

Nor'wester lashes 9 districts

Eight killed by lightning, 50 hurt, houses, crops damaged

Eight people were killed by lightning and 50 others injured during nor'wester that lashed nine districts yesterday and on Tuesday night.

Over 1,200 dwelling houses, educational institutions and business establishments were damaged and a good number of trees were uprooted in the affected districts, report our correspondents.

The storm-hit districts are Khulna, Satkhira, Chittagong, Pirojpur, Natore, Bhola, Noakhali, Bagerhat, Patuakhali, Barisal, Kishoreganj and Joypurhat.

In Khulna, storm accompanied by hail and rain damaged over 50 houses and Irri-boro paddy in Koyra, Dakope and Paikgaccha upazilas on Tuesday night.

In Satkhira, two people were killed and three others injured as lightning struck them during storm at Amadi Kheyaghat under Ashashuni upazila on Tuesday night.

The dead were identified as Monsur Molla, 55, of Kakklesia village, and Nasir Uddin Gazi, 30, of Kapsanda village in the upazila.

In Chittagong, two people were killed and four others were injured by lightning during the storm that lashed Hathazari and Banskhali upazilas of the district.

'TAUBA' TO 16 AL SUPPORTERS

15 Jamaat, BNP men charged sheeted

Charges have been pressed against 15 Jamaat and BNP men for forcibly administering 'tauba' (oath of penance) to 16 people for supporting Awami League in Panchbibi upazila of Joypurhat district.

Inspector (investigation) Nur Hossain Khandakar of Panchbibi Police Station submitted the charge sheet against the accused to the Judicial Magistrate's Court, Joypurhat, on Tuesday afternoon.

Jamaat men caught 16 people of Bharahuta village on March 3 and confined them to local Jame Mosque.

Moiz Uddin, an imam of another mosque of the same area, administered the oath to the 16 AL supporters at the mosque at around 11:30am on March 4 when local Jamaat leader Zafir Uddin and BNP activist Abdul Khaleque were present. Zafir is locally known as

Razakar.

"We've become non-Muslim by supporting the Awami League. We're now promising to be with Jamaat to become Muslim again. Those who support the Awami League are Jews and if we breach this oath, we will become non-Muslim again. Ameen," the 16 men, aged between 22 and 45, said after the imam.

Being informed by some locals, Police Superintendent Hamidul Alam of Joypurhat, Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO) Rafiqul Islam, and Officer-in-Charge Ahsanul Haque visited the village on March 6.

Police filed a case with Panchbibi Police Station the same day (March 6), accusing 15 Jamaat and BNP men of forcing the AL supporters to take the oath. Of the accused, 11 were arrested by March 21 from different areas of Khetla upazila under the district, while the rest are still at large.

Jubo Dal man cuts scrotum for toll

Extortionists allegedly led by a local Jubo Dal leader roughed up and cut the scrotum of a tobacco grower at bordering Durgapur village of Aditmari upazila under the district yesterday morning.

The victim, Solaiman Ali, 46, of Durgapur village was admitted to LaMonirhat Sadar Hospital with critical injuries and later referred to Rangpur Medical College Hospital at noon. After the brutal incident, police rushed to the spot but could not arrest the criminals as they went into hiding.

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Two statues recovered

A statue made of precious stone was recovered at Majhipara village in Ullapara Upazila of Sirajganj district on Tuesday evening.

Police and the locals said, a group of workers while digging a pond for Darad Ali at the village on Tuesday evening found the statue.

Officer-in-charge of Ullapara police station Biman Kumar said that a team of police went to the spot and seized the statue weighing around 25kg. "We have informed the department of archaeology as the statue seems to be an antique," the OC said.

Earlier on Friday, workers found a statue of Hindu god Vishnu while digging soil in Shankhodaha under Handial in Pabna.

They recovered the statue and handed it over to Handial police at night.

Savage act of feasting on storm-injured birds

A large number of birds, left injured by Tuesday night's nor'wester, fell prey to the savagery of a section of greedy and utterly callous people who caught and slaughtered the graceful creatures for eating.

Hundreds of birds including sparrows, waterfowls, cranes, storks, and herons lay prostrate on the premises of Barisal Telegraph Office as a nor'wester accompanied by downpour and thunderstorm battered the area for about half an hour from about 7:45pm on Tuesday.

With a good number of trees, the large compound of Barisal Telegraph Office, now with very little function, serves as a birds' sanctuary in the city.

After the storm, a large number of locals rushed to the spot, entered the office premises through the open gate and engaged in collecting the birds, mostly injured or senseless.

Informed about the brutality on the helpless birds, environment activists, nature lovers and journalists rushed to the spot yesterday morning and did what they could to save the remaining alive birds there.

They rescued and freed to nature a good number of birds.

Strangely though, no official and staff except a night guard were found at the office during the journalists' visit there a couple of times till 2:00pm yesterday.

The activists and the news-men also saw locals holding bowls full of huge meat of slaughtered birds while many women in the area busied themselves preparing meals with the meat.

Women getting self-reliant by doing embroidery works

A section of poor women and girls in the district is becoming self-reliant by doing embroidery works on fabrics.

The women after finishing their house-hold works, make embroideries on 'sari, kameez and urnas' for an extra income.

Girls who cannot continue studies for financial constraint are also engaged in the sector that has turned out to be very helpful for their economic self-sufficiency.

About 700 women of seven villages, including Shibganj, Munshirhat and Chilarang under Sadar upazila, earn their livelihood mostly through embroidery works.

These women with their sewing craftsman ship make exquisite pieces of artworks on fabrics with colourful threads and stones, known as 'jari' and 'puti'.

About four years ago, Abu Sayed, husband of Sufia Begum, 28, of Shibganj village under Sadar upazila, was killed in a road accident.

He left behind two daughters and a son. Sufia Begum was worried as how would she run the family.

One day, she saw one of her neighbours doing embroidery works on 'saris'.

She also started the work and within five days she completed embroidery on a piece of sari and earned Tk 500.

Sufia Begum said if she had not started the work at that time, she would have had to

start begging for running the family.

Champa Begum and Sadika Khatun of the same village are students of classes VIII and VII respectively at local Madarganj High School.

Due to financial inability of their families, their studies stopped midway.

They also started the same work and it helped them keep their studies on right track.

Mamuni Begum of Shibganj said, every day about 400 women take 'saris' and 'urnas' from her and after necessary embroidery works deposit those to her and take their wages.

She said doing embroidery work on a piece of sari generally takes a week and costs Tk 500 to 700.

The finished saris are taken to capital Dhaka where a single piece sales between Tk 5,000 and 15,000 depending on the works.

Businessman Sohel Khan, proprietor of Tamanna Enterprise in Dhaka, recently opened up an opportunity for the helpless women.

He makes designs on the 'saris' and 'urnas' and sends those to Thakurgaon for embroidery works.

On getting the embroidery works done at Thakurgaon, he takes the items back to Dhaka to sell those in noted shops and malls.

According to Sohel Khan, about 700 poor women were now engaged in the promising embroidery industry in Thakurgaon.
