A 10-day solo art exhibition titled 'Banglar Shekore Swapno' by artist Raghunath Chakroborty began at Gallery Cosmos-2 at the city's New DOHS on April 19. Gallery Cosmos has organised the event in observance of Pahela

Japan's Ambassador to Bangladesh Shiro Sadoshima inaugurated the exhibi tion as chief guest. Eminent artist Professor Abdus Shakoor Shah was present as guest of honour. Enayetullah Khan, chairman of Gallery Cosmos; Tehmina Enayet, director of the gallery and Afrozaa Jamil Konka, coordinator of the gallery, among others, were present at the inauguration.

Raghunath is among the few artists who has experimented with traditional scroll painting. His presentation is, however, different from traditional artists. The painter depicts the everyday life of rural people in his paintings and the beauty of the pastoral landscape. Each work depicts a complete story that high lights the Bengali identity. His works are closely related to local myths, beliefs

"I try to present my country (and its folk elements) in my works," says Raghunath. Blue, black, yellow, white, red and crimson are used predominantly, giving a contemplative approach to the artist's characters. The intense backgrounds give the viewers an imposing view. His subjects are simple and denote clear unambiguous images. His style of painting is smooth and easily comprehended.

Over 20 pieces of artworks by the artist are on display at the exhibition. Works at the show depict different aspects of human life, varied deities, fishing, birds, Bauls, boatman, local animals and more.


