NEWS IN brief JnU students continue agitation for recovery of dormitories

Students of Jagannath University (JnU) continued their agitation for the third consecutive day yesterday to realise a five-point demand, including recovery of its residential halls from grabbers and construction of new ones.

Boycotting classes and examinations, several hundred students formed a human chain around 10:00am on the campus.

They also staged sit-in before the vicechancellor office and later blockaded the English road for about 20 minutes.

The agitators at a press conference yesterday said they will resume their programme on Thursday morning with road blockade in Rayshaheb Bazar area of the Old city.

Singer Abdur Rahman Bayati seriously ill

Rampal power plant deal condemned

The National Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power and Ports yesterday condemned the deal signed by Bangladesh and India on April 20 to set up a 1,320 MW coal-fired power plant at Rampal in Bagerhat.

Both countries violated international laws by inking the deal, which would destroy the biggest mangrove forest that safeguarded people during devastating natural calamities, said the committee.

It urged people of both countries to wage united movement against the project, says a press release of the committee.

Killing of boy spurs roadblock

Dilder Hossain Narju, 16, died at a Sylhet hospital hours after he was stabbed on Sunday. Narju's family said he was stabbed by his classmate Noman Ahmed and his friends following an argument the two had at a religious gathering.

GREENHOUSE GAS

PM urges rich nations to cut emission

BSS, Dhaka

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday called upon the developed nations to demonstrate their leadership to reduce emission of greenhouse gases to address the greatest challenge confronting mankind and the globe.

"Adaptation is only a part of the solution. The real solution lies in reducing the root cause of climate change -- the emission of greenhouse gases. More delay in mitigation will mean greater need for adaptation and more sufferings for the communities and the poor," she said.

The premier was addressing the inaugural session of the 7th International Conference on Community Based Adaptation to Climate Change (CBA7) at Ruposhi Bangla Hotel in the capital.

"Justice demands that the climate problem should be addressed through the principle of common but differentiated responsibilities and respected capabilities," she added.

It is difficult for the people of many countries like Bangladesh to face the double burden of poverty and impacts of climate

change, she observed.

"Why should some rich people's lifestyle threaten the lives and livelihoods of poor communities?" questioned Hasina.

The poor communities, local government and non-governmental organisations of climate vulnerable countries should have access to science-based knowledge to solve the climate induced problems, she mentioned.

She called upon the scientists and practitioners from all over the world to strengthen the process of mutual learning on adaptation to prepare themselves to take the correct measures.

Climate experts, scientists, civil society members, community people and media joined the four-day conference, jointly organised by Bangladesh Centre for Advanced Studies (BCAS) and International Institute for Environment and Development (IIED).

Environment Minister Hasan Mahmud, senior fellow of IIED Saleem Ul Haq, Executive Director of BCAS Atiq Rahman and Youssef Nassef of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change spoke, among others.

HC bars Rajuk from tree felling in Purbachal

Five Shibir men held in capital

CHT peace accord yet to be executed

Seminar told

Fifteen years have elapsed since signing of the Chittagong Hill Tracts Peace Accord in 1997 but it is yet to be implemented due to lack of good political will, bureaucratic tangles and longstanding land disputes, observed speakers yesterday.

They were addressing a national seminar titled "Current implementation status of the CHT Accord 1997" held at Dhaka University's Nabab Nawab Ali Chowdhury Senate Bhaban.

They said the government has eluded the hill district authorities by giving them control of less important departments including fishery instead of the major ones like police [local] and education.

Apart from these there are over 500 temporary camps for army, Ansar, armed battalion police and other agencies which should be removed in line with the accord, they said at the seminar which was

arranged by National Human Rights

Commission, Bangladesh with the help of

International Labour Organisation.

Urging withdrawal of such temporary camps, NHRC Chairman Mizanur Rahman said a feeling of mistrust prevails among army and locals in the hill tracts, so the commission will work there till June to eliminate the feeling and promote human rights issues. He asked why the peace accord is yet to

be implemented with Awami League in power as it was arranged by party chief Sheikh Hasina. Lawmaker Rashed Khan Menon said

forces against the peace accord are uniting and strengthening by taking advantage of the government's lengthy implementation process. DU Prof Shourav Sikder, in his key-

note paper, said with the Bangalee settlers' CHT land grabbing, the indigenous communities are becoming the minority. In 1909, there were only five percent Bangalee settlers there but now they make up 51 percent, he said, adding that the

government is yet to prepare voter lists for

indigenous people for holding elections

in the three CHT district councils.

Iti, wife of Golam Mahadin Titu, was detained from her Savar residence so as to trace Titu's whereabouts, said police, adding that Babu's father filed the case yesterday accusing four named persons and several unidentified others.

Two unidentified youths shot dead Babu, 24, at east Kazipara in the capital's Kafrul on Sunday. He was buried at Azimpur graveyard Sunday night. Meanwhile, BCL Dhaka city (north) unit brought out a

procession from Mirpur 1 to Mirpur 10 demanding arrest and trial of the murderers. Babu had been looking after a five decimal piece of

land his relative bought from Titu's father for Tk 15 lakh in 2005. Titu was threatening to forcibly take back the land, now worth over Tk 2 crore, said the locals Two months ago, the relative gave Titu Tk 2 lakh to

settle the issue, they said, adding that Titu had been accusing Babu for a beating the locals gave him in March for extortion.
