR's woeful away record continued as they have now lost their third game on the road.

From a comfortable 106 for two in 13 overs, KKR batsmen required only 52 off 42 balls but once the two set batsmen were out in quick succession, things changed rapidly.

Manoj Tiwary and 'Million Dollar' man Yusuf Pathan wasted 14 deliveries in between them as Manpreet Gony, who grabbed one for 18 in 4 overs, and Azhar Mahmood (3 for 21) bowled brilliantly to get the home team back in the match.

KP out of NZ series

Star England batsman Kevin Pietersen has been ruled out of next month's home Test series with New Zealand due to a knee injury, the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) said on Tuesday.

The 32-year-old had already been ruled out of the final Test match away to New Zealand due to the persistent problem in his right knee.

He was originally expected to miss six to eight weeks and has now been discounted from the two-match series.

"@kevinpp24 [Pietersen] has been ruled out of the Investec Test series vs @BLACKCAPS [New Zealand] as he continues his recovery from bone bruising to his right knee," said the ECB on their @ECB_cricket Twitter feed.

"Pietersen will have a repeat scan next week to determine when he is able to resume training."

keeping his "fingers crossed" that he will return to fitness in time for England's defence of the Ashes against Australia, which begins at Trent Bridge on July 10.

The South African-born player only returned to the England fold in October following a controversial spat with ex-England captain Andrew Strauss.

Besides, practice sessions in both morning and afternoon turned both the venues dirty as the sweepers of the NSC have apparently disappeared even though they were supposed to clean them every day. The athletes were even forced to halt their practice due to insufficient lights during loadshedding as the generators were not fully functional.

"As athletes from four disciplines are practicing here at the same time, I have to put in extra effort behind each player. Even then, the condition is such that they can hardly concentrate," said karatekas coach Jasimudin adding that the space provided for the karatekas is only one third of the ideal.

"It is not a hygienic place to practice,"

said a weightlifting coach seeking anonymity. The coach also added that the mat was covered with dust and the wash rooms were all dirty.

"We all know that it is not the ideal environment for sports, but we have to make do with it due to our limitations. The authorities should take notice and renovate the venues so that athletes can prepare in a more healthy environment," said taekwondo federation's general secretary Mahmudul Hasan Rana.

When the organisers are busy staging a 8 crore taka opening ceremony on April 20, no one was seemingly bothered with the health and hygiene issues of the athletes, who are the main attraction of the Games.

Boston blasts condemned

London event to go ahead; Russia to up security

Athletics' world governing body and the Olympic movement on Tuesday condemned the twin bombings at the Boston Marathon, describing them as an attack on the spirit of human achievement and benevolence.

"My thoughts and those of all the Olympic Movement are with the victims, their friends and their families today," the president of the International Olympic Committee (IOC) Jacques Rogge said in a statement.

"A marathon is a special, almost magical event that unites different communities with one shared goal and I am sure that this incident will serve to bring together all those who took part and all those who support such an event, with a common resolve."

The International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF) also described the blasts, which killed three and injured more than 100 on Monday, as "a mindless attack".

"This ghastly and cowardly attack

strikes at the very core of the freest of human activities," the president of the sport's world governing body, Lamine Diack, said.

"Whether as a fun runner or elite competitor, road running exemplifies the honesty of basic human movement, strength and resilience."

Diack and other senior officials in athletics also vowed to support race organisers.

Reuters adds from Moscow, Russian authorities have promised tougher security measures at August's World Athletics Championships after explosions near the finish line of the Boston Marathon.

"The security arrangements will certainly be reviewed after what happened in Boston," Russia's athletics chief Valentin Balakhnichyov told Reuters on Tuesday.

"Security has always been of the highest standard at all our sporting events but, no doubt, we will take into account the latest events and how it was done."

The Boston blasts on Monday appeared to go off near where spectators were standing behind road-side barriers.

Russia will host the Winter Olympics in Sochi next February and the 2018 soccer World Cup.

Meanwhile, police and officials in London said on Tuesday that the London Marathon would go ahead as planned in the British capital this Sunday.

Sports Minister Hugh Robertson said he was confident of security arrangements for the event and encouraged people to attend as a show of solidarity with the US city.

The 26-mile (42 km) London Marathon will attract 36,000 runners, among them Britain's double Olympic champion Mo Farah, starting at Greenwich Park and winding through city landmarks before finishing at the Mall.

London Mayor Boris Johnson told reporters while on a visit to Dubai: "Obviously what happened in Boston was shocking and horrific and our thoughts are very much with the victims and their families."

In Germany, Hamburg's annual marathon will go ahead as planned on Sunday after German police and security officials said they saw no increased risk for the event, organisers said.

Bangalore win Super Over tie

thing is in the pitch our quicks also will have the same advantage, so we are looking forward to the challenge."

Another pattern that the Tigers will try to change for good is their overseas record. They have become a formidable outfit at home, particularly in ODIs, but the overseas record still needs to be set right. It is a thought that seems to be foremost on the captain's mind. "For the last one and a half years we have played consistent cricket at home, but at the same time we could not replicate that abroad. But in 2013, our first tour (of Sri Lanka) was a very good one. It's history now, but we can take a lot of confidence from that -- not only as a team but many individuals also performed very well. Over the next five days if we can play consistent cricket, then we will see favourable results."

Asked for the differences between the team that toured here last and the one he leads now, the skipper alluded to the differing amounts of cricket the two different sides played leading up to the tour. "The last time we played here we were playing Tests after 13 months, if I am not mistaken. Now we have been playing a lot of cricket and just recently finished a Test series in which we played very well. Also, I think this team has a lot of performers. At the same time, they (Zimbabwe) will be hard to beat at home, but I think if we do the basics right, we can come away with something positive."
